MOTION TO TABLE THE NOVEMBER 2020 TREASURER'S REPORT IS PASSED 6-0

C. PUBLIC COMMENT

Mayor Bugg, "Thank you for joining us tonight, Public, for public comment. We will have a brief public comment period tonight. As many of you already have, please sign in with your name and address. Please do not discuss topics covered in tonight's joint public hearing. Also, if your comments pertain to street signs, traffic, or the North Commons, please hold those for a future meeting. Would anyone from the public like to speak? Yes, sir." K. Schaschek, "My name



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is Klaus Schaschek, 394 King Carter Drive, Mr. Mayor, I would like to read off this here. Mr. Mayor, my capacity as treasurer of Golden Eagle, LLC, I would like to thank the town for the \$2,000 contribution for the rather successful Irvington Mayor's Golf Tournament, honoring former Mayor Rannie Ransone. Thank you very much." Mayor Bugg, "Thank you, I'm glad to hear about the success of that event, and I'm sorry I couldn't make it that day, but it sounds like it was a wonderful event." K. Schaschek, "Next year." Mayor Bugg, "Exactly." K. Schaschek, "Now, as a resident of the Town of Irvington, I would like to express my deep concern about the handling of the town's finances, and it's incorrect reporting, as well as the handling of contracts. Please let me present some of the facts. We have misappropriated funds for the trolley, the one time bonus for the lawyer, and payments to Lillian Merrill. All of these were never appropriated by the council. Also, the town's balance sheet is a total mess since August. The treasurer mixed equity and retained earnings, liabilities where not recorded properly, resulting in a large net income, which should of in actually a loss of over \$11,000. Furthermore, normal operating funds were comingled with COVID funds, which is against any accounting practice. The COVID bank account was never reduced by the actual COVID expenses. So, that means it came out of a regular, operating account that's comingling. Now to the FlackShack contract. The Mayor signed a contract for this service to the company for \$25,000 on October 5th. The council did approve this on the September 10 meeting after Mr. Patteson's recusal by 3-1-1 vote, and only from appropriation of \$3,000. According to our charter, you need 2/3 of the elected council, which means 4 votes. The mayor could not be the 4th one since it was not a tie. This contract should have never been signed, and these funds should not have been appropriated. I believe that this might become a case for the court. The lawyer's contention expressed in the September council meeting, that the application for \$25,000 grant as a contract is absolutely absurd. She should know that any one contract must be executed by the Mayor or Vice-Mayor, and not the Clerk. She should have objected at the time, since she knew about it, or should have known it since she has spent so much time at the town office. Also, her suggestion to use the contingency fund for this project shows that she does not understand budgeting and the reason for the funds. Since the \$80,000 is only a marker to show the minimum cash balance to operate the town in an emergency like a total income loss from the Tides Inn. You might say, 'Klaus, why did you wait until now?' Well, 4 or 5 months ago, some people from the public basically told me to 'Shut up and let the staff do their job' since they were quote 'performing it so ably'. Here are the results. No oversight, and the lawyer did not do her job when it came to the activities which should become now very expensive for the town. Based on all this evidence so far, and the possibility that the town has to obtain money in the future for large projects, I call for a financial audit so we can ensure that our finances are properly managed and reported, and you can show a clear picture to the lender, and have public support and confidence in the current financial report. Also, I will ask the council to curtail the lawyers involvement in town's affairs give her only very specific tasks. This should reduce her time at the office. Thank you." Mayor Bugg, "Thank you, Mr. Schaschek, Mr. Schaschek?" K. Schauschek, "Yes?" Mayor Bugg, "Can I have that for reference, we can discuss it tomorrow if you'd like." K. Schaschek, "I can give you a copy." Mayor Bugg, "Yes, I would like a copy of that." S. Phillips, "Mr. Mayor?" Mayor Bugg, "Yes?" S. Phillips, "I would just like to add just a brief change or correction to Mr. Schaschek's comment. It was not a contribution to the Golden Eagle. It was actually a contract for services."



Mayor Bugg, "Thank you." K. Schaschek, "Thank you." W. Nunnally, "I would like a copy of it too." K. Schaschek, "I can forward it to the whole town council." Mayor Bugg, "Thank you. Yes, Adrienne?" A. Bugg, "Hi." A. Marchetti, "Let's try to do something happy, Adrienne, shall we?" A. Bugg, "So, I'm Adrienne Bugg. I am a resident of Irvington, and I also just want to say thank you to the town council, the mayor, and the staff, for everything that you do that's in the best interest of the town. We really all appreciate that. I'm here tonight to introduce the IVBA, which is the Irvington, Virginia Business Association. A group of obviously I'm involved because I'm up here talking about it, Gabe is walking around giving information about it that is here as well. Ann Meekins is a part of it, there's some other people that are a part who couldn't be here tonight. We decided it would be a really great thing to have an association to support the businesses in town. You'll see the information on the back here, but this is a few highlights. We started in May. We're a very dynamic and passionate group of people, and we're very invested in the town. We're excited to support and promote the businesses here, and really support the culture of Irvington, and to give the small businesses more of a voice for the direction of growth and the protection of the charming and natural history that we all love here in Irvington. It's funny saying 'here in Irvington' when we're in White Stone, but you know, you get it. So far, we have 22 members, and we're growing. 8 of those sit on the Board of Directors, I am the Vice-Chair, Sam Van Saun." G. Del Rio, "Is quarantining, otherwise she'd be here." A. Bugg, "Exactly. So that's one reason that Gabe and I are here tonight representing. Ann as well." G. Del Rio, "Ann's Secretary, I'm Treasurer." A. Bugg, "Yep. So we are growing, and obviously we invite any of you that have businesses in the town that want to be a part of it to join. We have a website going already, that's a little clip of it here on the back, it's visitirvingtonya.com. It lists the members, there are links to the Town of Irvington website, there are links to the River Realm website, with a new Irvington-focused page coming soon. We also applied for a grant, this is a doosie, you ready? Virginia Tourism Corporation Recovery Marketing Leverage Grant for Tourism Marketing, but we got it. We got it, so what we're going to do with that is we are going to focus that money on digital advertising, and leveraging the River Realm's existing highranking website to promote the Town of Irvington. So, we are very excited about that, and also, the council, our bylaws allow for a liaison to participate in our board, and I would really love to have one of you come and do that. So, if you're interested please appoint someone so we can keep a line of communication open. We are definitely interested in collaborating to further efforts in the best interest of the town. So, anything to add?" G. Del Rio, "If anyone has any questions, we'll be happy to answer them." A. Bugg, "Yeah absolutely. So, thank you very much." Mayor Bugg, "Thank you, Exciting stuff. Would anyone else from the public like to speak?" G. Del Rio, "There was a question about memberships joining for a business it's \$100, to be a founding member it's \$500, for non-profits or individuals it is \$50, and all those things. are on the website just go to visitirvingtonva.com, go to the about, and you can do it all there." Mayor Bugg, "Thank you. Anyone else from the public like to speak?" W. Nunnally, "Mr. Mayor, I think I'd might like to be on that board, when you consider who you might want to send to them." Mayor Bugg, "Alrighty, good to know. Thank you. If there's no one else from the public that would like to speak that'll move us on to the next item."



D. REPORT FROM THE ZONING ADMINISTRATOR – L. Brown

Mayor Bugg, "Alright the Report from the Zoning Administrator – Mrs. Brown." L. Brown, "Thank you. I only have one thing to add to my report since I gave this to all of you on Tuesday. This morning I attended my first Wetlands Board hearing at the Courthouse. It was in regard to the Tides Inn project, and I'm not going to go into detail about that since they have a presentation. It was a very informative, educational experience for me to see the hearing process, I will find more out about what happens between the dual jurisdictions with the Wetlands Board and the Town of Irvington. So, thank you." Mayor Bugg, "Thank you."

E. REPORT FROM THE TOWN ATTORNEY - N. Keane

N. Keane, "No, I don't think I have anything."

F. REPORT FROM THE MAYOR - Mayor Bugg

Mayor Bugg, "The first item I have to speak about is research on appointments and reappointments. Several months ago, there was a discussion at the table about whether the town must always place an add to fill an appointment. It was stated that the town always did this. As we discussed at that meeting, there's no legal requirement to advertise for an appointment positions. I have since reviewed the minutes for the last several years. In several cases, a planning commission member whose term ended was reappointed without advertisements. An example of such reappointment without advertisement, would be Mike Mattheisen, Lee Hood Caps, and Chris Braley. I just wanted to clarify for the record that our past practice on advertising appointments has been mixed. With that in mind, we do have a vacancy on the BZA. Robert Fleet's term ended a couple months ago. We don't appoint it to the BZA, we concur with the court on appointment. May I suggest that we recommend that the Circuit Court reappoint Robert Fleet to another term? Council?" W. Nunnally, "I so move." F. Westbrook, "Do we know that he - does he want to do it?" Mayor Bugg, "Yes Sharon." S. Phillips, "Mr. Mayor, I spoke with Mr. Fleet this afternoon, and yes, I suggested that the council members would make a decision this evening as to whether he would be interested in fulfilling a new term, and he was interested." B. Schaschek, "How long is the term?" S. Phillips, "Four years." Mayor Bugg, "Excellent is there a second?" B. Schaschek, "Second." Mayor Bugg, "Discussion? All in favor and oppose? Great. Robert Fleet will be reappointed to the BZA and I will take that off my notes."

THE MOTION TO RECOMMENT THE CIRCUIT CORT TO REAPPOINT ROBERT FLEET TO ANOTHER TERM WAS PASSED 6-0

TOWN COUNCIL SPECIAL CALLED MEETING THURSDAY, DECEMBER 10, 2020

Mayor Bugg, "The next item I have to discuss is a council directive to require clarifying ordinance regarding cups for docks. At the April meeting, council directed the town attorney to draft an ordinance that would clarify existing, somewhat conflicting language in the town code when a CUP is required for a dock. The council's direction at that time was to ensure that a CUP is required for all docks built in the town. I have asked the Town Attorney to go ahead and draft the ordinance which was requested by council last April, and I intend to place the topics on the January or February agenda. Separately, I have received questions about the reason for the number of meetings for CUPS. We are using regularly scheduled meetings as much as possible to process CUP's. Most CUP supplied for in Irvington are for pools and docks. All schedules adopted by council for hearing CUP contains sites to the legal requirements. Requirements in the state statutes, and/or the town code include advertising, hearings, and meetings, with specific timing required as an overlay. Failure to follow the legal procedures renders the action taken invalid. As a protection for the town, and the applicants, we must adhere to what the law requires so that the CUP will be valid. The real issue is whether council wants to continue to require CUP's for all docks built in the town. Council apparently did, as recently as able. If council were to eliminate the requirement of a CUP for docks inside the navigation line that would likely reduce the number of CUP's processed by the town. It is worth a public discussion so the council members can go on the record with their definitive positions on this matter. The next item I have to mention is the budget process. We just completed our budget process. I have received some comments about the process, and I have my own additional thoughts. We invested a lot of time in Committee Meetings, at least eight of them over several months, totaling at least 20 hours. The meetings were poorly attended by council and the public. Other than Fran and Anthony, who held the meetings. I think one council member came to one meeting. At the end of this several months' process, at the second reading, we had three council members vote against the budget. Since then, I am now hearing complaints about the budget. I was never informed by any council member of concerns or complaints about the budget, taxes, or fees. I would like to find out why these concerns are not being communicated in real time to me, or to all members of the Budget and Finance Committee. I broke the tie in favor of passing the budget. I should never have to break a tie on a budget because that means we have not done the work necessary as a body to resolve concerns and solve problems ahead of a vote. We were elected, in part, to be problem solvers. This recent experience does not instill confidence in the town. The new budget process will begin in a few months. I am not in favor of handling this process the way it has been handled, and I will be looking to members to provide feedback about how this can be improved. Specifically, what it will take for members to participate well ahead of readings contemplated for passage. Thank you, council I will be reaching out to all of you. Next item I have is appropriating payment to contractors. Also at the last meeting, a debate was undertaken about appropriations, specifically to contractors of the town. Motions seeking certain appropriations for payment were defeated. My observation is that some council members may be using appropriations or defeating appropriations to include paying vendors that have s valid contract with the town. This is not an appropriate purpose. It is misuse of the appropriation vehicle. Appropriations are required as a safeguard for expenditures to make sure they are budgeted, to make sure the amount is correct, and there is no mistake about the amount or timing of those payments. Appropriating should not be used as a sword for the purpose of defeating a vendor, or



changing the outcome of a budget. Remember that all of our actions are on the record, and building a record, and the liability of the town is potentially increasing when these actions are taken. We do not want these actions to harm the reputation of the town. Lastly, the North Commons, I promised residents that we would try to hold a public hearing specifically about the development of the North Commons. I would like to do this next week on December the 15th. This is stated later in the agenda. Those are all the comments I have in terms of my Mayor's Report."

G. OLD BUSINESS

1. Motion to appropriate FY20/21 general operating funds – F. Westbrook

Mayor Bugg, "The first item would be the motion to appropriate general operating expenses for fiscal year of 2021. To facilitate the smooth operation of the town, I recommend the council adopt this motion. These are all budgeted expenses. With that, I will turn it over to Mrs. Westbrook for that motion." F. Westbrook, "Thank you, I didn't realize you've got me down for a few motions on here which I wasn't aware I was doing so I'm at a little bit of a disadvantage here. However, at the last town council meetings, because of some questions about the financials, you asked that I meet with Bonnie, which I recently have done. I understand her concerns and concur with the majority of it. And because the majority of those concerns do deal with our general operating funds, at this time I'm not going to recommend that we do an appropriation for all general operating funds. I'd like to see us consider appropriating all payments, whether it's general operating, or even the category on a monthly basis. I do agree that we need to get a little tighter control on some of these things, and I think it'll serve us best to appropriate on a monthly basis." S. Phillips, "Mr. Mayor, in a recent meeting with Mrs. Schaschek, as Treasurer we had a meeting, and she and I reviewed those concerns regarding general operating, and they were clarified. There had been a question asked about the difference between the two budgets, and they were discussed. Are there further questions regarding those? I'm prepared to address them, if it will help council come to an appropriation. B. Schaschek, "Are you asking me?" S. Phillips, "If any member of council has questions." B. Schaschek, "At last meeting there was a motion to appropriate those remaining general operating funds that hadn't already been appropriated. And I had requested a list of what hadn't we already appropriated, so I was looking for a list of items." S. Phillips, "Again, so I think that the main difference is in the general operating that has been validly, through a contract, handled would be under operating expenses, would be the Centrix contract for the new printer. That is under just office expenses, but as far as under operating expenses, there was an increase of \$522. I suspect that was a simple round-up to get to a whole number, so there's no specific vendor involved. Under professional services, no contract has been offered or authorized, but the line item last year was \$15,000, and it is currently \$25,000. That is for wealth management, but again there is no contract for that. So, the appropriation wouldn't occur for that until you address it as a contract, and there's none on the table and none to be considered. Under insurance, that was an increase of \$384. Again, I suspect that the council rounded to a whole number, so it was simply a whole number. Under public safety, there was an increase of \$500. I don't believe that there's a vendor involved. Under office expenses, again those increases are related to the Centrix new contract, which has been authorized. Under municipal expenses, there is actually a reduction of \$2,600. Under town council there was a



reduction of \$1,000. In utilities there was an increase of \$1,400, so I suspect that the vendor associated there would either be Dominion Energy." F. Westbrook, "I think the items you are reading are things that are on the budget, as opposed to what I was talking about, as general errors that need to be addressed, and rather than spend all this time tonight doing that kind of stuff," S. Phillips, "I don't have a list of appropriations, so I'm not sure how we'll pay bills between now and the next year." F. Westbrook, "I would suggest that we table this idea of appropriated general funds until next January, or to the next meeting in January." S. Phillips, "So no bills will be paid?" F. Westbrook, "And we'll have time to get with you and go down the list." S. Phillips, "But again, I think that the question that was asked was what was the difference, and I think I addressed that difference." Mayor Bugg, "I have a specific list if you'd like to hear it." W. Nunnally, "I'm totally confused, and I'll just have to say that, but I am concerned. I happen to know that Mr. Schaschek is a brilliant financier, and I happen to know that Bonnie Schaschek has a career in finance, and has done and organized huge businesses. If they're having questions about our finances, we've got to put a spotlight on this stuff. It's that simple." F. Westbrook. "My thought is that perhaps since we will meet on the 15th that we convene about 30 minutes earlier so that we can get a little bit of time and zero in on this, and present it back to you at that time. And we're only looking at 5 days." W. Nunnally, "And I thought the printer was done with COVID money. Where did that budget go?" S. Phillips, "No, the printer was not done with COVID money, the printer was done through general operating." F. Westbrook, "So I'd like to move that we table this until the discussion on December the 15th, and that we meet 30 minutes earlier than when we were going to meet, so we can have that discussion." W. Nunnally, "I second that." Mayor Bugg, "Any further discussion?" A. Marchetti, "Yes. Where was this discussion three months ago at all of the meetings? I don't take personal offence to anyone that opposes a line item under the budget, or every line item under the budget. Why are they waiting until now to engage in this conversation?" F. Westbrook, "Well you all asked me to meet with Bonnie at the last meeting. So now I've just recently done that." B. Schaschek, "In August I objected to approving the finances because they were incorrect. They were tabled. Tripp asked me to meet with Fran, and did Fran agree with me? And she did because I had spoken to her. Tripp asked me to meet with Fran. I did, I met with Fran on multiple occasions, discussing these items. So, it is not just coming up now." S. Westbrook, "I did read the contract and it stipulates we pay them monthly, equal amounts." W. Nunnally, "Yeah but I'm not sure we've got a contract." F. Westbrook, "Yeah we do, the mayor signed it. We authorized him to sign it. And in addition to that, the unfortunate aspect of this is that by not paying it and paying it in a timely manner, it's just not us, it's the other partners in this, which means the Steamboat Era Museum now looks bad, the Tides Inn, and whoever the other partners are. The Hope and Glory. This whole thing has had a series of problems, and I don't want to see us add to that by withholding payment on a contract that we authorized the mayor to sign on our behalf." 3. Discussion of audio visual proposal from Entertainment Systems

Mayor Bugg, "Next item on the agenda is the discussion of the use of tennis courts to teach tennis. That item is being tabled to a later date. Next, that brings me to Item 4 which is the discussion of audio visual proposal for entertainment systems. We began this discussion, and I think we are going to move forward with this discussion whether to purchase all of the additional equipment and any potential motion we may want to entertain. Bonnie, anything you would like to say in regards to what you reviewed?" B. Schaschek, "I did take a look at the estimate and I did go out to the website and look at all of the pieces. This is a very expensive proposition at \$31,300. The sound system is we've got to do a major installation, and it's about \$10,000 just for that. The good points on it would be that every member and mayor and council person would have their own mic, so we wouldn't be screaming across the floor and everyone could theoretically hear. However, there's an awful lot of cons to it. There was nothing in the estimates for the ongoing support and maintenance required. The setup of the racks and speakers before each meeting would need to be done by somebody. I don't think it's something that the existing staff is going to be able to do. It's very technically complex, and you're going to need somebody to do that. I don't think you could use the COVID funds for ongoing maintenance of it. I did draw out a couple of these things, just flowing through it, if anyone was interested in taking a look at it. I guess I'm curious on what you ultimately wanted to get out of this. There is a whole visual part of it, but then again, now you need to go to live streaming. We don't have the infrastructure in order to do live streaming, you need regular internet, and I'm not sure what they have at the church. So I'm not sure what it is that you are going to get for \$31,000. And then you'd be better off investing in a few microphones around the room than spending on something that you have to do major installation, major setup and takedown, and then continuously pay maintenance on it. That's just my opinion." Mayor Bugg, "I share your opinion. I think it's too expensive. I think we should explore alternatives and move on from this item, so we might lean on you in getting some more info on microphones and things that will be more cost effective. That would move me to the next item, which is New Business."



H. NEW BUSINESS

1. Tides Inn Presentation on Shoreline Development

Mayor Bugg, "The Tides Inn asked for time on our agenda to discuss its shoreline development project. This project involves several applications before several government agencies, including Irvington. Due to the length of our agenda, we have designated about 15 minutes of tonight's agenda for the Tides Inn to give a high-level summary presentation of this project. Please join me in welcoming the Tides Inn." B. Musinski, "Good evening, thanks everyone for welcoming us, my name is Brian Musinski, I represent the Tang family, and lead all the real-estate for the Enchantment Group. I've been with the company for about two years, and that really has represented a major investment in the Tides Inn, and really our first major investment since 2002. We have our design team, who's going to be walking us through the visual presentation. Waterstreet Studios is a Charlottesville based landscape architecture firm, we have Bay Design, who's based in Urbanna, and we also have Brian Hoffman from Friends of the Rappahannock. This July, the Tides will turn 74 years old, and in addition to our continued investment in the property, we also look at infrastructure, and we're looking at the shoreline. And as we started looking at the future of the Tides Inn, and the future hospitality, we've seen in our other properties, which are sort of high-end experiential resorts that customers are looking for more than just coming to a place, sitting on a beach, and having a drink. While certainly that's something that's important to them, we see the future guests and the current guests wanting to have experiential events and activities with their friends and their family. And the shoreline started as an idea to restore an area of the property that was eroding, and turned into what we see as the future of the Tides Inn, and coincidentally this coincided with something that Lara mentioned at the Wetlands Board hearing is that there's been some changes in regulation that have been encouraging natural shorelines. And what we see in this project is both a tourism draw to the Tides Inn, another one besides just gathering with friends and family, but also an ecological and educational opportunity, which the team's going to talk about here today, and then of course if there are any questions we'd be happy to answer those. Thanks for everyone's time, I am going to introduce Wayne Savage with Bay Design." W. Savage, "Hey everyone, I'm sure you remember me from the other night. I'm Wayne Savage with Bay Design Group. I've been a civil engineer on this project. This is quite the project here, as I'm sure you guys are now seeing. Also you guys have packets here as well that our landscape architects have provided to you guys to get you a good overview of what it looks like and what we're proposing. I just wanted to give you guys an update on where all the permits stand. We've gone through a JPA process, we've been working with VMRC, the Corps of Engineers, local Wetlands Board, along with several other agencies for this project. So everyone's all in on this and trying to get this thing to a point where we can get it permitted. At the local Wetlands Board hearing this morning, they did vote to unanimously approve this project. Based on my conversation this afternoon with the Army Corps of Engineers, there's no objection from them and we should be receiving a permit next week. As far as we know, there has been no further objection or comment from



VMRC, and we're expecting a favorable action from them within 10 days from today, that's their general timeline for issuing a permit from then. And the only thing that follows from there is we need this town council, obviously, to give us approval of the project. I think from that, I kind of gave us an update on where our permits for that, I'll turn it over to Waterstreet, and I'll be here to sort of help them along and introduce the project." E. Young, "I'm Eugene Young, we're from Waterstreet Studio, we're landscape architects and environmental planners in Charlottesville and Richmond, Virginia. Thank you all for letting us present to you tonight. I've never presented with a mask on and a coat on so this is a little interesting, and you can't see my expressions, so you won't be able to see our enthusiasm for this project, but we have books that we passed out to you if you want to follow along. We'll give you a quick description of what our design implementation is for the Tides Inn, along the shoreline as Brian and Wayne just described. This is the existing site conditions as we know it, this the Inn here, this is the arrival court as you come in for those of you unfamiliar with the Tides Inn. This is the base map that we are going to use to describe all the respective. And please, if you have any questions while I'm doing this just go ahead and ask them. This is the plan, this is our proposed plan, this rendering here. And what you'll notice is this rendered edge, this colorful edge here, it looks really thin, but there's a lot happening here. One is that we plan to renovate the store and protect this eroding slope, in these areas in particular, like here in the winter house, and here by the bluff. Another thing we want to do is renovate and restore this insufficient marsh land that has occurred right here, and what we call the cove. So it's these three areas that are of particular importance, and we plan to do this by implementing the living shoreline, but with that shoreline, we're also proposing a boardwalk on that edge, and what's most beautiful to us is that this is an example of what we call infrastructure and design. So it's not just design for design-sake, it's where you use infrastructure as the basis for design. So form follows function, but it follows it thoughtfully and beautifully, and makes a statement. So by that I mean, when we take this boardwalk, we're actually using it in these two particular areas, where we are going to attach a sill to the boardwalk discreetly, so you don't even see it. And that's what's going to hold the living shoreline in place in these two particular areas. Here, we have the opportunity to do a stone sill, and that's where we'll put the oyster spat on top because we're trying to restore the cove area, which is a bit of a marshland already. One thing to note, if you see in your books there's a dashed line area and that dashed line indicates the approximate shoreline in 1937. That's on the survey page as we know it now. So the actual shoreline, originally, was out here. But now, it's eroding away here. I'll go into these three particular areas, the Winter House section, this Cove section, and the bluff. This is very important, these section drawings here. The before and after pictures are great, they're beautiful and they really tell the picture, but these technical joints here, are very important, because what you notice here is an existing condition of this slope. It's almost 1.5:1, that's like this. And you notice that these buildings are sitting on that slope like this, so they are very close to that slope edge, and we're proposing here, by putting this sill attached to the boardwalk, is going to hold back this living shoreline and allow us to grade the slope into a 2:1 slope, which is in the plan. That's by code you can plan a 2:1 slope without a problem. So you can see the big change between that eroding shoreline and that proposed slope. And here's a before and after. Here's the Winter House, and you can see how close it is to that slope and how we're losing ground here, and here's the proposal for the boardwalk in place, and



the living shoreline, and the destroyed slope edge." W. Savage, "To add to Eugene's thing real quick, and I'm not meaning to interrupt, but on those slopes, and specifically where the buildings are at, we have actually had a geotechnical firm and geotechnical professionals come in and conduct borings in those locations, we've actually installed some helical piles on those two buildings specifically because of their location to the slope, and with those helical piles, along with the regrading of the slope, we're creating a stable slope. We've gone through a slope stability analysis, and currently, the existing slope is not stable, it's a danger, and it possibly could let the buildings fall in, so in that particular area, we're actually saving buildings, and creating a positive slope." F. Westbrook, "I have a quick question if I may." W. Savage, "Sure." F. Westbrook, "Would the living shoreline and the sill and the thing that you are proposing to prepare, by any chance are you working with VIMS on that?" W. Savage, "Yes, VIMS is actually a part of this project. They have actually reviewed, commented, provided us their professional opinion based on their science, and we've actually responded to those and implemented what we could to the project and we have heard no further objections. So, they've had a site visit with them actually on site as well." W. Savage, "Along with SEAS as well, SEAS is another nonprofit organization, Mike Vanlandingham, some of you may or may not know him, he is a professional who has worked with living shorelines as long as it's been around, and he also provided his comments as well, which we did address, so we've got multiple different agencies that we've been working this angle to make sure that everything is right where it needs to be." F. Westbrook, "Thank you." W. Savage, "Yes ma'am." E. Young, "Here, this is the Cove area that we have been talking about. Here's what we called, this very little section, it is a very little diminished and impaired marsh area, and so in this, you can see from the section, there's a lot of invasive species here. We propose that we remove those invasive species, and if here, we put a rock sill with oyster spat, so we're creating an oyster habitat on top of that rock sill to establish a sill that will create this new extended marsh land here, as you can see in the perspective. And lastly, we have... this is really, this is the bluff. It's occurring in different places along the tidal creeks, and it's extreme erosional processes. And so a lot of it is not only eroding away but the trees and stuff fall. So what's really beautiful about this particular bluff at the Tides Inn, is really interesting, there's a grove of Chestnut Oaks, which is what you'd typically find in the Piedmont, you don't typically find it in the Coastal Plain out here. So this is like, it's a climatic species of tree, very special, but they're starting to fall into the water. So, here the proposal is to actually put a sill right up on the edge so we get that 2:1 slope here, but what we're proposing, and thankfully the Tides are actually going to go along with it, it actually putting the living shoreline on the outside of that sill, rather than on the inside which likely on the Winter House, and the Cove. So that's pretty unique, here's an after picture." W. Savage, "The purpose of extending all that out is, like Eugene had mentioned those Chestnut Oaks, we're trying to preserve as much of the upland vegetation as we can, within reason. There's certainly going to be some trees removed, and some bank stabilization done, some trees are falling in the water that we have to remove, but ideally, we're trying to save the majority of that Chestnut Oak, and we're trying to create a natural environment, especially at the Cove to almost create a nature trail and something that people can enjoy, a different experience there. And we're planting wetland species, living shoreline species, upland species, such as new trees." E. Young, "There's 10,000 plus proposed shoreline plans, and there's 18,000 square feet of proposed living



shoreline, where now there's none. So, I think for us, what's most exciting is that obviously, environmentally, we know the benefits of this, but we are thinking about it from a cultural perspective as well, because there's an opportunity here as Brian had alluded to, that this is not a private endeavor. We understand that most of the properties in the estuaries and creeks, out into the river, and even the Bay, 85% are privately owned land. So the opportunity for the public to actually come here, and public outreach. And we were just listening to the Irvington Business Association got that tourism grant, so all of a sudden people are allowed to come here, and the public outreach for schools, clubs, classes, they can come and explore and understand what is happening to this shore, especially in estuaries. It's a very critical, in our universe, landscape pathology that we're losing, it's like an endangered species. And it's very important for us, and hopefully for you, to restore this important environment." B. Muskinski, "We really see this as the future of hospitality, and as Eugene mentioned, that combination of infrastructure and design. And I forgot to mention Jason Trollop, who many of you guys have met, our new managing director at the Tides. Let us mention that education for us is big. We want to have programming, we want to teach people about oysters, we want to teach people about how to grow oysters, how oysters help clean the water. We know that the Rappahannock is an area where you can't come and get oysters because of some of the environmental concerns, and so we're excited to do that. I wanted to introduce Brian Hoffman, from the Friends of the Rappahannock to talk a little bit about natural shorelines." B. Hoffman, "Thank you for having me tonight, Brian Hoffman, Deputy Director with Friends of the Rappahannock. We're a nonprofit organization that works to protect and restore the Rappahannock River from the Blue Ridge Mountains down to the Chesapeake Bay, and in interest of respecting your time I'll be brief. We've invested over \$100,000 in Carter's Creek and this area over the last several years in an effort to clean the creek, increase the water quality and beautify it, to help better grow oysters, to help keep the water clear for Rockfish, Crabs, and other juvenile fish species that we all love. Living shorelines, since 2015, Delegate Hodges pushed through some legislation to make it the preferred alternative for shoreline stabilization throughout the Commonwealth. In 2019, we worked with the Northern Neck and Middle Peninsula planning districts, as well as many other partners across the state, to develop a Watershed Implementation Plan for the entire Chesapeake Bay portion of Virginia. This outlines all of the different types of projects that we have to go through to install by 2025, to meet out water quality goals which are mandated by the federal government and EPA. In the Rappahannock River Basin alone, over 150,000 linear feet of shoreline has to be stabilized using living shorelines. 150 acres of oyster reef has to be restored, and 4.8 million trees need to be planted, among about 80 other practices and projects that have to happen. This project is one of those that will help meet those goals. Here in the Northern Neck and Lancaster County, we installed and monitor many living shorelines throughout the lower Rappahannock River. We partnered with Northern Neck Planning Commission to run a cautionary program for living shorelines, and we continue to write grants to help bring money locally here to put in the hands of contractors like Bay Design and some other people who actually install the projects. We bring students out to these projects beforehand and show them the problem. They actually get their hands in the mud, helping us install the projects, and then they're out there taking water samples and other things. Most recently we've done some work with Chesapeake Academy, building an plant garden on their property. We're real excited about these types of projects. We have a clean



Carter's Creek initiative where we're going to be offering free trees to anyone who lives in this area, because we value the creek so much. We're doing disaster relief with other landowners in Lancaster County who suffered due to the hurricane and tornado, so we're really excited for this opportunity to be involved in the education and the installation of the project. I can answer any questions now or in the future if anybody has them. Thank you for your time." W. Savage, "Thank you Brian. So, we're asking for your guys help. You helped us last year with the conditional use permit for the floating dock in front of Fishhawk, so we could welcome guests and essentially run a restaurant without a parking lot. We appreciated your guys help last year, and as you know, we're staying open this year for much longer than we have in the past, we're staying open through the end of January, and we have a pretty short window to execute this project. So, we appreciate your help and can answer any questions that you guys have. And I'll just add, Lara has a copy of these in full size, I'm sure you guys won't receive them in full size, so I'm willing to leave these with you, maybe if you want to share them as a council, be able to look at it and then pass them along day by day. I'll leave them up here so if you guys want them, you're more than welcome to have them. Other than that I think we'll take questions if you have any," Mayor Bugg, "Any questions council?" W. Nunnally, "Good luck." Mayor Bugg, "Well thank you. Wonderful presentation, this has been very exciting. Thank you."

Mayor Bugg, "For the record it is 7:40 p.m. Jackie Brown has left the building. I just wanted that to be on the record and now we will proceed with the remaining items."

Mayor Bugg, "The next item will be item #6, first reading of Ordinance 2020-011 Repeal, Reenact Town Code §154.106." B. Schaschek, "Are we going to talk about any of these." Mayor Bugg, "These will be talked about at the January meeting," B. Schaschek, "I was just wondering because the last item says rezone from R1 to B1 or B2, when do we discuss whether it is going to be a B1 or B2 because this is very confusing." Mayor Bugg, "Every one is having it's first reading." B.Schaschek, "We're having a first reading of something that hasn't even been passed on to the Town Council yet." S. Phillips, "Ordinance 2020-11: Repeal/Reenact Town Code §154.106, Use regulations in B2 zoning. Whereas the Town Council proposes to repeal and reenact Town Code §154.106 regarding B2 Zoning District regulations. And whereas, this ordinance, 2020-11, will create a new sub-section in K. in Town Code §154.106, allowing Pilates, yoga, music, or art studio in the B2 Zoning District. Whereas a notice of public hearing on this ordinance 2020-11 was advertised on November 25, 2020 and December 3, 2020, pursuant to Virginia Code Annotated Section 15.2-2506. And whereas, a public hearing on Ordinance 2020-11, was held on December 10, 2020, and the public also had the opportunity to speak about the ordinance at its meetings held December 10, 2020 and January 14, 2021. Whereas this ordinance, 2020-11, was read twice before approval at the December 10, 2020 and January 14, 2021 Council meetings. Be it enacted and ordained by the Town of Irvington, Virginia as follows: Council hereby repeals Town Code §154.106: Use regulation. 2. Council hereby reenacts Town Code §154.106: Use regulation as follows §154.106: Use regulation. In limited district B2, structures to be erected not to exceed 1,500 square feet of floor area, first and second floor total, can be used for one or more of the following uses with the Conditional Use Permit: a. Town Office and other similar public uses, b. Bed and Breakfast Establishments, c. Office Buildings, d. Professional Offices, e. Antique Shops and Galleries, f. Catering, g. Bakeries, h. Florist Shops, i. Barber Shops and Beauty Shops, j. Hobby and Craft Shops, k. Pilates, Yoga, Music, and Art Studios. 3. This ordinance is effective upon passage." N. Keane, "You probably want to get Sharon to read the beginning of the other alternate, just so it's clear that we have it." F. Westbrook, "It has just occurred to me, like Bonnie's point a moment ago if we have questions or concerns or issues with any of these that were just read, wouldn't we rather have that happen now as opposed to waiting till January to find out that you may have a bugaboo or something." Mayor Bugg, "Sure, yeah." B. Schaschek, "So let me ask you this. Is the Planning Commission going to meet and discuss these? Or are they just going to meet and just approve it and pass it on?" W. Nunnally, "I told you they were going to discuss it, I asked about that." B. Schaschek, "Oh you did?" T. Chapman, "We proposed to discuss that at our next meeting." F. Westbrook, "When is your next meeting?" L. Brown, "January 12th." B. Schaschek, "Can public come and speak on it as well?" T. Chapman, "Yeah, I don't see why we can't add that on the agenda." L. Brown, "They'll have a discussion before they vote on it." T. Chapman, "I'll make a note that we're going to have public comment on there." B. Schaschek, "And that'll be at 6:30? Usual time?" L. Brown, "Yes, 6:30 on the 12th, not sure where we'll be." W. Nunnally, "We'll be in the safest place around right now, with \$3,300 worth of COVID cleaning." T. Chapman, "I'll make sure that there's a public discussion on there." B. Schaschek, "I don't want it to go to the Planning Commission and come back to the Town Council, thinking that we're going to have a second reading when there's still some issues to talk about." L. Brown, "So Planning Commission will have a discussion, and they'll have a vote, and then they



have to make the recommendation to the Town Council. And then you'll either accept the recommendation or add conditions."

S. Phillips, "Proposed Ordinance 2020-11, Repeal, Reenact Town Code Section 154086: Use regulations in B1 Zoning District. Whereas the Irvington Town Council proposes to repeal and reenact Town Code Section 154086, regarding B1 zoning district use regulations. So, I once again am making a motion that I be included on all meetings with staff, legal and/or the mayor for whatever reason the staff meetings come up." W. Nunnally, "Second." S. Phillips, "Wait a minute, did you say legal? Can you state your



motion again?" F. Westbrook, "I move that I be included in all meetings with staff, legal and/or mayor, for whatever reason." N. Keane, "That would be every day." F. Westbrook, "Well then I can have the option, but I'm talking about staff meetings." Mayor Bugg, "You want to be included in every staff meeting then, is that what you're asking?" F. Westbrook, "Yep." Westbrook, "As long as its going to happen I don't care who does it, I'd just like to see it done. And you all can figure out how." S. Phillips, "Well, if I might make a suggestion, you might have the mayor and vice-mayor do that." F. Westbrook, "I want to be involved when these meetings are happening between the mayor and staff. And that usually happens, for instance, when you all get together and talk about the upcoming meeting, planning all of that, and making the agenda. That's the example." A. They would like to start this construction in January so they can get done the shore line part so they can start their plantings in the March/April timeframe. Brown, "When the planning commission hears the exemption for the passive recreation trails they hear that it does not get recommended to the town council. It is just formality. It is how it is in our code." F. Westbrook, "This sounds like a lot." L. Brown, "The schedule that starts. I want to run the CUP that was tabled for Mr. Smith, I would like to add that to this schedule. We may as well add them together." W. 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

After the last town council meeting when there were some discussions about the financial state, I would like to recommend on by myself and on behalf of the IVBA that we pursue an independent audit. It was disconcerting and so, would just strongly like to recommend that we proceed in that direction.

Mayor Bugg; Thank you, anyone else who would like to speak from the public during the public comments sessions? Yes sir. Mr. Kuper.

G. Kuper: George Kuper. Mayor, Council, I'm confused as to the agenda, I thought this was an information session due to the development and plans for North Commons.

Mayor Bugg: We do not typically engage the public during this section. That is next. Anyone else from the public?

D. PUBLIC HEARING

1. Development of the North Commons

Mayor Bugg: With that we will now move to Item D which is the public hearing, Development of North Commons. I promise to hold a meeting to allow the public to comment on development of the North Commons. At a prior meeting council voted to proceed with the North Commons as a site for the new office. Staff has looked at various expenses that could be incurred in preparation for this development using COVID CARES funds. That is the purpose of this meeting. The zoning administrator will report on this later in the agenda. How many speakers do we have? Two. Okay. Not a high number but please just limit your comments to this topic, that would be appreciated, so who would like to start? You just spoke we'll give it to you.

G. Kuper: To the point of order, I don't know what I'm gonna ask until I hear the plans. George Kuper, Haydon Hall.

Mayor Bugg, Thank you.

W. Nunnally: I think we'd all like to hear the plans.



C. Braly: Chris Braly, 298 Chesapeake Drive. First I'd like to say that I am in favor and agreement with the Town pursuing options to get a new town hall. The existing town hall is not adequate in my opinion for what the town needs, so I applaud the town for moving in that direction. Specifically, regarding the development of North Commons as a bordering adjacent property owner I have a vested interest in the development of the North Commons, and I am in, I have no objections whatsoever of the town developing that area for an office. It makes sense location wise being in the center of town next to the commons, so from the location standpoint it makes perfect sense. What I am concerned about is what happens to event parking of the town develops that lot for the town hall. It is currently used for Farmers Market parking, the 4th of July concert parking, the 4th of July parade parking, etc., and if the town develops that lot and puts a building on it, I just want to make sure that no one forgets about event parking. One day we will have events again and if that lot is taken up with a septic drain field and a building and some parking for those who need to go to the town hall, I'm afraid that event parking will be sacrificed and they'll end up parking on Chesapeake Drive which is difficult to navigate when there is no one on the side of the street but, so as the planning goes on, please think of event parking while you are considering options and making your decisions.

Mayor Bugg: Thank you. Yes, Ms. Bradley.

C. Bradley: Mary Cay Bradley, President of Steamboat Era Museum, again, I am speaking on behalf of the museum. We had a board meeting last night and I was able to raise this with the board very quickly because of course as Mr. Kuper said we don't really know ya'll are planning, but I just want to let you know that the Steamboat Era Museum Board of Directors is in full support of the town developing the North Commons in whatever way is necessary to keep the needs of the town. We are not as direct a neighbor as Mr. Braly, but we are still in the same vicinity, so we just want you all to know that we do support the town making sure that we have the facilities that we need to do the business of the town. Thank you.

Mayor Bugg: Anyone else from the public? Yes Mr. Schaschek

K. Schaschek: Basically I am favor to have come in the town office at the North Commons, however before any decisions are made, we need formal information to be presented to the public, the people showing up today should not be the arbiter since the attendance is largely amplified COVID. I suggest you prepare a presentation of all different options with some basic plans, cost benefits, financing, and impact our local taxes, etc. This presentation should be announced well beyond the current ways of communication and help to the end of the pandemic and its regulations. After all what's incorporated in the plans have a copy to find out everything. Thank you.

Mayor Bugg: Thank you. Anyone else from the public? In taking a look at the agenda, I think it would make sense to consider a motion to move my Mayor report to after the report of the zoning administration since your topics pertain to this, so if you are okay with that, I'd like to have someone make that motion.

D. Patteson: So moved.



F. Westbrook: Second.

THE MOTION TO MOVE MY MAYOR REPORT TO AFTER THE REPORT OF THE ZONING ADMINISTRATION IS PASSED 5-0

Mayor Bugg: Excellent, I will move this to after Mrs. Brown's zoning report. Thank you.

E. REPORT FROM THE ZONING ADMINISTRATOR – L. Brown

L. Brown: Just a reminder On October 15, 2020, a motion was passed designating town staff to research some figures relating to the development of North Commons, the future town office building. I just want to give a brief overview of the former town office, where we are currently, and where we may go in the future. Just a little background information, the former town office which is now under contract was 520 square feet. It was not ADA Compliant; the septic had a limited rating. The possibility of adding on was considered and determined not viable. It does not meet the social distancing guidelines currently for COVID and a motion was passed on 10/15 to list the town office for sale. Presently the town office is located at 4203 Irvington Road, we moved in October 1st, 2020. The Town entered a 2year rental agreement with an option to renew for 1 year. Our 2-year rental period expires October 2022, if we opt for a third year that will expire October 2023. Our monthly rent is \$1,500 with annual increases. The current space meets the needs of the zoning and land use department and the town clerk and treasurer. The current space is suitable to receive residents. The current space is suitable for our committee meetings and staff meetings as needed. However, the space is not suitable for meetings like this. What is the future of our town hall or office building/community hall, whatever we decide to call it. We have 23 to 25 months to decide on the next steps. The North Commons was purchased on October 28th, 2009. The North Commons is comprised of two parcels totaling 3.2 acres. Our current comprehensive plan mentions discussions of a better situation for a town hall, but no definite plans were mentioned or are they in place. A new town hall has been in the last two budgets. A motion was passed on October 15th, designating North Commons as the location for our new town office. The following figures are estimates from various vendors and their necessary scopes of work in order to get to the process of putting in a new town hall on those parcels. Surveying and engineering services at approximately \$31,000. A master site plan of approximately \$12,500. Septic installation \$25,000 to \$32,000. And then we looked at two options for the actual building: a factory-built building or a stickbuilt building. Same square footage on both, roughly 2,700 square feet, that would comprise office space as well as a space similar to this room to have our town meetings. So roughly 2,700 square feet of factory-built office would run approximately \$435,000 and a stick-built office would run approximately \$586,000. Then you need to have a parking lot as Mr. Bralv mentioned. You need some lighting in the parking lot and some landscaping, \$95,000 to \$120,000 depending on how wild and crazy you would like to get with lighting and landscaping, hardscaping, gravel versus asphalt and so forth.



Then technology and AV needs within the building. Again, depending on how crazy you get with outfitting the building with technology needs an estimate of approximately \$35,000 was used. I do not have designs to show you, I do know have blueprints, we are not at that point yet, but these are just some basic figures so you know as far as budgeting purposes for the future what all a project like this would cost. Any questions.

Mayor Bugg: Council any questions? Thank you, thank you for putting all of this together and all of your work in regards to all of this. That will bring me to my Mayor's report.

F. REPORT FROM THE MAYOR - Mayor Bugg

Mayor Bugg: Regarding the allegations made by Klaus Schaschek at the last meeting I asked the town attorney to review these serious allegations of misappropriation of checks and several other financial and contract issues. I have seen nothing to date that supports the statements made on December 10th. Based on what I have seen these allegations are unfounded and close to reckless against the town and its officers. We must obtain an independent financial audit to address this. No action should be taken tonight except to authorize an independent audit. Now I will read a statement from Anthony Marchetti who could not be here tonight. 'My fellow council members, I apologize for not being able to attend tonight's meeting. I have a lot to say and I'm sorry I won't have the chance to voice my thoughts in person at this meeting. However, I will make sure my voice is heard through all means possible until the next meeting. I was upset at the accusations and allegations brought forth by a resident at the December 10th meeting. The statement made some bold claims that challenged the professional integrity of both the town and its staff. His implications will have an impact whether they are true or not and have already proven costly to the town. As of today, December 17th I have yet to see any supporting documentation or evidence to support any of the resident's claims. I have only seen evidence to refute them. I encourage citizens and council members to speak freely and demand transparency, however it seems reckless to bring forth such claims without evidence to substantiate them. Decisions should be made on facts not hearsay. There is a process in place for a reason so that both sides have the opportunity to present and defend their case. Let the facts speak and the actions determine then and only then. I support as I have abdicated for previously, an independent, neutral third-party audit by a licensed CPA with municipal audit experience so that the facts are revealed, and the town can be confident in making the future decisions based on the audited financials. I am frustrated and disappointed at the continued lack of communication by members on the council and the unwillingness to address the problems and find solutions through the proper channels. Our Vice Mayor makes a motion at the last meeting to be included in meetings and communications yet has not extended the same courtesy to me. There has been an incredible lack of communication regarding the budget and finance issues and now this personnel issue. Practice what you preach otherwise the request for transparency and communication always seems to be somewhat self-serving. I have emailed and called my fellow council members asking for transparency and communication to no avail. I see the four signatures requesting a closed session meeting regarding personnel matters. You of course have the right to call a meeting anytime you so choose. However, if you truly had the Town of Irvington's best interest at hand you would first, talk with the head of HR Committee, Dudley Patteson, and request a discussion and meeting through the proper channels and B, provide some context to the nature of the request so that fellow council members could prepare for the discussion. Yet the head of the HR



Committee and myself still have no idea as to the reason behind the meeting. In addition to not following protocol, it is outright disrespectful to suggest alternative motives. You clearly have no interest in working together as is evident by the lack of communication and veil of secrecy behind which you operate. My personal opinion is that the personnel issue is not a performance issue at all as would be suggested by the fact no formal or written performance issue has been reported about any current staff. I have prophesized that the underlying issue is that the personnel is actually doing the job they were hired to do and protecting the integrity of the Town. Personally, I am grateful for such checks and balances otherwise things like a short-term rental ordinance would have moved forward without the input or knowledge of those tasked to prep it. Mr. Mayor I would like to encourage during the discussion of any motion tonight, that each of the council member explain how the motion and their vote to support or reject it has the Town of Irvington's best interest behind it. We were all elected to serve the town, so I think it is only fair to the residents for their council to go on record and explain how their vote serves the town best. Casting a vote is easy, but it comes with accountability. Anthony Marchetti, December 17, 2020'. I will now allow Dudley Patteson to make a statement during this time.

D. Patteson: Mr. Mayor, members of council, all those in attendance, I am addressing you as Chair of the Human Resources Committee of the Town Council and as a council order as well. We were elected to represent the residents of our town and to work together to accomplish goals and objectives that make this town better. This is not being done. We are not a team, in fact a group of four council members are continually doing everything possible to prevent council from doing its job. Three of us consider that they are wasting our time when we have so much more, we can be doing to improve the Town of Irvington. What I'm about to say is addressed to those that live in our town and it's all about the four members of council I call the group of four. Let me begin by saying that I truly regret speaking out about my fellow council members. However, events have taken place that are clearly unacceptable, and I cannot be quiet any longer. Back in the spring of this year I announced that I was interested in serving on town council. The Town was not pursuing the mandates of its comprehensive plan and the group of council members have an anti-tourism agenda in which I did not approve, and the business of the town was conducted in the most unorthodox way that I felt changes were needed. An election was held, it was clear by the votes for me, Mr. Marchetti and Mayor Bugg that the residents wanted change as well. Tonight, I'm sorry to report certain members of town council did not get that message and shenanigans continued. I have four examples of what I consider improper behavior on the part of these four. Example number one, I serve as chair of a two-member human resource committee along with Mayor Bugg. I pass on to you for you to read, right here somewhere, right in front of me, I pass on to you a notice to town council, Chris would you pass these out, this is what you will see what was released from our members of council. It was a notice for an agenda item to be added to a closed session at the end of tonight's meeting involving an HR matter. It was signed by these four members of town council. Not one of them followed proper protocol to notify the Human Resources Committee. We still do not know the nature of this agenda. As I do now and many times, I ask you, are they acting in the best interest of the town? Example number two, at a town council meeting earlier this year I asked the members of Council and the public to bring all HR matters to me as chair of human resources and that matters regarding staff should not be addressed in public. Last Thursday a resident made outrageous allegations about our staff and our town, last Thursday's diatribe was an embarrassment, this is the most common word used by the public to describe his undocumented claims of misappropriation and other matters. The representations of our staff were impugned by him. Can you imagine how they feel? These claims



were delivered but I suspect very clearly that others in this room were also aware that he was going to speak and were aware of the nature of his comments. Back to the HR issue. There is not one written complaint in the files of these folks on our staff that anyone has brought anything but praise about them. In fact, HR considers their performance to be excellent. They are dedicated to this town. Dedicated to this town and put more hours in that are called for. To call for this tonight, a closed session on a personnel matter cannot be on performance as it was said. Example three, I wish to point out the failure of the chair of the budget and finance committee to include other members of it many budget and finance discussions. Anthony Marchetti was elected to be your voice in town matters and a town council member chooses to exclude him and emails and request to meet. Is this behavior in the best interest of the town? Example number four, STR, Short Term Rental Committee, a member of council was appointed to head it. As a citizen I volunteered to serve because I was not opposed to STRs, but the Tides and the Hope and Glory are historically the two contributors of the lodging tax wanted to make sure that there was a level playing field for all. It's not that we were against it, we just wanted to participate and make it fair. All of us were asked with tasks of making contact with a number of municipalities of similar size to determine their requirements and regulations. My research included Chincoteague, Hancock, Cape Charles, all of us provided this information to the committee chair and we never saw the research again. In fact, there was no subsequent meeting and I heard that this council member and another had then crafted a proposal set of regulations on their own. We have yet to see their product or weigh in on it. Again, are they acting in the best interest of our town? In sum, these four members have chosen to ignore process, proper procedure and challenge and the result is our town is not better for it. They methods have been divisive and disrespectful to our staff, members of council and more important to those who live here. Our town deserves better. The town has so much potential, we need to come together and I ask that all of us in the future be transparent, work together. The citizens of Irvington need to make their elected accountable. Thank you very much.

Mayor Bugg: Thank you Mr. Patteson. Next, we'll move on to old business.

G. OLD BUSINESS

1. Motion to appropriate FY20/21 general operating funds – F. Westbrook

Mayor Bugg: First item on the agenda is to appropriate FY20/21 general operating funds. Mrs. Westbrook, I believe you had something to say about this.

F. Westbrook: Yes I just ask that we table that until after our closed session discussion please.

Mayor Bugg, Any cons about that council? Would someone like to make a motion in that regard.

W. Nunnally: I'll move to table it until after the meeting.

D. Patteson: Second.

Mayor Bugg: Any further discussion. All in favor and all opposed.

Mayor Bugg: We will move that until after closed session. Next item again to you Mrs. Westbrook will be discussion on the purchase of tablets and related infrastructure costs using CRF and a possible motion to appropriate in regard to that.

2. Discuss purchase of tablets and related infrastructure costs using CRF; possible motion to appropriate; F. Westbrook

F. Westbrook: You've got some documents in front of you which I think we've all seen, at least the one from Mill Creek Geek form the first time so, I guess we don't know what we are going to do with the, there's a lot of money here. We are looking at the purchase of tablets that are roughly \$400 each, we are looking at setup, if we are looking at 15 tablets that's \$284 each, and then for support we are looking at \$680 each and that is based on 15 tablets, so I guess the bottom line question is do we want to spend \$1,300/\$1,400 each just for tablets and we would use these tablets in lieu of the reams of paper we get for meetings.

Mayor Bugg: Yeah, this evening doesn't look so bad but for those who could make it to the last meeting it was about a ream that we each had so a bunch a trees went down for that.

B. Schaschek: I have a question, how would we do this, would we turn the laptops or the tablets in after every meeting would it be downloaded, would it be our responsibility to download it, how exactly do you envision this working.

Mayor Bugg: We'll take comments from staff, yes.

- S. Phillips: The proposal that our IT provider has presented to you is a breakdown of the purchase of tablets not only for six members of council, one mayor, but including seven members of the planning commission. That tablet depending on the device you choose obviously your town based Gmail account, town-based email account, that's how you would receive your documents. You would always access them through your email account, and you could be able to open any documents from email.
- B. Schaschek: So you wouldn't be downloading them, you'd be.
- S. Phillips: You'd access it through your email and so you would, you can download it, it has memory. Correct. You would be able to conduct, you would be able to have a camera, it would have audio. So should someone need to attend remotely that would be an option. Council had asked for solutions to in person meetings. Council had asked for solutions to be more environmentally friendly. To be cost effective. Again, this was provided in response to the request from Council. You will also see two separate proposals, one for the purchase of the physical tablets and the second proposal is a proposal



for his services. I believe he suggests about 5 hours per tablet to set them up, once those tablets are set up obviously each member of council depending on their technology ability would have to be trained. So, it's not a definitive price, it just depends on again the user's ability, the end user's ability and I did hear a question earlier in the meeting as to why there was an end date on this. The end date is June 30th for the services provided, not necessarily for the physical structure itself but for the services provided because this would be using CARES Relief Funds and those have to, they can only go through June 30th.

F. Westbrook: So is the end date 2020 or 2021.

S. Phillips: 2020.

F. Westbrook: That's already happened.

S. Phillips: 2021.

B. Schaschek: So have they extended the use of the COVID funds for.

S. Phillips: We would have to appropriate this now.

B. Schaschek: We would have to appropriate now.

- S. Phillips: Yes, to pay him now, that is why the proposal for services provided was a challenge because obviously there is no way to know, again the installation and the setup is fairly cut and dry, but it is the services to each end user where there may be some variable.
- F. Westbrook: Then the figure for \$10,300 is for support and town council staff that goes through June 30th.
- S. Phillips, Correct.
- F. Westbrook: Alright, so then that's just 6 months, so then for the following year, are we going to be looking at double that money just for our support.
- S. Phillips: I would suspect, no I would not think it would be a double figure because by that time you will have, you will not incur the setup fee.
- F. Westbrook: The \$10,00 is not for setup, it's for support, ongoing support is what it looks like, onsite and remote and.
- S. Phillips: I think the figure is a bit high, again it's all based on an estimate depending on end user availability, depending on connectivity, making sure that the end user has connectivity wherever the end user is. If they are in their office, if they are in their home, depending on the type of internet that



end user may have. Again, I think there is quite a bit of variable in this proposal because Council would have to determine if this purchase is for council only or planning commission. So again, it is a scale, the decision is councils to make.

F. Westbrook: Do you know if any of us had an issue would we call Mill Creek Geek directly ourself or would we go through the town office.

S. Phillips: I think that, so in fairness I think that this, there is quite a bit to be decided. This proposal is for the purchase of the product and the delivery of the service. I think that in the interim council would have to establish policies and procedures because you must also account for transition of council and commission. So, I suspect that there would be transitional fees there when you have a change of council or commission.

F. Westbrook: Gotcha, thank you.

Mayor Bugg: Anyone else?

D. Patteson, Is this COVID, only for the COVID period or are we going to use this in the future, or.

F. Westbrook: I think it is ongoing, yeah.

Dudley Patteson: Okay.

S. Phillips: You would use the CARES Funds, but you would have these indefinitely. Now the budget and finance committee will have to, when the budget and finance committee takes into consideration the proposed budget starting July 1, that proposed budget would have to have a cost not covered by CARES for the maintenance of the product, of the tablets. Now council would need to understand that you would use your tablet for your meetings and so staff would not print that ream of paper.

F. Westbrook: Which is the big point of all this.

Mayor Bugg, Yeah, I mean that's.

W. Nunnally: That's a lot of paper for \$16,000.

Mayor Bugg: True.

F. Westbrook: Yeah, but it's my money when I'm printing.

Mayor Bugg: Bonnie.

B. Schaschek: I'm struggling here, and the reason I'm struggling is that this is a tablet. The amount of data that we are downloading from Google for these meetings is horrendous so depending upon, and I



even have a problem with my Windows 10, I can't, I have a tablet right now, but I have to take it, break it up into pieces in order to take and put it on there so I'm a little concerned about the size of it because we have one giant PDF, I'm concerned about the downloading. Today even going into Windows 10 I don't know how long it takes you, but it takes a good half an hour to get all that stuff down and the size of it going to a tablet I'm a little concerned with unless we can sort of break it up into pieces. Those are huge files.

F. Westbrook: What we used to get.

Bonnie Schaschek: I have a Windows Surface of Microsoft which is the top of the line and I have to break it up in order to take and send the files to that in order to take and use it, so that's why I'm just struggling here with the size of these files and on a tablet. I don't know if anyone else has tried doing it with their current tablets. You use your regular.

D. Patteson: I use the regular.

B. Schaschek: I use the regular too, and then then break it into pieces to my tablet, so that's why I'm struggling. Those are huge files.

F. Westbrook: I have a desktop also and I would say that I do have issues with downloading one big continuous file as opposed to you know four or five smaller ones that we used to get. Maybe that would be part of the solution if we went to tablets.

W. Nunnally: Has this been committee discussed at all. This is the first time I'm hearing about this. Was it discussed anywhere else?

Mayor Bugg: We mentioned it at the last meeting that we were going to roll our sleeves up kinda the first time to see what we want to do.

S. Phillips: I think it has been discussed in workshops:

Mayor Bugg, Yeah, proposals though, fairly new.

F. Westbrook: At the last meeting if you remember I was talking about some of the packets we were getting.

W. Nunnally: I didn't see any proposals. Is this the only one we've had?

Mayor Bugg: I believe it is, is the first one.

S. Phillips: So it is one proposal, but you will see three different tiers. Fran, you said you were going to get a proposal, did you.



F. Westbrook: No. Do you remember at the last meeting I said there were so many variables to consider that I was not able to really in that short amount of time that I spoke to you about before the meeting to get this kind of information together, with any real confidence, so.

Mayor Bugg: Is this something we want?

J. Brown: Is the main purpose to have zoom meetings or to hold the data in one place, what is the main purpose?

Mayor Bugg,: Multiple, multiple purposes.

S. Phillips: Given the concerns from council which were voiced fairly consistently the purpose of the proposal that is sitting in front of you is A, to have zoom meetings, or whatever interface, but also to alleviate printed materials.

J. Brown: To alleviate what?

S. Phillips: Printed materials.

Mayor Bugg: Printed materials.

F. Westbrook: So we would be able to conduct zoom meetings with this, if we had.

S. Phillips: It would have a camera and it would have audio.

B. Schaschek, Depending upon which option we choose, or do they all have it.

S. Phillips: I made it clear to them that the purpose was to conduct online zoom or other online meeting platform.

Mayor Bugg: This takes care of the paper and the paper issue.

W. Nunnally: I'm not sure it would be prudent, that's the first thing I have to say about it, and the second thing I have to say about it is I would like to at least see these bids and proposals before giving it to council in the spirit of cooperation. So, if that's where we are at, I'm against the purchase. I will vote no.

Mayor Bugg,: Understood. Anyone else anything further to say.

F. Westbrook: I do hate making a decision in a hurry and I know that it is off of COVID funds and what have you, I think it is an excellent idea to do this, I'm just not so sure that this is the deal we should do.



W. Nunnally: I agree, excuse me Fran, I just think there are other reasons, and other options, technology, we should be able to do that at less cost.

Mayor Bugg: Well will there be a motion to table this or.

W. Nunnally: I want to table it until we get all the information we need to vote intelligently.

Mayor Bugg: Any further discussion. All in favor.

B. Schaschek: Yes, I am sorry.

Mayor Bugg: Speak up.

B. Schaschek: I understand we are tabling and it is a fairly good idea and I think it is good that we table it and do a little bit of research. Is it possible that we could, I don't know how to say this, get a sample, and see what the downloads are, the times and what the equipment will and will not do. If we have a couple of different options here. Because I haven't used any of these tablets, so I'd just like to see it in action to see what kind of delay we have as well as how long is it going to take to download, are we going to be able to open the files. Because I can tell you right now on certain tablets you can't open them right now. So, I'd like to see it functional, just the download. I mean if Chris has one of these tablets, he could show us a download would work, I think that would be a good idea.

Mayor Bugg: Alright, thank you. Vote all in favor of tabling. Opposed. Mayor Bugg, Opposed. Tablets are tabled.

I would add to it two other points that the closed meetings associated with this agenda are totally inappropriate. As I read our ordinances meetings are open to the public except "when the public welfare requires executive meetings". I'm unaware that this agenda requires executive meeting agenda. 

1. Motion to adopt CUP schedule - L. Brown, Zoning Administrator

Mayor Bugg, "We have the Cup Schedule." S. Phillips, "Alright members of Council I am going to pass out the, unless, it's for your convenience I'm passing out the proposed CUP schedule." Mayor Bugg, "Sharon I hate to cut you off, but before we get ahead, so we are all on the record, I just want to find out why you voted against the budget." Mayor Bugg, "I'm just inquiring while we're still kind of close to the budget why those members voted no to adopt that. I'm just curious." B. Schaschek, "There's a couple of reasons, number one is, I have a problem with the wealth management piece of it right now." Male, "Can't hear you." B. Schaschek, "I'm sorry, I have a problem with the wealth management piece of it right now. We never had the chance to discuss it in full, we don't know what it is that are going. There were several different proposals. We never determined which way we wanted to go. I think it is imperative that you know the Town does an audit of its own books and makes a decision on which way it should go. Which projects it wants before it starts bringing in somebody to arbitrarily decide what we should and shouldn't be doing and where the funds are coming from and reading some of that stuff they wanted to float bonds. We are not in



a position to float any bonds. That was the number one problem I had. The second problem I have is with the VCT Tourist Grant. I'm not going to go into the history of it, but the whole thing changed from when the initial application was put in. Now all of a sudden instead of the town being on the hook for \$10,000 it is now on the hook for \$25,000. We have never, we have asked at the last three meetings for an explanation on what it is that these people are going to be doing and how it's going to be done and how is it going to benefit the Town. To date we have gotten no information. Now we've spent money, but I would rather cut the losses now than to continue going forward, because we still don't know what they are giving us, and I see that there is an appropriation for Flackshack again and this is now going to be the fourth time we request information. I just think it is unconscionable that this is going forward, and we have no answers." Mayor Bugg, "And much of that would have been addressed last Thursday, they were going to be present with a fairly, really extensive PowerPoints but obviously that's going to have to wait so." B. Schaschek, "And one last issue I have with it is on the CARES Fund, had we gone ahead and done this budget and had all the special meetings we would not have been putting the CARES funds in the budget. Those CARES funds are not really operating costs of the Town. That is to cover any expenses that we had as a result of COVID-19. Not to aid in the budgeting and I don't think it should be used. I think we are moving too fast on using it for things like the new town hall and stuff like that without further investigating it, so. I have a problem with the COVID funds being there." Mayor Bugg, "That's why I asked, yes." F. Westbrook, "If I might, just a couple of statements, in regard to the Wealth Management Funds, or whatever you care to call it, just because it's in the budget does not mean that it, that we will spend it. It's there if we decide to go ahead with it, we have not had a vote, we have not had a discussion, but should we decide to go ahead, if it is not in the budget then we have no means of funding that project. So yes, we still will have that discussion. The other part, what was your last." F. Westbrook, "I had the VCT Grant." F. Westbrook, "Okay, I have no comment, I guess it was just the first thing. We will be discussing the, not the VTC Grant but the second thing that you spoke of." B. Schaschek, "Isn't that the VCT Grant." F. Westbrook, "We talked about three different things." N. Keane, "First was Wealth Management, I think second was VCT and third was Cares Fund." F. Westbrook, "CARES fund, thank you, thank you, and yes, we will be, well the packet you got with the application form pretty much tells us all that we need to know and doesn't need to come back to the Town Council for individual votes on the applicants because of the way the application is set up." B. Schaschek, "Which one are you talking about now?" F. Westbrook, "I'm talking about the CARES fund stuff. B. Schaschek, "I'm talking about the Virginia Tourists." F. Westbrook, "But you also mentioned the CARES fund." B. Schaschek, "I'm talking the COVID-19 the \$70,000 that is sitting in the budget." F. Westbrook, "Yes, that's the CARES Fund, the COVID CARES Act money and when it comes to, other than the funds that we have allocated to the application for resident businesses the rest will be decided upon on, on vote. We have not had the opportunity to vote or discuss that either, that would have been on our agenda last Thursday, so we will be talking and voting on that Thursday, so we will be talking and voting on that." Mayor Bugg, "Anything else to add." W. Nunnally, "I agree with everything everybody said but in addition I, the main thing is the real estate taxes are too high and it should not be that much." Phillips, "The terms of the contract are that the invoice is due a month, so December work they needed to." N. Keane, "The contract, didn't the Council authorized they mayor to sign the contract last month? Did you sign the contract?" Mayor Bugg, "Yeah, that was back." N. Keane, "Didn't we sign the contract?" Mayor Bugg, "Yeah, yeah." N. Keane, "So we have a contract with them." S. Phillips, "We are just meeting the terms of the contract." J. Brown, "I can't hear." S. Phillips, "We are just meeting the terms of the contract." F. Westbrook, "Okay you know I'm inclined to agree with Bonnie in that we anticipated they were going to come to us and answer some questions. I think what we're saying is that the contract stipulates payment in



advance of work. The next round of work is to be done in December, if that work is not done until January, we wouldn't owe it until a little bit later, so I would be inclined to agree with Bonnie and let's have them come in and at least talk to us as they were scheduled. We can get them rescheduled I think that would be a good idea." S. Phillips, "But the terms of their contract are, we are going to break the terms of the contract." F. Westbrook, "It says prior to the work being done is what I understand the lawyer, or legal saying." N. Keane, "I don't remember, I just want to make sure everybody realized this is a binding contact we've already signed." F. Westbrook, "Well then we are going to meet again tomorrow, can we find out about that and postpone this vote." S. Phillips, "No, because it's a public hearing." F. Westbrook, "Pardon." N. Keane, "It's not on the agenda." S. Phillips, "Tomorrow is just a public hearing, no action taken. F. Westbrook, "I still think that we need to hear from them. There are some questions out there and I understand about the contract but at this point we are not very clear on exactly when the payments are scheduled. To me, if it's not payable until before the work, if it's payable before the work is done, if the work hasn't been done yet then it is not payable. Mayor Bugg, "Adhere to the contract, do they intend to return in December." S. Phillips, "Yes, the only reason, they didn't fail the terms of their end of the contract, we canceled the meeting. So, because we're going to cancel the meeting, we're going to delay their payment by over 30 days, during COVID-19." B. Schaschek, "It doesn't sound like they did any work, paying them in advance of the work. They haven't done the work yet." S. Phillips, "They've been working since like." W. Nunnally, "We gave them \$3 grand." Mayor Bugg, "Yeah, they've been working on it." F. Westbrook, "Alright we've paid them \$3 grand and they did \$3 grand worth of work, now we're going to pay them \$6, so they can do \$6 grand worth of work." S. Phillips, "So the invoices that were submitted were for the month of November and we're currently on the 18th of November so that invoice is technically 18 days behind. "F. Westbrook, "So, but they are not doing the work before they are prepaid are they? B. Schaschek, "We didn't even approve that until last month so, that was for the \$3,000, so how are we 2 months behind in an invoice." S. Phillips, "Because the terms of the contract are that the invoices are due payable 30 days, so the December invoice is due December 1." F. Westbrook, "And how much is the invoice." S. Phillips, "\$2,700 and." F. Westbrook, "So that's part of that \$3,000 correct." S. Phillips, "Which was the first one which was for what September, but we didn't cut the check until the end of September," B. Schaschek, "We didn't appropriate it until October." S. Phillips, "Right." F. Westbrook, "So this would have been". S. Phillips, "So we've been remiss in the terms of the contract consistently." W. Nunnally, "We only authorized \$3,000." S. Phillips, "To come out of contingency." Mayor Bugg, "Yeah. "F. Westbrook, "The first one you're right, came out of that contingency. That was the \$3,000." S. Phillips, "And you just passed your budget." F. Westbrook, "Right." S. Phillips, "And this would." D. Patteson, "Pay it deliverable of a presentation." S. Phillips, "Because that won't be until December and then there is 60 days into their work." W. Nunnally, "We need the lawyers." F. Westbrook, "We are not even sure right now, I would just say..." S. Phillips, "All of you, it's the grant." B. Schaschek, "At the last meeting we authorized..." D. Patteson, "\$3,000...." S. Phillips, "Out of contingency. That \$3,000 came out of contingency and this has a line item in this amended budget." B. Schaschek, "That's not the point. That's not the point at all. In that contingency account it doesn't really exist." N. Keane, "They just want to know when it is due." Mayor Bugg, "Yeah," S. Phillips, "It's due, so the work for November, the invoice for November was due November 1st, it is now November the 17th." B. Schaschek, "So what was the \$3,000 that we authorized in



October." S. Phillips, "The work for the previous month." N. Keane, "September." Mayor Bugg, "If we would have had the presentation, we would have seen all that work where we haven't been able to see that yet because of what happened." S. Phillips, "Through no fault of the vendors, Through no fault of the vendors they, I have their PowerPoint presentation that they were ready to share with Town Council. We had the office, the church set up for that which is another item on your item list. I just." B. Schaschek, "\$500." S. Phillips, "I just think that this contractor has met the terms of the agreement and we as a jurisdiction we've not met our terms." W. Nunnally, "May I ask a question Mr. Mayor." B. Schaschek, "I would like you to send me a copy of that." S. Phillips, "The grant, it's the grant." F. Westbrook, "No the contract, the grant is not the contract." S. Phillips, "Are you speaking of something else." B. Schaschek, "Flackshack." Mayor Bugg, "Flackshack." S. Phillips, "Okay." F. Westbrook, "I mean that's what all this is about right, Flackshack." W. Nunnally, "Right." Mayor Bugg, "Right." W. Nunnally, "And it's about \$5,500. We just defeated a motion to appropriate the budget, expenses so if this was in that then that was defeated. It didn't get appropriated." S. Phillips, "Agreed." W. Nunnally, "So." F. Westbrook, "But it is on this list and so, I think that the suggestion might be to reduce the two invoices down to the November invoice. Otherwise, you are looking at December before this vendor would have the opportunity." F. Westbrook, "It would be pushed ack a month all the way down the line, so November would now be December, December would then be January and right on down the line." S. Phillips, "What if the vendor drops us, what if we are not meeting their terms." N. Keane, "I mean, I just, I'm wondering if you can just appropriate whatever the contract, whatever the schedule is in the contract, that's what we have to adhere to, we just don't have a contract in our hands right here. That's the problem." F. Westbrook, "Why are we paying for work before it has even been done. That's highly unusual." S. Phillips, "That's the contract. So, we have Atlantic Broadband. You pay for services a month ahead of time." F. Westbrook, "Well that's a subscription." S. Phillips, "I think that our trash service is done the same way." F. Westbrook, "Well that may be but this is work we've contracted for to do something specific and typically you know you are paying as you go along, once work, a certain phase of work has been done then they bill you for that, then go onto the next phase, that's the way you build a house, that's the way you do a number of things. So, I don't understand why it's such a big deal if they haven't done the work yet if it is just postponed until we get a chance to hear from them and we know exactly what they've already done that we paid for." S. Phillips, "Actually what I hear is that it's going to subjective, that you're not going to release that payment unless you approve the work they do." W. Nunnally, "I'm not going to continue to sit out here in the cold and argue this point, the \$5,500 should not be here because it hasn't been appropriated and it should come out of there as well as the \$5,000. That's \$10,500 out of the \$14 that we have, so we are down to about \$4,000 is what I move to approve. I agree with you Fran, I'm glad I can do that. I move that we delete the Flackshack \$5,556 appropriation and the Mosca Design \$5,000 appropriation from the list and approve the rest of the items." Mayor Bugg, "Is there a second." F. Westbrook, "Second." Mayor Bugg, "Any further discussion." F. Westbrook, "I would like to add that if we can find a place to meet inside that maybe they can come and do their presentation and not wait until the December meeting and." Mayor Bugg, "I agree with that. I totally, that seems to be the rub, no one has seen any of this yet." F. Westbrook, "That's exactly right." Site Visits

ZA conducted 4 site visits for shoreline erosion, pool location, tree in the RPA, and dock replacement.

North Commons

At the 10/15/2020 Special Called TC Meeting, two motions were passed "FOR THE DESIGNATION OF THE NORTH COMMONS AS THE LOCATION FOR THE NEW TOWN OFFICE and "THE MOTION TO AUTHORIZE TOWN STAFF TO PROCEED WITH GETTING PROPOSALS RELATED TO ITEMS DISCUSSED CONCERNING A NEW TOWN OFFICE SUCH AS A PROPOSAL FROM CHESAPEAKE HOMES OR A SIMILAR CONTRACTOR; A PROPOSAL FOR A SURVEY; A PROPOSAL FOR A SITE PLAN FROM BAY DESIGN OR SIMILAR CONTRACTOR." At their request, the ZA requested pricing/estimate for the construction of a Town Office and Meeting Hall from a local vendor. Estimates have been received for a Master Site Plan and a Land Development & Engineering Plan that would involve the necessary infrastructure to develop the North Commons.

In addition to this proposal, the ZA received a proposal from a second vendor to include designing a building with construction documents including main building, meeting room building, parking, landscaping, lighting, and walk paths.

Zoning Department Housekeeping Items

The Conditional Use Permit application has been updated, reviewed by legal and will take effect immediately.

The Subdivision Application was not in compliance with the most current Town Code. A revised subdivision application has been updated, reviewed by legal and will take effect immediately.

The Joint Permit Application Process has been reviewed by the ZA in partnership with VMRC and Lancaster County. During the review, it is clear that the Town of Irvington has shared responsibility with Lancaster County Wetlands Board when waterfront property owners are proposing work within the CBPA. The Town of Irvington has jurisdiction over the Bay Act and when the County receives future JPAs, they will begin forwarding the applications to Irvington. The ZA has worked closely with the County and appreciates the time and effort shown from County staff.

Cay Bradley: Cay Bradley here, President of Steamboat Era Museum, we would like to thank town council for allowing us to hold our annual membership meeting in September on the town commons. Believe it or not we made quorum, and so we have a new board that has been instated and new officers and that would not have been possible without being able to use the town commons, so thank you all very much for letting us take care of business.

Mayor Bugg: Thank you. That's great to hear. Anyone else for public comments. Yes sir.

J. Crowley: I'm here, J. Crowley from the Tides Inn, I'm here just to speak on behalf of the Virginia Tourism Grant. You can kind of guess which way I'm going to go with this I think, but we are very much in favor of the town council passing this including all of your discussion that we had earlier today. Really appreciate that. We think it is a great investment in the long term plans for the town and I'm not just speaking on behalf of the Tides Inn, I think it is something for the entire town that as the grant as I understand it, is related to improving the tourism in the shoulder season, basically the winter months or the spring and late fall type of time frame. As I mentioned before at the Tides

Inn at least half of our business comes in during the summertime which leaves 9 months only for the rest of our business and there is a lot of room available at the Tides Inn during those times and part of this we are also at the Tides Inn looking to increase the number of days that the Inn is open including this upcoming year. We are looking at being open through January of 2021 and closing for a short period of time and reopening much earlier than we did this year here in 2020. We really feel that the grant that is being presented would be very, very beneficial, not just for the Tide's Inn but for the entire town. One other point that I'll bring up sort of on behalf of the Tide's Inn, a little bit more personal is, there has been a lot of money and most of you have probably heard, there was a lot of money invested over the past few months at the Inn and a lot of improvements have been made over the last 6 or 8 months and we have seen some really great positive results so far since we have been open. What I think is really neat is we've actually reduced the number of rooms at the resort which actually in its own way reduces the amount of traffic that comes through the town, but what's funny is we are able to charge, we are getting better rates now because of the improved product at the property which in turn generates much more taxes which we would then turn over to the town. So, it is kind of a win-win situation in that it is actually reducing traffic, but the town is getting additional tax revenue at least from the Tide's Inn and I think that as well all saw in the report that Mrs. Westbrook presented a little earlier, the occupancy tax is a huge number part of all of this of your annual budget and with what we're projecting and Mr. Barwise former general manager had given some projections and as I looked at the numbers I actually think in upcoming years those numbers will be very, very achievable and my guess would be we would be exceeding those numbers if not in 2021 then certainly in 2022 as we look to potentially be open year round.

G. REPORT FROM THE MAYOR - Mayor Bugg

Mayor Bugg: The first item I have to report on is the through truck restriction. At the September 10 meeting we outlined the chronology of actions taken by Irvington between May and August 2020 to adopt a resolution seeking a through truck restriction on Route 200. We also heard from the public, namely there were some speakers and some 65 letters and emails from the Golden Eagle and Westminster Canterbury against the through truck restriction which designates Old Salem Road as the alternate route. Finally VDOT explained why it recommended Old Salem Road as the alternate route. VDOT asserts that this alternate route would be the most likely to be approved at the end of the full process by the Commonwealth Transportation Board. VDOT bases this on its evaluation of Harris and Old Salem Roads. According to VDOT these are similar roads in terms of their use. 1900 versus 1600 vehicles per day and design, similar width, lines, sites, etc. VDOT warned that choosing Harris instead of Old Salem would result in making exceptions to the normal practices of VDOT and the Commonwealth Transportation Board thus making the choice of Harris less likely to be approved. Even if one of the localities wants Harris Road as the alternate. Just to remind you in June Irvingtonians turned out in force to express their total support for the passage of the resolution adopting Old Salem Road as a through truck restriction on Route 200. All communications from Irvington residents and business plus one Weems business were in support of our resolution designating Old Salem Road as the alternate route. Based on this and the fact this council unanimously adopted resolutions using Old Salem Road as the alternate under VDOT recommendations the staff and I will be moving forward in the process to the appropriate next step by sending our resolution and supporting materials to the County of Lancaster and asking the county to place this matter on the county's agenda for public hearing. The next item I have to comment on is the September 10, 2020 vote to authorize the mayor as voting member execute vendor contract and appropriate \$3,000 to contractor Flack Shack as part of the VTC grant. I know we just talked a lot about this, but I have some additional details to clarify for the record as well. It was brought to my attention that the vote taken on this motion did not have enough votes cast in favor of the \$3,000 appropriation. You will recall that appropriations required affirmative vote of a majority of all members elected to council. That's article 3 Section 12 of our charter. I reviewed the portion of the September 10 meeting. This was stated as a combination motion. There was only one vote taken instead of three votes. The vote was three in favor, one opposed, one abstained and one recused. Technically the first two parts authorized me to be the point person and authorizing me to execute the contract passed. Later on in the agenda under old business I would like to take a separate vote on the appropriation tonight. The discussion at the last meeting focused on whether the grants had been approved. The grant is a contract, there are five parties to the contract. Irvington is one of the parties. it became a party when it electronically submitted the application. Last month you voted to authorize me to be the point person and to execute the contract. However, we need four votes to appropriate the \$3,000. Everyone at the table agreed the first check to come from was to come from the contingency fund. I agreed that the application process last year was confusing and not how I would have liked to manage these things going forward. However, this has been a learning experience for all of us. We need to move forward with this and get this done. I believe we accomplished a lot of this during our last meeting as well at the 5:00 public hearing, so thank you. That is all I have to say in terms of the mayor's report. That would bring me to old business.

1. Virginia Tourism Grant Discussion

Mayor Bugg: The next item on the agenda is the Centric Business Solutions Discussion and Madam Clerk could you give us some.

S. Phillips: Bonnie asked that Centric provide different lease options so that's, you will see a single page and that simply identifies if you drop, if you go for a 36 month versus a 48 versus a 63.

Group: Talkover.

B. Schaschek: You are pushing this particular printer because it does 11 x 17 and Lara needs to do a lot of 11 x 17 printing, is that.

Sharon Phillips: So, yes this would assist the zoning department.

- B. Schaschek: Okay. If it was just 8½ x 11, your standard envelopes and your labels and all of that, for the amount of printing that we do of 11 x 17, can we do that with a printing place over here in Kilmarnock where you just give them the USB drive.
- F. Westbrook: I'll give you a good example. We just had a new survey done and the plat when we sent to the town office as part of the contact list, but the plats are 11 x 17. So when they received that through an email, they need the capability and that puts down a lot more paperwork to be sent to them in that manner if they can print on the larger paper.
- B. Schaschek: Is this the only ones that you looked at.
- S. Phillips: This was an unsolicited proposal. This gentleman just called, the background was the amount of money that was the office supply budget line item which was roughly \$400 a month in toner cartridge. That was the main, was looking to offset toner cartridge prices and to have a more versatile printer that would be able to make the zoning department a little easier.
- B. Schaschek: Now with this would you also retain the existing printer.

S. Phillips: We would, well that's up to council. If council can decide what to do with that piece of equipment, there is nothing wrong with that piece of equipment. There's nothing wrong with it.

B. Schaschek: There's nothing wrong with it. It's just not cost effective.

S. Phillips: So the concern that council should be looking at is finding the most cost effective solution for a small town office that probably to produce this meeting which is three reams of paper, again \$400 a month in toner cartridge. With the zoning department coming online I see that particular printer just being worked harder.

F. Westbrook: So would you want to keep it as a backup or...

Sharon Phillips: Yes, I think it would be a functional piece of equipment for the office, again we have a bigger office now, there is one room in the new town office that we refer to as the printer/copier room. Everything is wireless so we would just be able to interface that way.

W. Nunnally: Sharon the \$400 a month we are spending in cartridges.

Sharon Phillips: Just on toner cartridges.

W. Nunnally: Alright, I just did a real quick 36 month lease would give us \$436 a month but how much would that cost us with cartridges in it. Do we know.

Sharon Phillips: I'm sorry what was the comparison.

W. Nunnally: The \$400 we know with owning the computer, if we rent this one it is going to cost us \$436, we have to operate it with toner.

Sharon Phillips: No they provide the toner.

W. Nunnally: They provide it.

Sharon Phillips: That's the bells and whistles. For that \$436 you get.

A. Marchetti: Service and maintenance.

W. Nunnally: Service and maintenance.

F. Westbrook: Now that's up to so many copies a month correct. It has a meter on it and it tells you how many copies, so if you go over that then there could be some.

S. Phillips: I'm not sure if you attended the meeting where the original Centric proposal, I'll give you that where it talked about how many pieces of paper, color versus black and white. We are a small office and it is certainly not, but the main point of that was for that monthly value that's what we are spending in toner cartridges anyway.

W. Nunnally: Let me ask this question, if it goes down will they provide us with a new machine right away.

S. Phillips: Oh absolutely.

W. Nunnally: So within 24 hours.

S. Phillips: They do have service yes and they have and I asked this particular vendor if they had any contracts in the Northern Neck area and they were looking to sign a contract with the Sheriff's Department in Lancaster County and they also have I believe it was a contract over in Northumberland. So they do have technicians in this area and they do have a response time.

W. Nunnally: Just, I don't want you down, depending on somebody else when you're down if you can't get it fixed right away.

F. Westbrook: But we'll have a backup so.

B. Schaschek: With the service they are providing within 24 hours.

S. Phillips: Yes ma'am.

A. Marchetti: How much is the paper.

B. Schaschek: I guess it comes down to whether you want to do a 5 year where technology changes so much or do you want to come down to a 3 year.

S. Phillips: Correct. And so you asked how many reams of paper. I can tell you I probably go through a case of 10 ream case a month.

F. Westbrook: That doesn't count all the paper that we use at home.

S. Phillips: That's one of the reasons, more members of council, as you will notice your agendas are very weighty, they are very.

A. Marchetti: Kind of where I was going with the COVID funds like if there were 6 or 7 how many of them need to be services like Bonnie has and instead of me every week getting 70 pages printed out we all just scroll through on a tablet.

F. Westbrook: On a tablet.

A. Marchetti: Yeah.

W. Nunnally: COVID would pay for it either way.

A. Marchetti: COVID would pay for it and how much money would that save between printing and paper over time. I mean I guess if you want to print it, you print it at home and take the hard copy, but I much prefer to scroll through on a screen like Bonnie is doing, it is simply more efficient.

W. Nunnally: I'd rather have a piece of paper myself.

A. Marchetti: And I understand that, that's why I said.

F. Westbrook: I straddle that fence. I'm trying to make myself be more like that.

W. Nunnally: I'd throw the computer away if I had a chance.

F. Westbrook: I've considered that too at times.

A. Marchetti: You need a printer regardless, it was just the thought that...

B. Schaschek: They obviously have to print so you need to consider now if you do a 3 year it is going to be \$16,000.

W. Nunnally: Yeah \$15.....

4. Reynolds Tennis Court Repairs Discussion - S. Phillips, Town Clerk

a. Motion to authorize Option 1 from contract dated August 19.

S. Phillips: Again thank you Jackie Brown she noticed at the last meeting the conversation was the distinction between option 1 on your tennis court and option 2 and I reached out to Ben Rennolds who created the proposal for us and option 2 does not include option 1 and I think that the motion last month read that we would go with option 2 only if it included option 1, so that is why I'm bringing this back to the table to make a clear motion if you want to go with option 1 only. Otherwise, it would be a combined cost of the \$5,675 and \$8,845. The motion, the scope of work that was done approximately 4 years ago, 3½ 4 years ago was option 1 and that generally has about a 2½ to 3year shelf life so again when it comes to your capital budget about every 3 years under capital budget you need to put option 1 until you totally redo your court.

A. Marchetti: How many years do you get if you do option 1 and 2.

S. Phillips: I don't know the answer to that.

A. Marchetti: Does it buy you more time.

S. Phillips: No because.

A. Marchetti: I know option 2 had the warranty.



IMMEDIATELY FOLLOWING THE PUBLIC HEARINGS

S. Phillips: So each of those things comes with their own warranty. I don't know if I can clearly answer your question to option 2.

F. Westbrook: So option 1 they clean out the new cracks but option 2 they don't clean out the new cracks.

S. Phillips: Option 2 is on top of option 1. You have to start with option 1, that's your minimum.

A. Marchetti: Gotcha. Can't just choose option 2.

S. Phillips: Correct.

F. Westbrook: So option 2 would include option.

S. Phillips: No, no. Charges.

A. Marchetti: No, you can't.

B. Schaschek: You can't do option 2 if you don't do option 1. Switch.

A. Marchetti: So option 2 does include...

Mayor Bugg: Thank you Jackie.

A. Marchetti: Nice catch.

F. Westbrook: So it is not \$5,000 versus \$8,000, it's \$5,000 versus \$12,000.

W. Nunnally: \$13,000.

B. Schaschek: \$13,000 and change yeah.

A. Marchetti: You basically have no choice but to do option 1.

F. Westbrook: I think until we realize what the capital budget, all that kind of stuff, where all that is going.

S. Phillips: When Mr. Rennolds came over and assessed the tennis courts, your tennis courts are actually in very good condition. At some point in time if you chose to go with option 2 which is purely cosmetic, that's an option in your future. But right now, for safety reasons, option 1 is your consideration.

A. Marchetti: So option 2 could be done next year.

S. Phillips: Absolutely.

B. Schaschek: Can be done anytime, it is just a surface.

A. Marchetti: It doesn't have to be.

B. Schaschek: And if you limit pickle ball on it, that would save some of the damage.

J. Brown: Is this the only company that does this work, should we have another estimate.

S. Phillips: There are, so the concern is the safety of those courts. During COVID there was a high demand. We had weeds going up through them. The tape that they apply to mend the cracks is in the alleys. If you choose to put this back out to bid you need decide to close your courts.

J. Brown: Say that again.

- S. Phillips: If you chose to put this back out to bid you may have to revisit closing your tennis courts.
- B. Schaschek: They are the ones that have been maintaining it for the past couple of years.
- F. Westbrook: They have and when we have had repairs done to this several years ago we did look at different people and they were the ones we went with, plus they are in Tappahannock and this is their work.
- S. Phillips: The work that is on the tennis courts, the work that is on the tennis courts right now is their work.
- F. Westbrook: So I mean we chose them over one or two others the last time that it was done. That's not to say that they are probably the best price now but we did consider others the last time.
- W. Nunnally: How much did we put in the projected budget, We put the \$56 in the budget.
- F. Westbrook: No we put the \$88 in the budget.
- B. Schaschek: It will have to be revised.

11. Discussion of audio visual proposal from Entertainment Systems

Mayor Bugg: Item 11 discussion of audiovisual proposal entertainment systems. Discussion on whether to purchase audiovisual equipment. I open that to the council whereas discussion as previous meetings and Ms. Schaschek I know that is one of your areas of expertise as well so.

W. Nunnally: Do I need to do a disclosure since I'm a member and dues paying member of Irvington Baptist Church and on the board. I see that is mentioned in B, that you have to negotiate with the church. So I so disclose.

Mayor Bugg: Excellent. We will open the topic Madam Clerk if you want to bring everyone up to speed.

S. Phillips: In your proposal or in your meeting packet you will see a proposal on entertainment systems. I have met with them two or three times here at the church. I did ask for a bells and whistles bid. There were two primary concerns that council communicated. The first concern was the ability to hear, given the distance from the public, given the distance between yourselves, everyone is wearing a mask. It is very difficult to hear, so you will see that a large portion of this proposal has to do with speakers and microphones. The second concern that council communicated was the ability whether you use a tablet or whether you have a camera installed in here and people from at home would simply click on a link where people would be able to watch the town council meeting from home, from wherever they choose. The concern is that given the price of this proposal that equipment would not live in a town owned facility. So the town attorney is being asked to work to identify this contract would require holes to be drilled, I need a technical term, a jack, a panel, it would involve electricity, it



IMMEDIATELY FOLLOWING THE PUBLIC HEARINGS

would involve the church's part. So I think that a prudent thing to do at this point is for every, if council is concerned as to the dollar value of this, there are alternative ways to meet the ability to hear for probably under \$500 we can come up with a different solution but the only initial component might be to address differently something that council could consider is that this purchase does qualify with our CARES money so this could come out of the \$70,000 for the CARES money. Do you want to purchase this and hold onto it until the new town office is ready, audiovisual equipment updates very quickly. Faster than a printer. So is this something that you would want to hold, is it something that you would want to install here and work on a relationship with the church as to how to handle that or would you like for staff to bring alternative solutions to the table. I truly think that we should rely on Bonnie to identify where we might be able to streamline this proposal or just alternative solutions to those two critical needs.

W. Nunnally: We are between the devil and the deep blue sea.

B. Schaschek: Exactly.

W. Nunnally: I mean we've got this money available and we have to spend it by December and we don't know when we are going to have the new town office, if we have a new town office.

B. Schaschek: I'd like to take and look at all of the components of this and what exactly we are trying to accomplish, there are other ways of doing it. This is very high. We can also talk to the church because without the church buy in and allowing to do an installation it is a mute point.

W. Nunnally: Just to throw it out there, the church will participate. They could use it too.

B. Schaschek: That's what I shared earlier.

W. Nunnally: It may be a win-win situation.

B. Schaschek: That's what I had said earlier so that is something that we should look at. I don't think we can make any decision now based on this right now.

W. Nunnally: I think we need to table this discussion until after Bonnie reviews it.

Mayor Bugg: Thank you for your help Bonnie.

S. Phillips: Do you want to authorize the town attorney to do research or is it....

F. Westbrook: Do what research.

S. Phillips: With the church.

F. Westbrook: I think we ought to wait and see what Bonnie comes back with because it would give her recommendations on which way we might go.

APPROVING THE AGREEMENT FOR THE USE OF FEDERAL CARES CORONAVIRUS RELIEF FUNDS, AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR TO EXECUTE THE AGREEMENT AND ACCEPTING CARES ALLOTMENT

WHEREAS, the United States Congress passed, and the President signed, the Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security ("CARES") Act of 2020 (the "Act"); and

WHEREAS, the Act establishes funding for programs to address the COVID-19 pandemic; and

WHEREAS, Lancaster County will receive an allocation of \$1,850,142 from the Coronavirus Relief Fund ("CRF") established under the Act; and

WHEREAS, Irvington's share of these funds is \$70,490.42; and

WHEREAS, expenditure of the funds is to be used only for qualifying expenses as defined by the Act, the expenditure of funds will be audited and any funds expended for purposes other than as provided by the Act will have to be repaid and returned to the Commonwealth of Virginia; and

WHEREAS, expenditure of the funds from CRF distributed to the Town will be subject to refund and return by the Town; and

WHEREAS, this Emergency Resolution is adopted pursuant to Town Code §30.15.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that Irvington Town Council hereby approves the attached "Agreement for the use of Federal CARES Coronavirus Relief Funds" presented by and previously approved by Lancaster County ("Agreement") and directs the Mayor to execute the Agreement; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Irvington Town Council accepts the allotment from the CRF paid by Lancaster County of \$70,490.42, subject to terms of the Agreement ("Allotment"); and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Irvington Town Council hereby directs the Allotment be deposited into and held in a separate Town of Irvington account at Chesapeake

Bank, and that, from such account, expenditures shall be made from the Allotment in compliance with the Act and the Agreement; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that expenditures from the Allotment in compliance with the Act and Agreement are hereby appropriated.

AGREEMENT FOR THE USE OF FEDERAL CARES CORONAVIRUS RELIEF FUNDS

THIS AGREEMENT, made this the 8th day of October, 2020 by and between the County of Lancaster, a political subdivision of the Commonwealth of Virginia, (herein after referred to as the "County") party of the first part, and the Town of Irvington, a political subdivision of the Commonwealth of Virginia, (hereinafter referred to as the "Town") party of the second part;

WITNESSETH

WHEREAS, the United States Congress passed, and the President signed the Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security ("CARES") Act of 2020 (the "Act"); and,

WHEREAS, the Act provided funding for a number of different programs to address the COVID-19 pandemic; and,

WHEREAS, a primary component of the Act is the provision of \$150 billion in assistance to state, local, territorial and tribal governments for the direct impact of the COVID-19 pandemic through the establishment of the Coronavirus Relief Fund ("CRF"); and,

WHEREAS, the County has been notified that it will receive two allocations totaling \$1,850,142 from the CRF and that it must share a portion of those funds with the Towns located in the County.

Irvington's share of such funds is \$70,490.42 ("the Town distribution"); and,

WHEREAS, expenditure of the funds is subject to be used only for qualifying expenses as defined by the Act, the expenditure of the funds will be audited and any funds expended for purposes other than as provided by the Act will have to be repaid and returned to the Commonwealth of Virginia; and,

WHEREAS, the parties hereto wish to confirm that the expenditure of the funds from CRF is limited to the uses established in the Act and that the funds distributed to the Town will be subject to refund and return by the Town and not by the County;

NOW THEREFORE THE PARTIES HERETO DO HEREBY AGREE AS FOLLOWS:

1) That the County will distribute to the Town the sum of \$70,490.42 from the CRF funds distributed to the County within ten (10) days of receipt of the funds by the County.

- That the funds distributed to the Town by the County may only be used for the direct costs associated with the response to the COVID-19 pandemic as those expenses qualify and as defined and limited by the Act. These are specifically limited to costs that:
 - a) are necessary expenditures incurred due to the public health emergency with respect to the Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19;
 - b) were not accounted for in the budget most recently approved as of March 27, 2020 for the Town; and,
 - c) were incurred during the period that begins on March 1, 2020 and ends on December 30, 2020.
- 3) That the Town shall keep and maintain all necessary documentation to ensure compliance with the federal, state and county requirements.
- 4) Expenditure of the Town distribution by the Town is at its sole risk. Should the appropriate federal or state authorities determine that the Town improperly expended such funds for purposes that do not qualify under the Act the Town must promptly return and repay the funds subject to the improper expenditure to the County. The County shall not be required to appeal or contest any determination by the federal or state authorities that such funds were improperly expended.
- Should the Town not expend all the Town distribution on or before December30, 2020 the Town shall promptly return such unexpended funds to the County.
- 6) The Town shall fully comply with all requirements of the Act and fully cooperate with the County, the Commonwealth of Virginia, and the United States of America in the use of the Town distribution., including any audit.
- 7) The parties agree that the Town shall be strictly liable in the use and expenditure of the Town distribution and shall reimburse the County for any expenditure of funds by the County necessitated by the failure of the Town to fully comply with the Act, including any costs, such as audit fees or other expenses and any amounts that the County may be required to refund because of the violation by the Town of the Act or the improper expenditure of the Town distribution.

8) In order to secure repayment of any amounts due hereunder to be reimbursed to the County by the Town, the Town agrees that any amount due hereunder, if not paid within ten days of notification and request to pay, may be withheld by the County from any funds due the Town which passes through the office of the County Treasurer. This may include sales taxes, real estate taxes, personal property taxes or other funds which the County Treasurer collects on behalf of the Town and remits to the Town.



C. PROPOSED AMENDED FY20/21 BUDGET - Mayor, Council, Staff

Mayor Bugg: Thank you. The next item would be the proposed amended 2020/21 budget. I know that has been circulated I hope everyone has had a chance to look at it. With that I'll turn it over to the budget and finance committee. You can take it in whatever order you deem appropriate.

- F. Westbrook: Thank you Mr. Mayor, we want to address the fees and tax rates first, mainly because, this has to go in the newspaper next week, so we want to make sure everyone has a good understanding of what that is going to be to be and we do have some changes to help with revenue.
- J. Brown: Go over this with everybody?
- F. Westbrook: Can we do this first?
- A. Marchetti: We are proposing mostly increases to permits. These are the proposed right?

F. Westbrook: Yes.

A. Marchetti: You don't have the existing. I see Precious Metals Realer registration, that stays the same from previous. Sign actually stays the same \$20, we are adding?

Nancyellen Keane: You are increasing zoning to the \$100.00 and you adding conditional use and board of zoning appeals.

F. Westbrook: Is that not well laid out for you, I'm sorry.

A. Marchetti: Isn't that the previous, I just wasn't sure what the increase was from.

F. Westbrook: Alright so we are increasing CUP to \$200. What order are they in here. Alright, sign stays the same at \$20, subdivision is the same. Zoning is going from \$35 to \$100. Conditional use permit is now going to be \$200.

A. Marchetti: It's currently \$35.00.

N. Keane: Currently 0.

F. Westbrook: Currently 0. It's currently 0. Board of zoning appeals, that is, we've not ever charged a fee.

N. Keane: The code allows you to.

F. Westbrook: The code allows us to. That's going up to \$300. Golf cart fees, we've had the ordinance for golf carts, but we have never actually had a fee in the ordinance.

N. Keane: Now the way we can add this and make the fee authorized is because we are passing all these budget related documents as ordinances so, for example this one would be a fee ordinance, we can say that we are adding this to the code section as related to golf carts which allows us to do that. Remember how we had a conversation maybe a year ago and saying that we weren't collecting a golf cart fee because of the code section that was passed authorizing a golf cart regulation never called for a fee. It called for an insurance policy only.

B. Schaschek: We were just charging \$10.00.

N. Keane: We were charging \$10.00 but we didn't have any authority to do that. We can now fix that through passing this ordinance in assessing a certain fee for whatever you want individual or commercial or the same for both.

B. Schaschek: What's a commercial golf cart?

F. Westbrook: Well, the people at Rappahannock Rentals rents golf carts and so does Neptune. I have seen them deliver them over the past couple of years, so we were thinking, yeah in return they are responsible for the liability as far as any insurance coverage on the cart instead of the renter, they'd be responsible to make sure that it had the items on it like the triangle and the taillights and headlights if it is going to be operated when the sun is down, so they'd be responsible for all this to the renter.

J. Brown: Would this be per cart, per year?

F. Westbrook: For commercial we are talking about annual.

J. Brown: Is what?

F. Westbrook: Annual.

S. Phillips: Per cart annually.

Mayor Bugg: That's a good call because I do see them a lot especially in the summer.

F. Westbrook: Yeah, so the private or the personal you know that's per year the \$25.00 per cart, for commercial it's just a flat \$200.00 a year.

J. Brown: How many carts now?

Mayor Bugg: Per cart.

S. Phillips: Right so if they have 10 carts that they rent to Irvington, every car that comes into Irvington has to have a sticker. That sticker is \$200.

F. Westbrook: Yeah, so they may only opt to have three of their golf carts in their fleet that they would rent to Irvington.

B. Schaschek: So they would be paying \$600.00 in a fee.

F. Westbrook: Uh huh.

N. Keane: What do they charge in Irvington, I guess there's not that many jurisdictions.

F. Westbrook: When we were talking about it I thought it was \$200.00 for the year period for them.

N. Keane: I don't know.

B. Schaschek: I think \$200 per cart is scary.

S. Phillips: That's up to the council.

F. Westbrook: The cart twice, it was cheaper just paying \$25.00 per cart.

S. Phillips: That's up to ya'll however you want to change it.

Mayor Bugg: Yeah \$200.00 is gonna get up there.

F. Westbrook: Alright so what do you want to do about that?

S. Phillips: But it's a tourist pass through, to the tourist. I think that you should be aware that there are multiple commercial golf carts in town and the town has no way to regulate them.

F. Westbrook: Right and this is a step to do that but the biggest concern to me is that these carts even though we have no way of regulating them actually, they still have to adhere to what the state says, these carts have to be and do, in order to be on the state road. So, by having Neptune and Rappahannock Rentals pay us a fee

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whatever we determine it to be annually for them to bring their golf carts in here then they know what's required so that we can keep, keep our carts going. We don't want to lose them because a renter comes in and is involved in some sort of bizarre accident and some, cops are involved in it and all of a sudden you know there is all kinds of infractions and they wouldn't even know it is a residents golf carts.

J. Brown: Do we have any idea how many carts were rented commercially?

F. Westbrook: No.

S. Phillips: We don't know the total number of carts that are rented, but we know that Neptune also rents in Irvington.

J. Brown: Say that again.

S. Phillips: That Neptune, is located.

S. Phillips: I think that everybody recognizes a 6-seater golf cart, commercial golf carts in town and so, are you interested in regulating a commercial golf cart.

J. Brown: I think we should, but I think it would be helpful to know about how many are being rented so we know whether this fee is a reasonable figure or not.

S. Phillips: I would have no way of knowing that.

J. Brown: Can we call and ask them?

S. Phillips: How would you ask that question, how do you want to handle it, I don't have a relationship with any of those vendors.

B. Schaschek: I would just ask them.

F. Westbrook: I don't know that it's necessarily important that they rent 10 or 100, I don't think it's all that many.

Mayor Bugg: I think its 2 or 3.

F. Westbrook: Yeah 2 or 3.

Mayor Bugg: It might be off but in that range.

F. Westbrook: Well, we don't want to make it prohibitive for them to rent the carts that are coming into Irvington.

J. Brown: No we don't want to but we want to be realistic of what the fees are. I mean they are operating a business and you know if they are renting hundreds of carts then the fee is too low, if they are renting two carts it's probably too much.

B. Schaschek: I can have Kurt call you at the office. You want, if you feel more comfortable with that. I can ask him because I don't think he is renting 10 golf carts. If it's three or four in town, that's a lot.

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B. Schaschek: Now, I got a golf cart from them, Wayne has two from them and somebody else in our neighborhood and so you may see them coming, but that's because they pick up golf carts for service.

Mayor Bugg: Yeah.

B. Schaschek: Even though you see them they may be rentals and one of ours, that's why I'm just trying to mention that. On the conditional use permit where you are going from zero charge to \$200, now is it resident still or the customer, or you whatever you want to call it still responsible for the ad and the letters and who is paying for all that.

F. Westbrook: Not yet.

S. Phillips: So the thought process on the CUP going up to \$200.00 is an interim step. At this time they don't pay anything directly to the town.

B. Schaschek: Right.

S. Phillips: But, they do pay for all of the advertising and that can range upwards of \$200 by the time they pay for the ad itself which is generally just at \$200 for the ads, then they have to pay depending on how many people are within 300', it can be 2, 6, I, also, the three CUPS that we processed in March, they had upwards of 20 a piece and generally at about \$6.00. So right now the applicant pays those fees, this is an effort in partnership with the zoning administrator she has weighed in on the thought process here. This is, it will be I'm assuming effective January 1, or whenever you make it effective it will carry you through this fiscal year. In the remainder of the fiscal year, you will authorize the town attorney, at your desire, you will authorize the town attorney to rewrite your code because right now your code is written that the applicant pays the advertising and the code probably needs to be rewritten so that the town is responsible so that the town controls the ad and the town controls the affidavit side of things. This is an interim step allowing the town to at least not lose money on the CUP process should you choose to modify your town code you might go up on the CUP again once the town is completely financially responsible turnkey for the CUP. Most jurisdictions charge anywhere from \$300 to \$500 for a CUP.

F. Westbrook: We looked at Middlesex and Lancaster, to see what they were charging so ours is somewhere between and going up to \$200 on the CUP particularly helps reimburse the town for the monies that are being paid to the zoning administrator. I mean it's, what did Lara say she's, 10 or 20 hours. For CUP, so this way at least you know the town is trying to break even a little bit on what it costs us manpower to do it and if we go to us doing the other aspects of it, the mailings and the newspaper ads we may have to go up another \$200 at least.

B. Schaschek: I think you have to do a range there, because if somebody has 40 certified letters.

S. Phillips: You would potentially modify the code to not say within 300 feet but to say adjacent.

B. Schaschek: You have to check the stated stuff, I think you have to do something.

F. Westbrook: I think the county only says adjacent, I'm not sure.

N. Keane: VMRC says adjacent.

F. Westbrook: Who does?

N. Keane: VMRC and that's where most of ours come into the issue, VMRC uses the word adjacent we use within 300 feet.

A. Marchetti: Of all property lines?

N. Keane: Of all property lines. I mean, we are not suggesting changing it, but we'll have to come up with some way to figure out the cost to give you all some sort of income for this because you can't afford, I mean the town just can't afford.

F. Westbrook: Well we can't.

J. Brown: [talkerover] Sign fee needs to go up.

F. Westbrook: Well the sign fee will also, there will be a sign fee and a zoning. So it's so much per sign but they need the zoning permit.

F. Westbrook: If it is put in the ground.

N. Keane: Or the sign post then you have to get a zoning permit to put that up and that would be another \$100. So for a sign to be approved up on stake or post, it would be \$20 plus \$100.

J. Brown: Okay what items would be included under the zoning permits, is that sidewalks any buildings.

N. Keane: Any construction.

S. Phillips: So, the zoning permit also follows the CUP.

J. Brown: Pardon me.

S. Phillips: So, if you use an example, the Tides Inn when they did their floating docks they went through the CUP process and once that CUP was approved they then received a zoning permit so using the scenario that's before you, you would have a \$200 CUP fee and when that's concluded it's a \$100 zoning permit.

J. Brown: Okay, what about a homeowner who is making changes to their property.

S. Phillips: If they are just building a garage that's completely within normal everything \$100.

J. Brown: \$100. Sidewalk?

S. Phillips: What would you do to a sidewalk, install a sidewalk.

J. Brown: Install a sidewalk.

S. Phillips: As long as it's not in the RPA it is completely under the zoning administrator's purview it is \$100.

J. Brown: So, every time they want to do something it's \$100.

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N. Keane: If they need a permit for it yes. If you need a building permit for something Lancaster County won't give the building permit until we have given a zoning permit. So, they have to pay us for the zoning permit, they pay Lancaster County for the building permit. Whatever they charge.

F. Westbrook: That's more in keeping with what our neighboring counties are doing.

J. Brown: Okay.

Mayor Bugg: Any other discussion about fees?

F. Westbrook: One other comment would be BZA we have not had a fee on that before but we are allowed to. BZA at the county, if I'm not mistaken that's \$500. It's pretty steep on the county side and what do we have it down there?

Mayor Bugg: \$300.

F. Westbrook: \$300, so I imagine that wouldn't go up.

D. Patteson: I apologize for being late, my dog at 5:30 started howling in pain and I instantly became a veterinarian. Took care of it, but it scared the hell out of me. So, I'm sorry.

Mayor Bugg: No problem.

D. Patteson: I'm here.

F. Westbrook: So are there any questions then on the fees, let's see, tax rates. I was telling Bonnie earlier that this is a hard budget to deal with in that we've had to deal with COVID of course and that has affected not only cash flow but the revenue and it's, we've looked at, the only thing that we thought we could increase was our occupancy rate and given the other expenses which you'll see when we get into it, we figured things at a 1% increase which still left us heavy on the expense side and we figured at a 2% increase which would put us at a total of 4% on occupancy rate would make the current, what we are proposing here, would make it work, we would have about \$13,000 left over if we go to 4%. If we stick with the 3% total rate we are still going to be in the red, so we're going to have to consider going up on the tax rate of the occupancy. We talked about a meals tax but we can't institute a new tax at this time, we can next year when we are doing the new budget for the upcoming fiscal year.

B. Schaschek: This is the amended.

F. Westbrook: Yeah, this is the amended.

A. Marchetti: Pretty limited.

F. Westbrook: Yeah we are pretty limited.

A. Marchetti: Until next July.

F. Westbrook: Yeah.

J. Brown: Does White Stone have an occupancy tax?

F. Westbrook: I have no idea.

J. Brown: Kilmarnock's is what 7 or 8%?

F. Westbrook: 7 or 8, you know you get into the cities, I mean Richmond is charging 12%, you go to a hotel they slap on 12%.

B. Schaschek: Doesn't Kilmarnock do a \$50 registration or a \$100 fee annually.

N. Keane: Kilmarnock does a business license.

B. Schaschek: Remember when we were at the town meeting and they were putting in the fee for occupancy tax and they had to register all the VRBO's and stuff....

F. Westbrook: Oh, yeah they were charging a registration fee. We haven't gotten to that step yet, yeah, there is an annual registration fee which we would probably, annual registration, I don't know if we are going to attach a fee to it but we will probably will.

B. Schaschek: We should keep it and we can based upon the state and the county.

F. Westbrook: So exactly what percentage that tax rate is going to end up being we'll determine tonight when we go through the budget and we figure out what rate we're going to need to make this darn thing balanced. The other thing we need to look at before we get right down to the budget itself is the amended budget schedule if you will and the synopsis, there's other drafts you have, there's three pages. The first one says advertisement number one, this is how it is going to appear in the paper on this advertisement number one. It's outlining our public hearings, the dates, you will notice that the hearing, this is all on the same day. Thursday, October 8th, this has to go in the paper next week.

S. Phillips: Tuesday.

F. Westbrook: Yeah, and you will notice that the first public hearing will start at 5:00 p.m. and the second, third and fourth will be immediately following the preceding one, so we don't have the structured time frame like we had last time we were sitting and waiting before we could start the next public hearing. This is taken straight off of the budget schedule which we already approved, so this is just the format that is going to be in the newspaper, we've already voted on this and that's how it is going to be listed in the newspaper. The second page that has advertisement, no excuse me, let me go back, the paper that has public hearing number five, this refers to, and this is the fifth public hearing, but it has to be a separate ad in the paper, it won't be a part of advertisement number one.

N. Keane: Wait a minute, can I jump in, are you looking at public hearing number five for the budget announcement?

F. Westbrook: Yes, that is part of advertisement, do I have that backwards.

N. Keane: Yes. That is all one ad and it has five public hearings and it is a two pager because we couldn't fit it all in there.

F. Westbrook: I beg your pardon.

N. Keane: The other one says advertisement two, that's the one.

F. Westbrook: That's the one I'm, so this will be the increase in the occupancy tax rate and that has to be a separate ad in the paper, so it is very clear, very distinct to the public what we're doing and right now we have this occupancy tax rate 4%, if we decide to do 3, obviously this will change to go in the newspaper. Are there any questions on those? So these two ads will be happening next week for public hearings. Is there anything else we need to add to that? Okay, so that gets that part taken care of. Now down to the final part. I think we will start with the revenue. So, the revenue starts with occupancy rate, real estate tax rate. So the first item on there is the occupancy tax rate and we were just talking about that when I said, you see the \$75,000 the far right hand corner, that far right hand corner is the proposed budget figures at this point. The \$75,000 was arrived at by taking the base rate of both the Hope and Glory and the Tides Inn last fiscal year and using about 70% of that at a 1% increase that will give us \$75,000 projected. That's not quite enough to make the budget balance. If we go to a 4%, in other words a 2% increase then that would give us about \$98,000 which would give us another \$13,000 surplus if we do that, so, if we don't do the 4% on occupancy tax rate we are going to have to figure somewhere else to find some revenue. So once again, a 1% increase at \$75,000, a 2% increase is \$98,000. Real estate tax we have \$63,000, local sales tax at \$25,000, that's mainly because not quite as much spending in town to charge sales tax on so we are going to have a little bit of a decrease in what comes back to us from the state. We kept the auto tags the same at \$10,000, bank franchise we took up just a little bit to \$12,000 because of deposits, cable TV we are keeping.

B. Schaschek: Bank deposits are up.

F. Westbrook: Yeah, based on what they told me, well, Irvington, this is all based on the Irvington branch. Cable TV, communications, we took that down to \$2,000, it was at \$2,000 and we budgeted \$22, but we haven't quite hit that mark so we took it back down to \$2,000. \$1,000 remaining in permits, excuse me, \$1,000 in town property rental which is septic fields, septic tanks over there behind the bank, on the commons area, permit and zoning fees we went up to \$2,500 because of increased fees that we just went over. Interest income went down a little bit to \$5,500. That was just kind of a guesstimate on our part since rates have gone down, they've gone down since.

B. Schaschek: I think they should be lower than that.

F. Westbrook: You think so.

B. Schaschek: We are getting .45 on some of those.

F. Westbrook: What do you think we ought to take it down to 4.

B. Schaschek: Income and then we can figure it out, yeah because the rates have dropped.

F. Westbrook: Yeah but the CDs and stuff we had that rate stays the same for that year right.

B. Schaschek: .45, I think they are due in April.

F. Westbrook: Two due in April, the rest are.

B. Schaschek: They were 13 months.

F. Westbrook: Yeah but they are staggered, they weren't all due in April are they.

B. Schaschek: Two major ones due in April.

S. Phillips: April?

B. Schaschek: Yeah.

F. Westbrook: No, we had one in September, two in March and one in December.

B. Schaschek: You are getting about \$127 a month in interest income, that's it.

F. Westbrook: It can't be down.

A. Marchetti: What were the rates at last year, down \$5,500.

B. Schaschek: That was like 1.75, yeah.

A. Marchetti: That's like three times as much.

F. Westbrook: We had \$6,000 that we had collected through the end of March or June.

Bonnie Schaschek: Well, that's because you had collected from March to whatever, through March it was still that 1.75. Interest income on P&L for August was \$127 and year to date it's \$254, I think just multiply \$127 out by 12.

F. Westbrook: That's the two big ones, \$103,000 and \$113,000. Alright, and what did you say 4.

B. Schaschek: Yeah .45. Do you have your P&L?

F. Westbrook: I have one here

B. Schaschek: I have the one from August.

F. Westbrook: The one from July, alright we might just.

B. Schaschek: Multiply \$127 by 12 and be done.

F. Westbrook: I think that's, good grief, that's dropping \$4,000. Alright so, interest income we are going to take that all the way down to \$1,500, that's going to hurt. Okay, those are the two big ones, and we are not doing that much on money market, that's, we might be able to get a little more than \$1,500 with money market but it won't do much more. Then the fire grants \$10,000 and that in and out, the Lokey Wiley fund, we will take \$2,000 out of that investment and we use that to donate \$2,000 the libraries so that comes from another source. We have miscellaneous income of \$50 which kind of represents when we sell some books or whatever else happens inside the town office. We have Virginia Tourism grant, we've got \$15,000 that will be coming in, you'll see down below expenses, it will be \$25,000 going out, so that will be a net and then the COVID CARES Act, we put the full \$70,000 in here we've only received half of it, it is my understanding the county does have receipt of those monies in their possession and we think it is just a matter of us making the request to get the other half in, so we put the \$70,000 in income, you'll also see a corresponding entry later in expenses for the same amount, so that

will net to zero, hopefully we spend it all and we are going to have to give some of that back which will reduce the revenue side. Are there any questions on the revenue part?

B. Schaschek: Based on this I think you should go with the 4%.

F. Westbrook: I would say so yeah.

Mayor Bugg: Yeah.

F. Westbrook: Yeah, now that you've licked the red off my candy here, alright operating expenses, employee expense will kind of hold, we are estimating \$65,000. Professional services is up to \$25,000 and that's because we put in an additional \$10,000 to pay the professionals who will do our financing stuff, they will go and see what our, whether we are, how much we can get loans for and what have you. Credit worthiness.

J. Brown: Pardon me.

F. Westbrook: They will be doing our credit worthiness and we are estimating about \$10,000 is what they'll probably charge us for that. Our VML insurance for overhead, the office, has gone up a little bit, we put it in there at \$4,500, public safety and code enforcement that's \$11,000, \$10,000 of that is where we give the monies that we get from the fire grant. Have I said that wrong, hold on that doesn't sound right?

N. Keane: That's the expense side of it.

F. Westbrook: That's the expense side of it, but we have an additional \$1,000 because we try to give some to Kilmarnock also in addition, so it cost us \$1,000. We get \$10,000 grant in, we pay out the \$10,000 to White Stone, but Kilmarnock also serves our area and we started giving some monies to them but we put them under, that doesn't sound right guys, hold on a minute.

J. Brown: So, you give them \$1,000 and you give White Stone \$10,000.

F. Westbrook: Well, the \$10,000 is a grant and they are the first responders for us for Irvington because they are the closest.

J. Brown: So, who is getting what?

F. Westbrook: Pardon.

J. Brown: So, who is getting what?

F. Westbrook: I've told you all wrong on this.

B. Schaschek: Yeah, last year we gave \$10,000 to the fire grant and \$500 went to code enforcement.

F. Westbrook: That's right.

S. Phillips: Code enforcement is under notice and violations.

- F. Westbrook: That's what it is, thank you very much. The \$10,000 is the fire grant, the extra \$1,000 is the ads that go in the paper for code enforcement and Lara has already had a couple of, yeah, that haven't, she's had to deal with them and they haven't done what they should have done the way they should done it.
- B. Schaschek: So, you think code enforcement is up by \$1,000.
- F. Westbrook: Well, she is going to have to start putting ads in newspapers and stuff for certain things. Recently she put an ad in the paper reminding people, if you have to come to the town office and get permits, you all saw that ad, but that was posted what maybe 2 weeks ago, so that helps cover that cost. I didn't think that sounded right initially. Office expense we're up \$14,000 that's just to help with some of the papers and things that they need to get into this office but it also.
- S. Phillips: Reflects the fact that zoning is now up and operational.
- F. Westbrook: Yes, and they are using more papers and stuff. Yes. We have bought some things to help get her outfitted. Municipal expense \$14,000, this is covering, this gets things listed on the website correct.
- B. Schaschek: That is the tax collections, collection costs
- A. Marchetti: The expense for Lancaster to collect
- B. Schaschek: That's what that stuff is.
- F. Westbrook: I don't know why I'm so dead tonight.
- S. Phillips: Municipal expenses are what it actually cost to collect the tax.
- F. Westbrook: To collect our taxes.
- A. Marchetti: Collect our taxes from the county.
- F. Westbrook: Yeah, that's what we pay the county.
- F. Westbrook: Alright, I have to get my act together before this stuff goes public that's for sure. Town council expenses stated \$3,000 that includes our advertisements that go into the newspaper for the meetings and includes some fees if any of us do.
- B. Schaschek: Can we municipal expenses because part of that was elections and we had election this past year we don't have one this year.
- S. Phillips: So you could reduce it by \$3,000 I think we paid, we generally budget about \$3,000 for election.
- F. Westbrook: But we also allowed for the fact that we may be having more ads, more CUPS and things. We haven't been doing those.
- S. Phillips: Those fall under town council and planning commission.
- F. Westbrook: And planning and zoning.
- S. Phillips: And municipal expense is.

- F. Westbrook: See we didn't go up in municipal expense, I mean excuse me in planning commission.
- S. Phillips: No, no you're right, because it's never been used, we are quite comfortable with that number.
- B. Schaschek: I thought that is why we went up to the \$1,000 for the COVID enforcement stuff. Okay.
- S. Phillips: So also the reason that your town council and your planning commission COVID has affected these things, but you had a new mayor, new administration and you have a very new planning commission.
- B. Schaschek: Right.
- S. Phillips: And we anticipated everybody going to some kind of seminar.
- F. Westbrook: Training of some sort. Now these areas right there.
- S. Phillips: Orientation fees Fran, so if your planning commission or town council, even so because they can't go away to seminars, it's a way to compensate for the services when they do orientation.
- F. Westbrook: So these are areas, I mean between now and the end of this fiscal year we can probably cut from some of that.
- B. Schaschek: That's why I was saying we should cut the election. Because we are not paying any of that this year.
- F. Westbrook: Alright, so you are recommending the municipal expense we can cut down \$1,000.
- B. Schaschek: I would cut \$3,000, we have \$3,500 in there for election expense that we are not going to.
- F. Westbrook: Alright so let's look here a minute, so we spent the year before \$8,700, the year prior to that \$11,000, alright I can see that if we cut \$3,000. So, we'll take that down to \$11, okay. Alright town council.
- S. Phillips: Again, that's all your advertisements, you're whenever the town council has any kind of public notice, orientations, the same for your planning commission. I think somewhere along in here there was also \$500 for a map.
- F. Westbrook: That should have been under planning, usually. Alright so what we have been spending, okay, well we haven't spent the, there is only one year we went over \$3,000, each year for the past 2 years we have been under. So, we might can do \$2,000 there because we did build in some training that would probably.
- B. Schaschek: That's built into the \$1,850. We have the \$750 for conferences.
- F. Westbrook: \$1,850 is planning commission training, we also had allowed for some for new council members and the mayor to attend a conference, yeah. So I'm thinking that for town council we might can go down to \$2,000.
- B. Schaschek: Yeah because they can't travel.
- F. Westbrook: They can't travel, I mean, it's almost \$1,000 of three.
- N. Keane: The training we have been doing here is orientation.

F. Westbrook: I'm talking about the mayor's conference and things like that in October each year and then for new council members. Planning on that, it happens October 9th or something like that so is that your pleasure then.

N. Keane: Sure.

F. Westbrook: Planning commission, that's where we are going to get into more ads than we have been having in the past.

B. Schaschek: I would leave that like that.

F. Westbrook: Okay.

F. Westbrook: Utilities, we are anticipating it to be a little bit higher in that bigger building so we are going from \$13,600 to \$15,000.

B. Schaschek: Does it have a decent HVAC system.

F. Westbrook: It's a new one.

Mayor Bugg: Brand new one, huge.

F. Westbrook: We still have to keep the old office, heated and cooled until we sell it. Town maintenance we are leaving at \$15,500.

B. Schaschek: I have a question, did you see, it's just a curiosity thing, any decrease in the Christmas lights because we went LED. They said it is supposed to be more efficient and cost less.

S. Phillips: We normally get, I have not gotten the festoon light bill, so yes it was decreased. But seriously, I haven't gotten it.

F. Westbrook: Alright we are leaving our town maintenance at \$15,500, and then these other, the next few items that are at zeros, they will cycle off this year.

B. Schaschek: So, let me ask you a question.

F. Westbrook: Yeah.

B. Schaschek: Town maintenance is the landscape work included in the rent or.

N. Keane: The rent includes \$200 a month for leaf, snow and grass and seeing how it is like a park, it's gorgeous.

F. Westbrook: We're also, we have the mayor's discretionary fund over the years, we are maintaining at \$750, this allows the mayor to spend obviously at his discretion, sometimes we have council members who are ill or family that has passed away at the mayor's discretion, flowers or what have you, often sent, things like that.

Mayor Bugg: It has been mentioned to me that current affairs and COVID and office that we may want to consider adjusting that figure upwards. I am comfortable with whatever you guys want to do, that was suggested to me, Sharon if you want to say a few things about that.

Sharon Phillips: So examples would be again we just have the office transition and you guys do a fantastic job budgeting but sometimes things just aren't in the budget like lateral files we just found out we needed lateral files with the new office there are hardwood floors throughout, and we don't want to damage them so we are looking to protect the floors, spending wisely those things should probably just go under the mayor's discretion.

B. Schaschek: Can we use COVID CARES because we have to move out of the office.

Sharon Phillips: So I think you're going to have a conversation about how you spend your COVID money, you're right but I think there's going to be a thought of how to more efficiently spend that COVID money so whether the carpet and the filing cabinets come out of CARES or mayor's discretion.

- B. Schaschek: We could take the lateral files out of office supplies.
- F. Westbrook: That's what I was going to say, why don't we just increase office expense?

Sharon Phillips: So the reason is the treasurer is the one that asked that the mayor's discretionary fund come out of community support and tourism because mayor's discretionary fund if it lives in community support and tourism, requires specific appropriation because it's community support and tourism.

- B. Schaschek: It's an operating expense.
- F. Westbrook: That's what it is supposed to be.

Sharon Phillips: It was in community support and tourism before which required you guys to vote on it. So, it really wasn't his discretion. So, the thought is to bring it back under general operating and again, we have, there are a couple of things that have come along and it is not just flowers for someone or.

- F. Westbrook: Rannie used it in the past, there were things going on in the office we were running short in one area or another.
- B. Schaschek: The other thing is if you are buying carpet and cabinets and stuff like that, stuff like, those are assets and you put them in your capital expense.
- S. Phillips: I don't think carpet squares are a capital expense.
- F. Westbrook: What are they 36 x 36 squares? And the rolling chairs on the wood floor.
- B. Schaschek: Are you going to put the carpet down, get yourself a plastic mat, static that you create on the rolling chairs and the carpet is not good for your PCs. You have to use those plastic things that go over the carpet.

Sharon Phillips: What we are looking at is carpet squares that are felt back so there is no adhesive, they are weighted, they are commercial and this is only in the board room.

F. Westbrook: I do think maybe that would be more appropriately reflected in office expense as opposed to using the mayor's fund for that, because that's what we are using it for. So if that's the case, Sharon you plan on spending how much \$1,000?

Sharon Phillips: The lateral files are \$400 and the carpet right now is \$500.

F. Westbrook: So if we raise office expense to \$15,000 from \$14,000, does that sound.

B. Schaschek: I think so. If you think \$1,000 is going to cover it, if you think you need more than \$1,000, you think \$1,000 is sufficient.

Sharon Phillips: The carpet is \$500 and the lateral files are \$400.

B. Schaschek: But that's today, you don't know what tomorrow is. So why don't we add an extra \$500 to it because you don't know, if you don't spend it then it just.

Sharon Phillips: I do think we are in a bit of a state of flus with the new office, we just don't know what we're going to need, when we're going to need it. We were all in one room.

- N. Keane: The reason for asking for the increase on the mayor's discretionary is because it's not always going to be an office expense for something that is already in the budget.
- B. Schaschek: This we know is an office expense.
- F. Westbrook: It's six one way and half dozen the other where we put it, to me it more accurately reflects the use by having it in office expense.
- B. Schaschek: Especially since you know, so put it in the budget for it.
- F. Westbrook: We still have the discretionary fund if we need to fall back on it for. We only have to get by 6, 7, 8 more months so.
- J. Brown: So what figure did you end up with \$15 or?
- F. Westbrook: \$15,500 under office expense. Then as I mentioned above the COVID CARES act that is showing up in its entirety as an expense. The town office rent, this reflects.
- B. Schaschek: Wait. Did you up the mayor's discretionary fund?
- F. Westbrook: I left it at \$750 because we upped office expense, but if you think we need to up the mayor's discretionary fund, then yeah, just give me a figure.
- N. Keane: \$1,000, \$2,000. What are you comfortable with?

Mayor Bugg: \$2,000 is fine. \$2,000.

- F. Westbrook: Alright I've got it in there. Alright, so COVID I just explained that and then the town office rent, we think that we can use funds past December 31st.
- B. Schaschek: How many months is this rent.
- F. Westbrook: This right here represents 6 months. January through the end of June, it's likely we won't have that but I'll throw in another part of the conversation, here with the COVID stuff, we are anticipating using about \$40,000 of the total COVID funds as a down payment to get a new office going and that would leave the other \$30,000 to spend on Sharon's buckets that she has given us this list on, and, it would be cleaner I think if we

didn't divy up COVID into all these different months of rent, if we had fewer entries on COVID. We have to go through an audit from them, the county, it would be cleaner if we didn't nickel and dime ourselves with the rent for the first few months and all the moving and all of that, if we pay for that out of our funds which we pretty much allowed for in these other items here, and had a larger amount that we could put towards the town office like the \$40,000, it's going to be 6 one way half dozen the other. It's just that we'll use it under a new office, a brand new office.

B. Schaschek: And we have confirmed that we can use the funds for that.

F. Westbrook: Uh huh.

B. Schaschek: Because if they come back and say we couldn't do that you have to give it back.

F. Westbrook: I was initially concerned that if we used it for this interim office and then tried to use it again for another office but Nancyellen had a good point when we were talking about that and that we needed to get out of this other office, one we can't meet the COVID regulations in there, secondly we have the mold situation going on downstairs. We had to get out, there's no way we are going to have office space available for us immediately so this interim measure is mandatory, there is no other way that we can do what we need to do, so that was a very valid comment there. We haven't heard about an extension yet past the 31st have we. That's where I'm antsey, the thing is if we had to reimburse any of the monies we have to have a line item in our budget we just can't give that money that we haven't budgeted for. We have to have a line item from which to disburse it to give it back so we have a little bit of a cushion there. Any comments or questions on expenses.

J. Brown: What was your final figure for town maintenance you said \$15,500 but it's \$18,500, did you take 3 out of that.

F. Westbrook: Town maintenance we left at \$15,500.

Sharon Phillips: And I might encourage you to consider the reasons that that number increased was the repairs for the mold remediation, carpet removed.

F. Westbrook: Well that would be office expense though. Town maintenance is where we.

A. Marchetti: Is there a line in capital budget for that.

F. Westbrook: Town maintenance is where we do the grass cutting and all on the other stuff.

A. Marchetti: On the office building.

Sharon Phillips: There's no increase to that contract.

F. Westbrook: Right, so we left it at \$15,500.

A. Marchetti: So is that just a typo because my copy says \$18.

B. Schaschek: Mine says \$18,500 but you said \$15,500.

F. Westbrook: Well mine has \$15,500. Okay so I don't know how that got to \$18,500, but \$15,500 is what we'll go with on that.

B. Schaschek: Yeah you had \$10 in town renovations.

S. Phillips: Was it \$9,000 to do the foundation repair. Somewhere we need to find money to pull the carpet out and probably some kind of mold mitigation.

A. Marchetti: Is there a plan for if the property is going to be sold. What needs to be done a punch list?

Mayor Bugg: Sharon, will.

B. Schaschek: Capital planning \$10,000 in there.

F. Westbrook: We'll get to that under.

B. Schaschek: You need more than \$10,000.

S. Phillips: Ron Bays is right at \$10.

F. Westbrook: And that's, we've got that under. Okay we'll move onto transport and tourism. We, let's see, charitable donations they remain the same across the board. Under other, community events we left at \$10,000 not knowing whether we will have a parade next year. Flags and banners we did take up \$1,000.

S. Phillips: That \$1,000 is for flag poles and such.

F. Westbrook: Yeah crab festival, is at \$1,200.

B. Schaschek: Are you putting under, or capital, so what's the \$1,080 tourism then. If you take it out of capital.

F. Westbrook: We took it out of the capital budget because there was such a low dollar item and we put under community events, under other where we have all the things that we do for the town.

B. Schaschek: Right.

F. Westbrook: Like we just took flags and banners and added that \$1,000 to it.

S. Phillips: So, under your flags and banners is roughly the \$3,000 contract for Elbourne to install the flags and banners and then the \$1,000, for community, capital budget, again that was just flag poles. Your hardware if you will.

B. Schaschek: Why would you pull it from capital?

F. Westbrook: Because a \$15 flagpole is not capital. Not when they snap, last year we lost a whole.

B. Schaschek: Every time a truck went around that corner and hit them.

F. Westbrook: So, of course we are not doing the WIFI anymore but that has to stay on for 3 budget cycles so that the public sees you know, that will cycle off eventually. Obviously, there is a zero dollar there. The trolley we put at zero.

B. Schaschek: They're not running.

Westbrook: They are not running now and by the time this budget cycle is over they may or may not have kicked back in, but if they do it'll be okay for us because we will have the new budget by July 1 and we can budget that \$250 on the next budget cycle. Virginia River Realm we left that at \$2,000. Virginia tourism grant, this is the \$25,000 I read earlier, we have the \$15,000 in revenue that comes back to us, we have to spend \$25,000 to make that happen, so the net \$10,000 which is what will be out of pocket. Mayor's discretionary fund we moved to the other category. Irvington Golf Tournament, we left that the same at \$2,000. Any comments or questions on that.

F. Westbrook: So Fran, what does that take your community sport in terms of total number to.

F. Westbrook: That whole category is at \$51, hold on, \$51,400.

S. Phillips: So, you didn't adjust anything in there.

F. Westbrook: No, not just now, we did not.

S. Phillips: May I back up.

F. Westbrook: Yep.

S. Phillips: You did your general operating, after you made all of your adjustments, what was your total general operating.

F. Westbrook: General operating, that, the two adjustments is the occupancy tax up to \$98,000.

S. Phillips: No, general operating expenses.

F. Westbrook: Oh I'm sorry.

S. Phillips: \$273,432.

F. Westbrook: It's at \$246,952.

J. Brown: Is that operating expenses?

F. Westbrook: That's operating expense \$246.952.

N. Keane: What was three, two changes under that Fran it was the office expense going up to \$15,500.

F. Westbrook: Going up to \$15,500.

N. Keane: And you have \$2,000 mayor's discretionary fund and then there was the town maintenance that was a typo, says \$15.

F. Westbrook: It's \$15,500.

F. Westbrook: So, in other words the total is \$246,952.

N. Keane: Right, I just wanted to know what the three changes were.

F. Westbrook: Want me to go down that list real quick.

F. Westbrook: I'll call them out to you starting with employee expense \$65,000, \$25,000, \$4,500, \$11,000, \$15,500, \$11,000, \$2,000, \$1850, \$15,000, \$15,500, going down to mayor's discretionary \$2,000, \$70,490, \$8,112 and that gives it the total of....

N. Keane: Where is the reimbursement contingency fund is that still on, that's the.

A. Marchetti: That's on this sheet, does that give you a total of what you said \$240....

A. Marchetti: Yeah but we didn't change \$30,000, \$28,000 worth of stuff there.

B. Schaschek: We did not change that much. Something is not right.

A. Marchetti: Something is not right. We made changes but it wasn't more than a few thousand dollars.

C. Bradley: Town office rent.

F. Westbrook: Yeah the town office rent.

C. Bradley: The number I have is not 81.

F. Westbrook: Yeah, I just checked that, it goes all the way down, let me double check that....

A. Marchetti: \$22,000.

F. Westbrook: \$220 to \$226, yeah that's what.

A. Marchetti: I have a \$35,000 difference if I just do quick math in my head. So, if the \$273 was right then it would have been \$270.

F. Westbrook: I get \$246,952 exactly.

N. Keane: Does everyone agree with the numbers office change of \$15,500.

B. Schaschek: Fran. Your formula is not putting in the reimbursement to the contingency.

A. Marchetti: Yeah, before the thing last night I had the \$246.

B. Schaschek: It's not adding it.

A. Marchetti: \$21,000.

C. Bradley: And that would give you the right number.

F. Westbrook: Alright what's the reimbursement?

B. Schaschek: \$21,360.

F. Westbrook: Alright now that brings it up to \$268,312. Yeah, \$268,312. Alright let's go up to revenue, I have that at \$312, \$312,540, \$312,540.

B. Schaschek: We've got \$293,040. It should have gone down.

F. Westbrook: Well we went up on occupancy tax, we went from 75 to 98.

N. Keane: Oh, we don't have that on here.

S. Phillips: And you dropped the interest rate.

F. Westbrook: And we dropped the interest rates.

A. Marchetti: So the change would be this needs to go to 98.

F. Westbrook: Alright, I'll read them down the line to you okay. Starting with occupancy tax, \$98,000 that reflects the 4%.

B. Schaschek: Yes.

F. Westbrook: Total, real estate \$63,000, next \$25,000, \$10,000, \$12,000, \$2,000, \$1,000, \$2,500, \$1,500 \$10,000, \$2,000, \$50, \$15,000, \$70,490.

S. Phillips: One adjustment the \$15,000 should be \$15,250.

F. Westbrook: Which you mean down, alright \$15,250. Alright so let's do that, \$15, alright \$15,250, so it we would be out of pocket a little bit more than a 10. Alright so the new number under revenue is \$3, excuse me \$312,790, operating \$268,312, community support \$51,400, now, that brings us down to a short fall of \$6,922.

B. Schaschek: What was the short fall?

F. Westbrook: \$6,922.

S. Phillips: Is there a consideration on fractions on your occupancy like 4.25?

F. Westbrook: Let's see what that would give us. Alright, you're saying 4.25.

S. Phillips: Just a thought to see what it gets you. I suspect it's going to be 4.025.

F. Westbrook: I didn't do something right. Alright hold on.

N. Keane: If 4% gives you about \$100,000 which is what it is, a quarter of a percent will give you 4.25.

F. Westbrook: I haven't done something right....it should be roughly that....I'm getting an error, oh I'm down to less than 10% on mine. Alright so if you'll take this x the 4.24. Actually 70% of that x 4.25....that's going to give us \$6,000 more.

A. Marchetti: Almost \$7,000.

A. Marchetti: 4.5 would give us \$5,000.

S. Phillips: So one of the things I'm hearing and seeing is a change in trend, your VRBOs are obviously two key players in your occupancy tax as the Tides Inn and Hope and Glory and a handful of the VRBOs that remitted occupancy tax, I think that with the change in landscape and the change in dynamic in Irvington I'm seeing less

and less VRBOs and more long term rentals so I think the point of the conversation is I think the Hope and Glory and Tides Inn will stay strong as destinations but I think that your VRBOs have transitioned to long term rentals so those incidental VRBOs are going to not remit occupancy tax so if you go ahead and capture it from your two key players as a pass through tax.

F. Westbrook: The reason we used as the base was those two entities. What we could do, here is a suggestion.

D. Patteson: What's your definition of a long term rental?

F. Westbrook: More than 30 days.

D. Patteson: Anything at the, seasonality and where we are.

F. Westbrook: Has to do with COVID right now.

S. Phillips: There are several properties that have changed hands and they aren't no longer being used as VRBOs they used as permanent residents.

D. Patteson: [laughs]

S. Phillips: Right, so as well as several of the central VRBOs that routinely paid are either A, now a permanent home or they have transitioned to long term.

D. Patteson: Overall the VRBOs and Air B&Bs in most areas are doing very well in COVID because.

B. Schaschek: Yes.

F. Westbrook: They've gone long term. Yeah we don't get any money for the long term. Here's a suggestion for us to consider, we've got the \$21 plus \$1,000 that we owe back to our contingency fund, we could pay half of that this fiscal year and the other half next fiscal year and that would give us....

D. Patteson: A balanced budget.

N. Keane: What do you mean?

B. Schaschek: So they only want to pay half the contingency fee this year and then that would be to bind the next council.

N. Keane: That's basically an accounting thing.

F. Westbrook: That's just an accounting thing, any council can undo what a previous council does so if we paid back \$10,000 instead of the \$21,360 we would leave the occupancy at the \$98,000 that we projected for income, we would pay back \$10,000 to the contingency fund, that would, we would be in the black \$4,400.

D. Patteson: I think that is a smart idea because.

F. Westbrook: We are only talking about 6 or 7 months difference in paying it back.

Mayor Bugg: Yeah I like that.

F. Westbrook: We can wait and see, we don't have to pay it back tomorrow, we can wait until June and you know if we can we do. I mean these are different times we are dealing with now so. Does that look like, alright then what I'll do since I have this, this is updated here, we'll make sure and get Sharon to send you guys a clean copy.

N. Keane: So you're going to take your reimbursement contingency fund down to at or...

F. Westbrook: \$10,000, just \$10,000.

N. Keane: I'm trying to get all the changes because she has to put them in the ad and that brings your operating expenses.

A. Marchetti: \$258,312.

F. Westbrook: You want me to read you those again.

N. Keane: Just need the total Anthony if you figured it out.

F. Westbrook: What are you looking for operating expense?

B. Schaschek: \$252 312 is not right.

F. Westbrook: It's going to be \$256, 952.

S. Phillips: Mr. Mayor with your permission I think Fran is asking what that step might be? Council before you leave this evening everyone take the budget synopsis that you have and handwrite the numbers that we are going to share with you and so everyone is aware of what that ad would be when it hits the paper.

Mayor Bugg: Absolutely.

F. Westbrook: Okay, so that's the second page of the first advertisement. So, the occupancy tax is \$98,000, this is what you are talking about Nancyellen?

N. Keane: I'm on the operating expenses and you were taking a reimbursement contingency fund down to \$10,000 so that reduces it by \$11,360.

F. Westbrook: Yeah.

N. Keane: So, I'm taking \$11,360 off of the total of \$268,312 we had come up with.

F. Westbrook: So it would give you \$256.

N. Keane: So 12 minus \$11,360, it does give us \$256,952.

F. Westbrook: Okay.

N. Keane: So we need that figure for the budget synopsis for the ad, that's why we were interested in that number.

- F. Westbrook: Alright, that should take care of that.
- D. Patteson: Is this the municipal software package that you used.
- F. Westbrook: Say that again.
- D. Patteson: Is this the municipal software package that you used to pull all this together.
- F. Westbrook: No, no, this dates all the way back. That particular was just a spreadsheet that Jerry Latell and Bob Westbrook came up with.
- D. Patteson: Okay.
- F. Westbrook: There is no package to do, yeah I mean it is just done, get the figures off QuickBooks but.
- D. Patteson: So get the figures off of QuickBooks and plug them in.
- F. Westbrook: Plug them in.
- D. Patteson: Like Excel it does formulas automatically and you use PowerPoint with it?
- F. Westbrook: So that's why I brought it in so we could talk about it and change figures and it reflected those changes. So, what I'm prosing is that the one that we've got our changes and the new totals then we will get a clean copy of this proposed budget to you so that it will reflect all the changes we made tonight.
- F. Westbrook: We usually do when we do the public meeting. Have you not come to any for the public hearings when we do the budget. We use that big screen.
- N. Keane: Fran are you going to go over the -\$31,000 number.
- F. Westbrook: Well that changes now, I'm getting ready to do that, so the negative now becomes \$44,438.
- N. Keane: \$44,438, takes it to \$31,792.
- F. Westbrook: That's a good number, that's where it should be.
- F. Westbrook: That is a good figure. That is a good figure.
- B. Schaschek: So are you just amending the revenue, operating and tourism expenses, you are not amending the capital budget.

N. Keane: June 31st?

F. Westbrook: June 31st, July 1, same thing for cash assets.

N. Keane: June doesn't have a 31.

F. Westbrook: Okay June 30th then.

F. Westbrook: That date has that sheet well, it will say, it can be July 1 since it's the budget because it's the same figure regardless. I used cash assets that was reflected on the balance sheet, this does not have any retained earnings in it. It is strictly the cash assets we have on hand that we can get our hands on. Now that \$31,792 has now changed because of the other changes we made. That \$31,000 negative is a positive number of \$4,438, that's the net if you will off of our budget that we just went through. Let me get to that and I'll make these changes we'll be updating. Alright, our restricted funds is the CD that we have for sidewalks and that's the only thing we can spend it on so we can use that obviously.

J. Brown: CD what?

F. Westbrook: That we have for, sidewalk. I'm sorry what did I say sidewalk, bike path is what I meant. So, we take that out and then we are going to add to that \$85,000 which is just a rough estimate of what we think we can get for the town hall, we may be able to get a little bit more, it is estimated, it is on the tax books for \$90 something I think. I think between \$85 and \$90, \$90 would be good, we just estimated \$85 for right now.

S. Phillips: Does everyone understand that you guys will have to make a decision to sell the town office.

N. Keane: I mean just putting it in the budget doesn't commit you.

F. Westbrook: This doesn't obligate us to anything having it in the capital budget.

N. Keane: Yeah.

D. Patteson: Profit if we sell it.

N. Keane: That's up to you all. It's just the fact of putting it in the budget doesn't make it so.....

F. Westbrook: On the capital budget.

N. Keane: It is still property there is certain things you have to go through publicly and so forth to do that.

B. Schaschek: Is that something we can accomplish in 4 or 5 months

S. Phillips: I would encourage council to consider considering the lucrative real estate market.

B. Schaschek: What renovations have you done?

S. Phillips: Renovations are due to start very soon, let me take a look.

- B. Schaschek: As soon as they are done we need to put it on the market.
- S. Phillips: The renovations are starting October 19th.
- S. Phillips: This is not on a topic tonight but you should consider that I will need the council to direct staff what to do with the downstairs as far as carpet, do you need to consider if you want to show it with that carpet.

Mayor Bugg: That's a good idea. That's the best idea.

- B. Schaschek: You have to take the carpet out. Even if they just come in and paint the concrete slab that's fine, there are actually some nice epoxies that would be gorgeous.
- F. Westbrook: There is some good concrete....
- B. Schaschek: Especially since you don't know long term how the water is going....
- A. Marchetti: Is the water coming back in.
- B. Schaschek: Yeah, it's pretty nasty down there.
- F. Westbrook: Alright if we were to sell the town hall at \$85,000 that gets added to our readily available cash assets and I've put down in here \$40,000 from the COVID CARES Act which we would use as a down payment towards the new town office, so those are the funds that are available to us. Any questions on that part. Alright down below we have our contingency fund the goal is to bring.
- B. Schaschek: Make it \$70,000.
- F. Westbrook: Say that again.
- B. Schaschek: Just make it at \$70,000, it doesn't have to be \$80.
- F. Westbrook: No, I mean just because we've put \$80 there, we put \$80 in there because at that point in time the established the contingency fund what 2 years ago, it represented the occupancy tax if anything happened to the Tides Inn and that.
- B. Schaschek: This budget you had it at \$70,000.
- F. Westbrook: I'm sorry say it again.
- B. Schaschek: Put the \$70,000 and put the \$11,360 in year 2.
- F. Westbrook: Alright so you are saying reduce it to \$70,000 contingency. Alright we can do that.
- B. Schaschek: So that's putting \$10,000 back in.
- F. Westbrook: Alright and then we'll put the balance in.
- B. Schaschek: The following year.
- F. Westbrook: Yeah, okay, I see what you're saying. So that would bring it to \$70 and then the following year it will go back up to \$80.

B. Schaschek: Yeah.

F. Westbrook: Alright, we still have those stumps to remove over there on north commons before we can even consider putting in a storage shed. In the past we talked about a good size shed, so 40 x 60, wasn't it somewhere along that line. We have got to get those stumps up before we can have a concrete pad poured to put the building on so we've estimated about \$5,000 to have the stumps removed, tennis court repair we know is at \$8,800.

S. Phillips: May I interrupt.

F. Westbrook: Yeah.

S. Phillips: May I encourage counsel to on your 3 year prediction, every 3 years you need to budget roughly \$10,000 be it maintenance repairs, the tennis courts is generally about a 2 year warranty and I think that the tennis courts usually held up beautifully and that's one of the first projects that staff worked on in 2017 was the tennis court repair and they last roughly 3 years.

F. Westbrook: Alright anything else. Speak up. Alright, the lanterns, this is part of the Christmas decorations, this is where we took.

D. Patteson: Can we go back to the storage shed.

F. Westbrook: Yes.

D. Patteson: I don't think and someone needs to help me go through this, why this is a separate item when it all can be incorporated in the new town office and the consideration of that. The new town office should be a cure for all of that needs including storage and I know, do we have so much that we really need a storage shed for.

F. Westbrook: We have a lot of stuff, it is spread all over, those lanterns, those Christmas lanterns we hang on the flagpoles are huge, and we have all those in an old shed over on the lodge side of the Tides Inn it's a building back up over there, part of their shop, maintenance shop.

D. Patteson: Good place for them.

F. Westbrook: Well, a lot of room.

D. Patteson: I just think a shed on the north commons is going to ruin the ambience of the...

F. Westbrook: Not the style we are talking about, we are in keeping of more residential look and feel to it on the outside, we've looked at a number of styles.

D. Patteson: Is this a temporary shed?

F. Westbrook: No, no, this would go up, supposedly, this is what we've talked about in the past. At the far, well, if you are standing on the north commons looking at, standing on the main commons looking at the north commons, the storage shed will be all the way down to that end, there's a line of trees that we've cut back some of the undergrowth because we had to cut back some trees that were dead and diseased but left stumps but there is, basically wraps that curve and down the side of the field.

D. Patteson: I walk dogs past there every day.

- F. Westbrook: Okay so you know, so that would be a little bit of a buffer for the residential area but would give us an entrance from that side too so that we could theoretically gain access to that building from either side.
- D. Patteson: It would be close to the road, to Chesapeake Drive.
- F. Westbrook: Not too terribly close. I mean it won't be sitting right on top, I guess it depends where we actually decide.
- B. Schaschek: It has to have a setback for ordinances, it has to have a setback.
- F. Westbrook: Yeah well we want to probably be able to pull a truck up off the road before you get to the building, you have to have some.
- D. Patteson: I have some, heartburn over that and I just want everyone might understand, but I also think.
- F. Westbrook: We're not even ready for that, I'm just saying what you're saying.
- D. Patteson: I guess the big picture would be have the building and the storage area all in one, why spend money on \$50,000, \$40,000 on a shed that may not have applicability.
- J. Brown: I agree with Dudley I think we need to plan a town complex and have it look right and be right and not just stick a shed over there and what we are going to do next.
- F. Westbrook: That could be, but that doesn't even come into play on this budget cycle.
- D. Patteson: Okay.
- F. Westbrook: We are only looking at doing stump removal. So we've got plenty of time.
- D. Patteson: And I've got neighbors over there that ask me to deal with those stumps.

Mayor Bugg: You know exactly where they are then.

- F. Westbrook: And our guy that cuts the grass over there, he has to weed eat around some of those stumps so that's not really, I don't think that was in his contract necessarily he was just trying to keep the grass down around the stumps. I mean you're right, we have to have the whole situation...
- D. Patteson: It needs to be planned out.
- F. Westbrook: There will be a lot of talking about that here before long. We are going to have to make some other big decisions.
- D. Patteson: Thank you.
- F. Westbrook: This is just until the end of June that's all this represents.
- D. Patteson: Okay.
- F. Westbrook: So it's \$5,000 for stump removal, then we have the tennis court repair which we have already voted on to have done, I did add \$10,000 over again in the 2023/2024 column. Then we come down further still

under Christmas lights and decorations to update what we have, get new the lanterns we have budgeted \$5,000 for each of the next 4 years. The electrical renovations that goes hand in hand with those lanterns, our flag poles, the wiring on the flag pole to receive the lanterns is not up to date, is not up to code.

B. Schaschek: I thought we did that.

F. Westbrook: We are doing them a few at a time as we buy new lanterns.

Sharon Phillips: I had a phone call today with Blake Smith of Dominion Energy and Dominion Energy is going to reach out to their consultant, their consulting firm and they are going to send us a price to switch out the electricity, to switch out and get a plug-in box.

F. Westbrook: We were told at one time it is going to cost about \$1,000 per pole.

B. Schaschek: Wasn't that Elbourne that said that.

F. Westbrook: Yes.

S. Phillips: It's gotten more complex since then.

F. Westbrook: Should we just ditch that for this year and pick it up again for next year.

Sharon Phillips: Yes you can because Mike Smith with Dominion Energy shared with me the numbers for the bid he is getting us will not be available prior to your October meeting so we can't bring this to you prior to the October meeting, he knows that we hang up Christmas lights the day after Thanksgiving, I'm hoping to have this number before you guys have your second meeting.

F. Westbrook: So that's assuming we get the number and the work done.

S. Phillips: There is no way it is going to be done this calendar year.

F. Westbrook: So we can take out.

B. Schaschek: Take out all the electrical this year.

F. Westbrook: Zero out all the electrical in that column for now.

B. Schaschek: Leave all the other ones.

F. Westbrook: Flags and banners \$1,000. We can take that out too for this year. Alright town hall renovations/repairs at \$10,000 reflects what Sharon was talking about a few minutes ago, that's Ron Bay's contract \$9,800 and some odd dollars.

S. Phillips: A talking point for council again might be a punch list or if you choose to sell it as is, whatever so if you make a decision to sell that property, what would you have to do to it.

F. Westbrook: Well like you said remove that carpet downstairs.

S. Phillips: What administrative things do you have to, have it surveyed, do you have to have, what items should you associate with the sale of that building as it applies to capital.

F. Westbrook: It probably would have to be surveyed; they'd have to inspect the septic.

B. Schaschek: How do you get past that because part of the building is on somebody else's property?

N. Keane: We don't have to get a survey, the buyer would have to get one.

F. Westbrook: We can also consider doing as is can't we.

N. Keane: Yeah but if you encroach on somebody's property, I don't know.

B. Schaschek: I would say put that up to \$12,000 because we have to get rid of the carpet and we have to paint, you can't sell it even as is like that. I mean it is very bad down there.

F. Westbrook: I know.

B. Schaschek: And I'm assuming you have to get all of that stuff out there.

Sharon Phillips: So the mover moved everything upstairs but because of the mold downstairs, as well as there needs to be a priority given to downstairs what has to move with the town due to record retention and then what will be mold mitigated, I don't know if that's the right word, but everything is covered regardless of type of surface.

B. Schaschek: Are they going to spray all of that.

Sharon Phillips: It is sprayed but you still have dormant mold, so the majority of what's downstairs is 95% paper, and 5% vinyl being parade associated things, the magnetics, not to belabor this workshop but there are 40 foot books, those books need to be prioritized as to what cost is given to the book to keep the book, the maps and other things that are historical and fall under record retention absolutely you are going to have to associate some kind of cost for keeping them. The books I think, I reached out to Bay Restoration to get a quote, I told them they would have to do a site visit, there was no way I could explain like over the phone, books don't fall under record retention so we just have to get a price on what it costs to keep it, whether it's cheaper to buy a new book than it is to pay something to wipe everything, every page.

B. Schaschek: When you say books what do you mean?

N. Keane: Legal books.

Sharon Phillips: Law books.

N. Keane: The Acts of Assembly, the General Assembly, the Code of Virginia.

Sharon Phillips: There's some manuals and some record manuals, you are talking about the prioritization, The Acts of Assembly they are on line and will not be kept. I was going to say 90% of those are trash. 90% of the books there go in the trash unless anyone on council can think of someone.

Mayor Bugg: Yeah.

D. Patteson: Are any of those books left.

B. Schaschek: I think they went to the regular library.

Sharon Phillips: There are no reading books. There are a couple of manuals, again I think that 90% of the books are trash so we will have to get a cost for what it's worth to keep the remaining 10%, again if it's a manual that we can buy for \$25 it's going to be cheaper than paying for someone to wipe those down. So again that is just a little project we are working on.

B. Schaschek: I would do the \$12,000 in there versus \$10.

F. Westbrook: Alright we have zeroed out lights for renovation, we zeroed out flags and banners. Town hall renovations we are going to put in at \$12,000 is that what I'm hearing. Alright.

B. Schaschek: We're not going to do Muni Code this year so get rid of that.

F. Westbrook: Alright town hall renovations at \$12,000, information, we are looking at trying to get that stuff online, alright.

S. Phillips: Just a point of clarification, to Bonnie's point the, in your capital budget, that \$3,000, I know you put in the Virginia Tourism rate in your budget, but that \$3,000 was appropriated, where would you like for me to take it from if you remove that.

B. Schaschek: That's \$2,000 for Muni Code.

N. Keane: I don't have that in front of me.

F. Westbrook: We are not doing that, not there.

B. Schaschek: You took the \$3,000 from the contingency fund.

Mayor Bugg: Yeah.

F. Westbrook: That came from the contingency fund.

B. Schaschek: That's right, we're not going to do Muni Code in the next 6 months, they have a new representative, so I don't know who's going to talk to them.

F. Westbrook: There are other avenues on that so. Alright so now we are down to the big one, the new town office, this building is going to cost us roughly \$250,000. You want to talk about that.

S. Phillips: So the new town office, the thought process is to use the CARES funds because CARES funds can be used to purchase bricks and mortar. Your total CARES funds is roughly \$70,000. Fran has shared with you potentially using \$40 of the \$70, council can decide what else to use CARES funds for, but you do have upward, up to \$70,000 minus the roughly \$1,500 that had been spent from CARES at this point so you have close to \$70,000 that you can put towards that building. Again, that's free money to purchase bricks and mortar...

N. Keane: The issue that it is important to note about it is you can say well can deal with this later, maybe we just rented a place, we don't need to buy a place. This money has to be spent by December 30th or we lose it. So, if you don't buy something with it, or you don't buy something else with it, you have to give it back.

S. Phillips: So, the clock is ticking on spending the \$70,000 and the zoning administrator, myself, staff, budget and finance committee, the mayor, have looked at an alternative to an onsite stick-built office, it is possible for the town to actually spend that money and probably buy the 6-month turn around for the product to be delivered once we close on it we would have to have a financial transaction under our belt before December 30th to spend this money. This conversation will come up in much more detail at a later time. I think Wayne Nunnally is also in support of the conversation about the town office but that is why the lease for the town office is only for 2 years is the product that the town is looking at will be delivered in 6 months, probably take another 3 months to get plumbing, electrical and then the town would potentially have a new office in a just under 1,300 square foot town office only to the sole purpose of that building would be to be a town office, it does not include council's desire to have a large facility room but the product that we are looking at you can add onto. It is a stick-built product, it can be added onto. I think that we are potentially looking at 15 to 18 months before the town will be utilizing the north commons as its town office. Utilizing potentially \$70,000 of grant money. Combined with the sale value of the current town office so if you are using \$50,000 of the CARES money, partnered with anywhere from \$50,000 to \$80,000 of your real estate, it's a nice position for the town to have a physical town office while still maintaining your cash reserves.

F. Westbrook: We can have it paid for and still have cash reserves.

S. Phillips: Yeah pay cash.

A. Marchetti: Are you saying you might want to borrow.

S. Phillips: You don't know that you are going to qualify because you've not done, that's Dudley's point about financial.

N. Keane: You could do the transaction with the COVID funds by December 30th you could do something else

B. Schaschek: It wouldn't hurt to talk to the bank about it.

F. Westbrook: It is so different when you're a government entity and, they only allow us to even borrow a certain percentage of our financial worth and then that's determined differently for a government than would be for a private entity so, I'm not even sure what all those ramifications are, it is different for us.

S. Phillips: I don't know that you accomplish your loan criteria.

F. Westbrook: In time. Yeah, the time frame.

N. Keane: Really this is free money.

Mayor Bugg: Yeah it is.

B. Schaschek: I have no problem with the COVID money but I'm just saying, we don't want to use our cash for building we should be able to finance.

Mayor Bugg: Correct.

- B. Schaschek: The interest rates aren't going up between now and December if anything they are going to continue going down the way things are happening.
- D. Patteson: I agree with Bonnie.
- B. Schaschek: We need to pursue looking for a loan.
- A. Marchetti: It's worth looking at and finding out what we can and can't do and make that decision.
- D. Patteson: It's definitely worth looking at.
- F. Westbrook: Here's another aspect of this, this is going to further muddy the water but I mean Bob and I have been getting ready to do an addition on the back of our house, we just last week got the final rendition of the plans and of course our builder is telling us that lumber has almost tripled in price. And, I mean it's outrageous, I mean we've already jumped about \$7,000 in 3 weeks additional cost in lumber for what we want to do. I called a friend of mine, Nelson Flippo, Flippo lumber in Doswell, he's been, it's a family owned, it's been there for almost 50 years now, and I was asking him the question because I wanted to know for Bob and I, is this, he's the manufacturer, they grow the trees, they do rough cut and they send it out to be finished, to sell at Lowe's and whatever, and he told me two things, he's never seen lumber go up this fast, this much in such a short period of time, in his whole 50 years.
- B. Schaschek: Is there short demand because there's so much building and renovations.
- F. Westbrook: Well the interest rates are low, people are home and they are doing projects, they are adding the garage, they are building the shed, I mean lumber is in high demand, people are building because of the interest rates, storm damage certainly some, but it is just phenomenal how much it has gone up. Now, he also told me yesterday morning that they are starting to see it trickle down a little bit and he firmly thinks that the cost of that lumber is going to come down almost as fast as it went up but it's going to take a little while for it to trickle down to the Lowe's and whatever and the people who build these houses like we're talking about, so it's a possibility if we want to get this going as soon as we can, but we might can build the same thing for \$2,000 less if we wait for spring for it to happen. I don't know how they lock in on that.
- B. Schaschek: I think we have several avenues we can do at the same time.
- A. Marchetti: Spending the CARES money is not going to preclude us from getting a loan. I think that can happen in parallel. We can spend the money and move forward, I think it is worth noting if we make a decision and move forward in the next 2 months we are still 18 months out from being able to move in, so, we will be renting for another 2 years or longer.
- S. Phillips: If the market stays strong, there's just all kinds of options.
- F. Westbrook: Yes, our rental lease is 2 years with the option to renew for 1 more year. So we have some place to be for 3 years if we have to be there that long.
- A. Marchetti: We have the option but if we could also maybe now we can.
- F. Westbrook: Exactly.

A. Marchetti: Add 2 years on here.

- B. Schaschek: Who knows if we start now we still have 2 years that we could put on a conference room or we could put a matching shed up and keep it moving.
- D. Patteson: For budgeting purposes the \$40,000 we have there from the CARES Act does, from a budgeting standpoint only not necessarily financially feasible it doesn't marry up with the \$300,00 down at the bottom that you have for the new town office.
- F. Westbrook: That's because we changed the year end contributions from a negative number to a positive \$4.438 which was the net.
- D. Patteson: I got that that was the \$4,438, what I'm saying is if from a budget standpoint, you're on a budget 20% in cash and borrow 80%.
- F. Westbrook: Well, that's a detail that you know....
- D. Patteson: My point is that could be 60 if the town allows, it is going to cost the \$250, plus the \$30, plus the \$20 and if you have the ability to get the 60, if this is what the modular cost is going to be.
- S. Phillips: I think it was a total of \$250?
- N. Keane: No, it was a total of \$205 and \$250 to be on the very high end and then if we were able...
- A. Marchetti: They didn't give that to you with the number.
- B. Schaschek: Did they give you the foundation and everything with it.
- S. Phillips: So Lara hasn't been on the forefront of that conversation and she was confident that the \$205 number, we added about an extra 40 just because I don't think it includes parking lot.
- F. Westbrook: The site planning we have to [talkover].
- N. Keane: Let's just \$250,000, COVID money or whatever and then money from the sale of the property it brings it down to \$120 or something.
- A. Marchetti: It's still a pretty manageable number.
- N. Keane:

you could get a lot for that or you could....

- F. Westbrook: I mean that kind of money, that low. That will keep the cash reserves so.
- B. Schaschek: You're not going to raise the cash reserves so the people aren't going to be screaming so.
- F. Westbrook: So how about this, I'll rework this part of the capital budget, the other part was the most important part because that's what has to go in the paper and those figures that we needed to make that happen.

B. Schaschek, Is offset of what the capital budget will be.

F. Westbrook: No. It's just a figure, the, I'm sorry I don't understand your question.

B. Schaschek: Do we need to put the capital budget.

S. Phillips: Well no because we amended it, we added it separately.

F. Westbrook: It's there but only in a figure and that figure is the contribution to the capital budget.

S. Phillips: But when you pass your budget it will be these documents.

N. Keane: What you're doing right now is confirming numbers for the ad which is the synopsis only.

S. Phillips: Wait a minute Bonnie you are not happy, what part am I missing. Where do you want to see it on this page?

B. Schaschek: I'd have to go back and look at the one that we did last year.

F. Westbrook: That is the one that?

N. Keane: We did last year in June or July. We used that and we just updated the numbers.

B. Schaschek: So you put it on the door?

F. Westbrook: This is when we do the public hearing and everything that will happen with that.

B. Schaschek: I know we put it somewhere because I came down and.

S. Phillips: Right, so if everybody will take a look at this document, your estimated revenue, your occupancy tax is at \$98,000, your real estate is at \$63,000, personal property is at \$10,000 and we will have to adjust the revenue sources number but the total estimate revenue is \$312,790 and then you move to the right under your estimated expenses, operating expenses are \$256,952, community sport and tourism stayed at \$51,400, your capital improvements changed to a positive \$4,438, again that leaves you balanced on your total estimated revue and your total estimated expenses, \$312,790. You can't take action at a workshop, just need your consensus that this is what will go in the paper understanding you have gone up on your tax rates, on your rate.

Mayor Bugg: Do we have everyone's approval.

A. Marchetti: Understood.

A. Marchetti: Consent given.

F. Westbrook: Alright so we'll get copies to reflect all the changes to you.

THE MOTION TO AMEND THE AGENDA TO INCLUDE UNDER NEW BUSINESS THE DISCUSSION OF COVID PROTOCOLS IS PASSED 6-0.

Mayor Bugg, "Back to the approval of minutes and acceptance of treasurer's reports. The August 13, 2020 minutes are being tabled until October. Has everyone had an opportunity to review the August 2020 treasurer's reports?" S. Phillips, "Mr. Mayor and Members of Council, I distributed revised financial documents this afternoon. Please let me know if you need a copy." B. Schaschek, "What is the item for Kilmarnock on the aging report?" S. Phillips, "The Town of Kilmarnock has requested \$2,000 for the River Realm be dispersed." F. Westbrook, "On the check list, we expended \$250 to Mitchell Signs is that a different request?" S. Phillips, "Correct. That check was for the first sign Mitchell Signs repaired for us." B. Schaschek, "By Pop's? And this request is for the sign on the White Stone side." S. Phillips, "We should thank Bill Mitchell for running an ad in the newspaper for the missing sign." Mayor Bugg, "Any other comments? Moving along to public comment."

D. PUBLIC COMMENT

Mayor Bugg, "Thank you to the public for being here. In attempting to get a sense for what everyone wants to discuss tonight can I see a show of hands for anyone who wants to speak on the Through Truck Restriction and the Turkey Trot? I would ask that you limit your comments to 1.5 minutes or so. Come up to the table when you speak and please state your address." D. Headley, "David Headley 51 Edgewood Lane. Wayne Nunnally why aren't you here to support me? Is the use of Salem Road as a bypass for Irvington as far as the transfer trucks is that still under consideration? My wife and I are concerned about the transfer trucks coming through Irvington and we see them all the time. We own two lots on Salem Road. If you turn on Salem Road before you get to the curve we own 2 parcels on the left. We bought the first parcel in 2008 and realized right away that we had a problem coming out of the driveway. The curve was too close to us and we have taken our life in our hands getting out of that traffic. About 4 or 5 years ago we came closer to Route 200 and purchased the second parcel adjacent to ours. That driveway which is the one we use gives us a longer view up towards the curve where the traffic is. I don't think anybody realizes as we do because we are up there working on that land cutting grass and trying to raise a garden the volume of traffic on that road is tremendous. The thing that is the most alarming is that most people don't pay attention the speed limit. What you have got is heavy traffic and going fast because of the traffic and heavy volume we think the road is too narrow and curvy too many residents on the road, a golf course, Westminister Canterbury, there is just too much traffic on in. We believe that if you put those transfer trucks on that road you are going to have a problem. We were hoping that one or two of you or all of you could go and sit in our driveway for an hour or two and watch the traffic go by and you will be amazed at the speed. I would invite you to do that and to consider an alternative to Old Salem Road." J. Roberts, "John Roberts, 132 Lancaster Drive. Thank you for this opportunity to address you all. I ate my very first ever soft shell crab at the dining room of the Irvington Beach Hotel down Steamboat Road in 1942 and there was a lot less traffic back then. More recently I have live at Westminister Canterbury for the past 6.5 years and I am the president of the residents association. The action taken by the Irvington Town Council at its August 13 meeting as reported in the Rappahannock Record on August 20 has awakened a sleeping giant. We at RWC, the folks at the cottages community at the Golden Eagle, and the folks living on Ring Farm Road support your desire for speed control in Irvington. Irvington is our town too. To borrow from one of the almost 90 letters and emails I have received on this subject and I quote, we attend church, eat, shop, buy gas, use the bank and post office, have accounting and legal business in Irvington, end quote. We want it to be safe and welcoming and a destination for local folks and visitors alike. However, we fail to understand your proposed course of action namely to convince the county board of supervisors and VDOT to reroute truck onto Old Salem Road that may be going 50-60 mph which was reported in the last meeting. Old Salem is at its center a narrow winding blind curved thoroughfare that serves as the only road accessible to the largest concentration of senior citizens in Lancaster County. The combined number of residents of the above mentioned communities and of their support staff, vendors and charitable organizations which use these communities is excess of 500 people per day. It would be unconscionable to add trucks to Old Salem. If the through trucks which you wish to reroute are tractor trailers from out of the area there is a roadway for them outside of Kilmarnock and they should be directed to it. If through trucks are, as I suspect, large trucks belonging to local business that should be addressed with the owners of those businesses. As I stated in my letter to the Rappahannock Record on August 27 there are other options for controlling traffic speed among which is a traffic light which is activated

by approaching vehicle speed. Let's work together to solve this issue but not by simply moving it into another neighborhood in our town. Thank you." D. Lowdy, "Dean Lowdy, Westminister Canterbury. I have also lived in Irvington and I think it is a great town but I think it is a terrible mistake to put any more traffic especially truck traffic on Old Salem Drive. I wonder if any of you realize, or if you have not driven I suggest that you do, that there are no shoulders on Old Salem Road. If you meet a bicycle or pedestrian something has to happen they cannot pull off because the ditches are 4 feet deep. It is a terrible idea to put more traffic and that kind of traffic on Old Salem Road. I will say, I have seen or I came out right after it happened a head on collision on one of those curving roads lined by trees where 2 automobiles one of them over the line just a little bit and that is all that it took. It is a very dangerous road. It is a very dangerous option to put more traffic on Old Salem Road. Thank you." S. Bunting, "Stuart Bunting, I spend most of my time at 132 Lancaster Drive but I don't live there. To echo what our residents have shared with you today. I appreciate you giving us time this evening recognizing that we are not actual town citizens but as Mr. Roberts said we do consider Irvington our town as well. What I have to share with you are written comments that Mr. Roberts has referenced, his comments. I won't go through those but to make the same points that my colleagues have made we are concerned about the additional traffic volume and the size of the traffic that will be on Old Salem Road if that is the solution that is advanced. To that we are more than willing to engage in any dialogue necessary to help to find a solution because we don't see any advantage to excess speeding through the town of Irvington any more so than you folks who actually town business and representatives do. There is a viable alternative that already exists through Harris Road that we don't feel needs to be duplicated by adding Old Salem Road to the package of options for large vehicular traffic. You have heard about some of the inherent risks to the road with respect to no shoulder, bicyclist use that road frequently this time of year. It is not uncommon to find 2 or 3 together in a pack moving along and they have absolutely no option of 2 vehicles are passing each other. There is no way for the vehicles to give way to the bicyclist and the bicyclist has a very unattractive list of options available to get themselves out of the situation because there is no shoulder. With that we invite ourselves to the party to the extent which we can find a solution here and hope that solution is something other than Old Salem Road. Thank you for your time. I will leave these with your clerk." A. Pollard, "Albert Pollard Jr. 48 Steamboat Road. I am here to speak on behalf of the Village Improvement Association on the specific topic of the Turkey Trot. Michelle Lyberger could not be here tonight. The VIA wants to pull together a very modified and slimed down Turkey Trot this year. We hope that you all could appoint an informal subcommittee of a town council member and staff and we have a subcommittee that can work through the protocol. We are confident that we can work with town staff to come up with guidelines that meet the spirit of the letter of the Governor's Phase III code guidelines. Our idea is to have a rolling start every 2-5 minutes spread over 2 hours and that way we are confident that any one time there will only be a fraction of 450 people that started last year. Further we have no plans for registration because that involves crowding. We will have multiple tables with clipboards to set up with waiver forms. Socially distanced stations for participants to que off for the rolling start to avoid lines. Everyone will wear a mask until they start. We will not have any awards or food which would result in folks congregating in one place. Our goal is for folks to come to Irvington, start moving and have a good time at the Trot and leave relatively quickly. If you want to appoint a working group and we can come back to the October meeting." J. Harris, "Julie Harris, 1099 King Carter Drive. I'm coming tonight as president of the VIA and on behalf of the VIA I would like to thank council for allowing the VIA to have the concert on the Commons on September 3. There were approximately 150 people in attendance. Everyone practiced social distancing and had a good time so again, thank you." Mayor Bugg, "Anyone else? One more thing, for those of you addressing the through truck restrictions we are going to be addressing a lot of the points you brought up in this meeting. If you can stay, I ask that you do so that you can hear what we have to say later in this meeting because I think it is important to all of us."

E. REPORT FROM THE ZONING ADMINISTRTOR - L. Brown

L. Brown, "Thank you Mr. Mayor. My report for this month involves this past planning commission meeting. Mayor Bugg swore in 2 new planning commission members Chris Braly and Brian Forrester. Also, at the last planning commission meeting the planning commission recommended approval of the following CUP

applications to the town council for review tonight; CUP 2020.5 and CUP 2020.6. Last month we had 2 road issues that VDOT handled quickly and efficiently when we reported them. One had to do with some drain pipes along Railway after the hurricane and the other, again because of the hurricane, a downed tree on King Carter. A tree permit was issued, a fence permit, there will be 5 sign permits tonight that you will address, 2 after the fact permits were also handled. I completed 2 site visits this month. A preliminary site visit for a resident who wishes to put in a pool and a post construction site visit for a property owner regarding impervious credits. One citizen complained regarding tall grass that was handled. The zoning notice was put in the Rappahannock Record on September 3 regarding residents and contractors to contact the zoning department before commencing work. Thank you."

F. REPORT FROM THE TOWN ATTORNEY - Nancyellen Keane, Esq. N. Keane, "I have no report tonight."

G. REPORT FROM THE MAYOR - Mayor Bugg

Mayor Bugg, "I will begin reporting on the through truck restriction on Route 200. I want to report to council about the subject of through truck restriction on Route 200. This restriction was adopted at the August 13, 2020 meeting of council following a public hearing. Since its passage we have received 3 emails and 2 phone calls from persons associated with RWC speaking against this action. Let me provide a brief chronology. On May 14, 2020 council authorized efforts to proceed toward adoption of through truck restriction. May 14; June 11, July 9 and August 13, 2020 the through truck restriction was discussed publically on at least 4 occasions. Next, May 28 and 29 Irvington at that time reached out to Lancaster County officials to advise of this proposed restriction and to establish open channels for communication. July 6, 2020 VDOT settled on Old Salem as the appropriate alternative route. VDOT road Old Salem, Route 646, at that time prior to making the making the recommendation to Irvington. July 9, 2020 was the first reading held for Resolution 2020-10 for Old Salem Road. July 30, 2020 the public hearing for the restriction was advertised in the Rappahannock Record. August 13, 2020 the public hearing was held and all those in attendance and all those who wrote emails were in favor. Resolution 2020-10 Old Salem Road was adopted. The restriction was passed. May 21, June 18 and August 20, 2020 the Rappahannock Record reported several times on Irvington's actions related to the restriction. August 21, 2020 Irvington was called by supervisor Westbrook who advised of a complaint by RWC regarding Old Salem Road as an alternative route. August 31, 2020 Irvington called a meeting which was attended by VDOT, Irvington, and Lancaster County to discuss the issues and to hear from VDOT about its reasoning. As a result of that meeting all in attendance have a better understanding of the matter. This evening I have asked Mr. David Beal, VDOT to attend tonight to provide everyone with a brief history of this matter and VDOT's reasoning. With that, David would you please come forward?" D. Beale, "I'll start this with a couple of policy documents. The first part of step one is the locality request. When we started talking about a through truck restriction we were very early in the process and we notified the town this would be a joint request from the town and the county and until the county is on board with what the town wants to do there is no request of VDOT. Mayor Bugg gave a good chronology of the events that got us here but one thing I would revise is VDOT has not decided anything we can only make recommendations. The next part of this process because there are 3 more steps, we have to go to the district traffic engineer who does an engineering study, signs in a sealed bid, and he reports to the district engineer. We advertise for a public hearing or at least post willingness. We know that Pride of Virginia trucking association, we have talked to the Commonwealth Transportation Board (CTB) member and from there it goes to the safe traffic engineer who reviews the request for compliance and finally it makes it to CTB with a recommendation of approval or denial for consideration for final action. That process and the regulations which we are required to complete within 9 months from the localities request. Once the resolution is passed there is still a lot that happens before the through truck restriction could be posted. As an example, the through truck restriction in Kilmarnock is the most recent in local example that we have to follow so I printed an exhibit that shows the restricted route and the alternate route. You can see the red is the route through Kilmarnock and the blue is the alternate route. The alternate route is slightly longer and follows parallel generally to the restricted route. When the CTB considers the request they do so and I

understand from reading the policy document that it's the philosophy of the CTB that all vehicles should have access to the roads on which they are legally entitled to travel. Truckers pay taxes and fuel tax just like everybody else so the thought is that they have access to the roads that they have a legal right to travel. It is a balancing act before the approval it is not an easy consideration. We look at all the users of the roadway and what makes sense. In doing that we try to minimize the length of the alternate route. If you look at this board, if we restrict truck traffic through Irvington on Route 200 the shortest alternate route is Route 3 and across Old Salem. I believe the distance from White Stone to Pittman's Corner is 2.8 miles. If you take Old Salem it is 3.2 miles. The requested alternate route is .4 of a mile further than the restricted route. My recommendation, we drove Old Salem, we drove Harris and Harris has already been deemed a suitable alternate route so the question for me is Route 646 Old Salem an acceptable route. They are similar in width they both have double yellow center line, a white edge line, the lanes are approximately the same on Harris as they are on Old Salem. The location of the hospital on Harris Road the lines of sight are much clear because the vegetation has been removed. That is one main difference. The ride on the two routes are very similar. I made the recommendation that Old Salem and we were certainly not aware of any objections from the county but knowing we still have to move through the process with the county there is an opportunity for that. That was the recommendation, use Old Salem because the route from White Stone to Harris Road and back down Route 200 which is the way we would measure the alternate route is almost 5 miles further than the direct route so the ask for the CTB for the consideration just gets bigger and is less likely to be approved. I can't say it won't be approved and I can't say it will be approved. I can just say the alternate route is now almost 5 miles longer than the alternate route being less than half a mile. It is just a bigger ask. We also talked through other possibilities such as restricting the entire route of Route 200 from Harris all the way back to White Stone but then anybody wanting to get to Weems from the north or south would have to drive o the restricted route because there is no other way to get there. There would be more trucks coming through town legally because they could go into Weems legally coming through town but with the through truck restriction if their manifest does not show that they have a delivery in town or within the restricted route then they are not supposed to be there. That was my thought to use Old Salem but again Lancaster County has to weigh in on what is appropriate for them as an alternate route. I just have a couple of pictures, I'm sure you have seen signage but if you don't drive trucks you may not have noticed it before. Signage on Route 3 part of VDOT's role on a through truck restriction, once it is approved we have to have a sign plan. We will have signs on 3 of the 4 legs at White Stone advising trucks not to come down Route 200 and then signs on Route 200 advising trucks not to come that way. All of this is worked out after the request is finalized and this is just one part of the sign plan. This one is at the intersection of Route 3 and Harris Road. This is an example that says part of the other part of detour if you use Harris Road as the detour you include Route 200 to get back to the northern part of the Kilmarnock town limits. Signing plan becomes much more complicated and you end up with at least 3 times the amount of signs because you have to sign every route and intersection and tell people as they approach Route 200 not to return through the restricted route. Mr. Mayor, that is all I have prepared. Did you want me to speak to anything else or have any questions of me?" Mayor Bugg, "I imagine it would interest the public to know more about the signage. Is there going to be a particular sign directing them down Old Salem or will it say no through trucks in Irvington?" D. Beale, "Like I said, I think the signing plan would be done once the request was approved. A lot of that is dependent on the starting and ending point of the restricted route but looking at the board there would be signs in White Stone and likely signs on Route 3 designating that a route and Old Salem and then we have signs here off of Weems Road, we have signs coming out of Kilmarnock town trucks use Harris Road and not come down through town. A lot of that needs to be thought through. It would be something similar to the signing plan that we did for Kilmarnock." Mayor Bugg, "Thank you David. Both the public and you have provided a lot of information that we will take under advisement and discuss at the next meeting." D. Patteson, "You mention that the primary reason for choosing Old Salem is because of the shortness of distance which makes it easier to get approved with CTB is there any other factor like shorter distance that you weigh in on when you make the decision. You have Harris Drive with a high concentration of commercial enterprises from the hospital to the rescue squad, doctor's offices and then yet Old Salem is primarily comprised of residences for seniors. Where do people come into your equation and the type of dwellings that line the roads that you are assessing?"

D. Beale, "I think 2 parts. People come in the localities request because the request comes from the locality. For us, we tend to look at traffic volumes and engineers like numbers so the traffic volume on Old Salem is 1,300 vehicles per day that was counted last year and Harris Road I didn't write it down so I want to double check but if my memory serves the traffic volume is 1,600 per day which makes them comparable and for a 2 lane road both routes are considered fairly low volume relatively speaking." Mayor Bugg, "Thank you David. We will take this under advisement and discuss at the next meeting. The next item in my report is the COVID workplace policy, I believe you all have received this today. I asked staff to create a draft policy to bring to the town in compliance with Virginia Department of Labor and Industry regulations related to COVID-9. We should consider this document and either pass it tonight as emergency legislation or put it on the agenda for next month. What are your thoughts?" D. Patteson, "Is this something that can be amended as we move forward or should we adopt it tonight and find things might be difficult." Mayor Bugg, "A lot of this we are already doing." F. Westbrook, "Is this informational or do we need to take action." N. Keane, "We need to have a policy in order to enforce some of the things in here. The regulation site, Virginia Department of Labor and Industry which is sited at the top of the page, provides the framework but if you don't have a policy for your particular jurisdiction then you can't do some of it. For example, the Governor's Executive Order requires plans but not others if you have a policy you can require someone who has been exposed to or has COVID to have a test before they come to the office or a meeting that is not a requirement that is a general requirement in the state executive orders but you can adopt a policy that requires that. If you look at our draft, mandatory for all employer's certain things we put in there come under the regulation that requires you to have a policy similar to the FOIA law that allows you to adopt a policy to let a councilmember attend by phone like Wayne is doing now but you can't do it if you don't have the policy. You can't do some of the things on this page unless you adopt a policy. Wayne, this is the document that you received that has letterhead at the top." W. Nunnally, "Found it." F. Westbrook, "This seems to me to be something we should adopt as policy and as you said we are already doing some things but there are some things we need to give serious thought to." N. Keane, "For example, if you adopt this policy if you look at J, 5 screen entrance to meetings. If you adopt this policy we would be required to screen people coming to our meetings the people in the audience as well as the participants for temperature, asking if they have been exposed in the last 10 days. This is what a lot of organizations are doing and as a local government we should be meeting those requirements." Mayor Bugg, "Any further comments? Can I get a motion to approve and adopt?" D. Patteson, "So move." F. Westbrook, "Second." Mayor Bugg, "Further discussion? All those in favor and all those opposed."

THE MOTION TO ADOPT RESOLUTION 2020-11 TC IS PASSED 6-0.

S. Phillips, "Is the council interested in hearing the staff report?" L. Brown, "Regarding CUP 2020.5 Forrester; Town Code §154.051 (e) 11; the contemplated use is authorized in R-1 under boat docks for private use. This property is located in a residential area with similar piers of the same size. The contemplated use of this property is consistent with the amended comprehensive plan. Piers are allowed in the R-1 district. The location of the proposed pier is appropriate and not in conflict with the amended comprehensive plan. The proposed application does not adversely affect the public health safety, moral, and general welfare, and is in compliance with the Chesapeake Bay Act. The proposed project does not adversely affect the environment or surrounding properties. Private residential pier will not have any impact on hours of operations as in the business district. No application has been made for a sign permit at the time of this application. Notice to property owners within 300' were mailed or delivered in person by the applicant Brian Forrester. The certification of listing was received August 6, 2020. No opposing letters were received. Notice of the joint public hearing of the planning commission and council about this application was advertised twice in the Rappahannock Record one week apart on July 30 and on August 6. With the joint public hearing taking place 5 days after the last advertisement on August 11, 2020. Staff recommendation - this application meets all legal and regulatory requirements and I recommend approval. The planning commission recommends approval of the CUP application." Mayor Bugg, "Thank you. Now I need a motion to approve the CUP."

2. Second reading Resolution 2020-12 TC

L. Brown, "Under Town Code §154.126 Use Regulations for Industrial Limited District M-1 any structure to be erected or land to be used shall be for all permitted uses in R-1, R-1, B-1, B-2, or one or more uses in M-1 (a-i). The contemplated use, 1 office building and 2 apartments is mixed use and is authorized in the business district therefore allowed in M-1. The proposed use is similar in nature as the Dredge shops, offices, apartment and also similar to Ann Meekins professional office and the Vine, Kip building with an apartment above. The duplex on Tax Map Parcel 33-377A is a duplex on a similar lot in size which is also an approved use in R-1. For lots recorded prior to March 9, 1989 the minimum lot area shall be exempt from the 1.5 acre requirement. This lot was recorded on July 31, 1975. This property is located within area serving mixed uses in residential, professional offices, apartments, industrial uses, and government office. In the amended comprehensive plan there is a goal to provide more affordable housing options for younger adults and persons of more limited income such as teachers such as Mr. Pollard is proposing as possible renters for this establishment. The mixed use established by similar properties in B-1 is consistent with the amended comprehensive plan. The proposed application does not adversely affect the public health safety, morals, and general welfare. The proposed project is not adversely affect the environment or surrounding properties. Parking will be provided for each apartment of 2 spaces and the applicants office is already served with 1 parking space. There is room for 8 parking spaces. No application has been made for a sign permit at the time of this application. Notice to property owners within 300' were mailed or delivered in person via the applicant. Certification and listing was received July 28, 2020. Of the 18 letters, 11 responded favorably; none opposed. Notice of a joint public hearing of the planning commission and the council about this application was advertised in the Rappahannock Record one week apart

on July 30 and August 6 with the joint public hearing taking place 5 days after the last advertisement on August 11. The planning commission recommends approval of this application." 3. Motion to authorize the VIA to hold 2020 Turkey Trot subject to conditions W. Nunnally, "So move." Mayor Bugg, "I believe we heard Mr. Pollard and Mrs. Harris speak in detail about this. Would anyone else like to comment or discuss in further detail?" W. Nunnally, "I will not be Thanksgiving if we don't have the Turkey Trot." F. Westbrook, "I do think we need to be aware with the COVID for athletic activities outside is different than holding a Farmers Market. I guess we need for, is there anyone here for the Turkey Trot?" J. Harris, "I'm here." F. Westbrook, "There are some considerations for people who are running, moving and breathing so it might be worth them having that information. I am a little antsy about having the event." Mayor Bugg, "I don't think you are alone." N. Keane, "In looking into this there were some discussions about whether other people are having in person racing and it looks like, for example, Monument Avenue 10K is being held virtually over a period of 3 or 4 days. Three River Health District does not recommend in person races. The problem is you have to have 10' for social distancing rather than 6' and our road is either 12' or 15' wide. The question is, how would they control the number of people? We are going to call the sheriff's office to be here for any public event and I'm guessing the sheriff's office would want to see the road closed." F. Westbrook, "Doesn't that have to be done by the state police?" W. Nunnally, "I withdraw my motion and suggest we table this until they get all of that information." F. Westbrook, "They can't wait for us to table it because time is of the essence for them they only have 2 months." Mayor Bugg, "Mrs. Harris could you speak tabling this?" J. Harris, "I don't know the details. There was a race in Williamsburg last weekend. The VIA is considering, it was an actual race and not virtual, what we are considering is having staging areas on the Commons so that you are running with your family or people that you know. As Mr. Pollard stated it would be rolling so everybody is not going at the same time that was our thought of being able to ensure social distancing." Well, I don't know." J. Harris, "There is no fees and no registration but they will ask for sponsors for the shirts but there is not timing, no medals, no food, you just start the rolling time. Mr. Pollard is planning to be the announcer if we are able to have the event and he would call Group A to run and 2 minutes Group B would start and so forth." A. Marchetti, "There is a 250 person limit, how does that apply?" N. Keane, "If you are going to be on the Commons staging people there would probably be a requirement to enclose that and make sure not to exceed 250. You usually have a lot more people for the Turkey Trot but if you are not charging people how will you monitor?" D. Patteson, "Has this been done like this somewhere else?" J. Harris, "I don't know how Williamsburg did theirs but I know they did a 5K. If you approve the go ahead to investigate that to add to what we are thinking of doing we could investigate more races." D. Patteson, "I think we need more facts before we vote. The informality of what they are describing may very well work but because it is so informal a late notice might also be a part of what they just have to live with. Not getting out 30 days ahead of time, not 60 days, just 30." Mayor Bugg, "Are we going to table as Wayne suggested?" J. Brown, "Can we add this to the September 23 workshop meeting?" F. Westbrook, "You can't vote at a workshop." N. Keane, "You can call a special called meeting at the end of the workshop." F. Westbrook, "That is a budget and finance workshop, right?" N. Keane, "It is a town council workshop used for budget and finance and the amended budget." F. Westbrook, "The reason we didn't get to do it this time is because that time slot got usurped for something else so I am hesitant, personally, to lend that time because we only have an hour allocated so I am hesitant to give up that time yet again." Phillips, "Yes, they did the repair 4 years ago. This is something that Council should consider including in the budget on a 2 to 3 year rotation. The cracks will reoccur because it is the nature of the product. The tennis courts are in good health overall." F. Westbrook, "Are you looking to get started on this soon?" S. Phillips, "It is a safety concern because the membrane, the patching material is in the alleys of the tennis courts." F. Westbrook, "Bonnie do you remember what we put on the capital budget for tennis courts? We had addressed this previously." B. Schaschek, "Actually we didn't put anything in the budget for this year but it is in the budget for next year." F. Westbrook, "We were counting on going a little bit further out but there is in the capital budget plan it is in the column for next year and not this year. How do we do that?" N. Keane, "Contingency." F. Westbrook, "We could do that." S. Phillips, "It is at the point where you would have to close the courts." F. Westbrook, "They are closed now because of this. We could do the contingency but then when we do the amended budget this needs to be in there so it can be replenished." B. Schaschek, "There were several different options. Which option do you want to go with?" A. Marchetti, "Option 1 or 2 because option 3 was brand new courts. The difference between option 1 and option 2, note that option 2 has a 2 year warranty and it will look nice and new. Option 1, I get the impression, it will look patched. Option 2 does have a 2 year warranty and it will look like it should." D. Patteson, "There are a lot more people playing tennis." J. Brown, "Do you have to do the crack repair before you do option 2? Is the real cost of option 2 really those 2 added together because it says the crack repair system is installed over the repaired cracks. It doesn't have any wording in option 2 that says the cracks are going to be repaired. Is the real cost \$20,000 as opposed to \$9,000." F. Westbrook, "No, I don't think so." J. Brown, "If you read the fine print it says the crack repair system is installed over the repaired cracks but you don't have crack repair except in option 1." B. Schaschek, "This is option 1 plus the other steps. That is how I read it." W. Nunnally, "Does that mean they are repairing the cracks and then they are putting the stuff over them?" J. Brown, "The way it reads it is not clear if we are paying for option 1 and option 2." S. Phillips, "I met with the representative but I didn't capture Jackie's question in my conversation. If you are interested in moving forward, the motion might be, if

you are interested in option 2 you make the motion to move forward to option 2 only if it is turn-key and includes the crack repair." W. Nunnally, "It says right there, over the repaired cracks." F. Westbrook, "I would like to remind everyone that the capital budget includes \$5,000." W. Nunnally, "Can we use the COVID money?" K. Schaschek, "You only have \$10,000 in your emergency fund. You have already spent \$3,000." F. Westbrook, "No, there is \$80,000 in contingency." B. Schaschek, "No." F. Westbrook, "The contingency fund has \$80,000 and we have used 3,000." B. Schaschek, "You also used \$6,600 and we have spent \$10,000-\$15,000." Mayor Bugg "Are we comfortable with option 2 with the contingency stated that it includes crack repair?" B. Schaschek, "That is how I am reading it but we should verify it." A. Marchetti, "I think it is better safe to confirm rather than to assume." B. Schaschek, "Can we make a motion?" S. Phillips, "The motion would be contingent on the verification that option 2 includes the items in option 1 if they are not included we will only move forward with option 1." Mayor Bugg, "Can I get that motion? Motion to authorize mayor to execute the contract authorizing option 2 contingent on it including crack repair as well." A. Marchetti, "So move." D. Patteson, "Second." Mayor Bugg, "Discussion? All in favor and all opposed."

6. Repairs to Town Office

S. Phillips, "For any members of Council that are not aware, on the right side of the office building ground water is coming under the foundation and allowing water to stand in the basement. It has also caused general erosion and there are 2 or 3 factors that cause the water to come under the foundation. The topography of the ground simply causes the water to accelerate down the hill. There is a tree growing at the foundation of the apartment building that is higher than the town office building. The tree and the existing gutter system force the water to run under the foundation. The gutters on the town office should be leveled to prevent further damage. The contractor intends to cap the gutter that is closest to the front door and force the water to the back of the building. The bid is to install window wells around the access hatch, when you remove the hatch you have access to oil burning furnace so you have to maintain access. The erosion has been going on for so long has eroded and forces the water into the basement. As the contract states, Mr. Bay's will dig that out, install gravel and window wells. Window wells are rounded thus allowing access to the furnace hatch but will force the water to move away from the building." W. Nunnally, "Sounds like a COVID repair to me." B. Schaschek, "Were there 2 estimates?" S. Phillips, "No. After the last hurricane water came into the town office and into the basement that caused black mold so the \$690 from Bay Restoration was in response to the emergency. Bay Restoration brought in dehumidifiers and air dryers. The next step is to pull the carpet out of the basement and to prevent the water from coming under the foundation." B. Schaschek, "What is the cost of the outside piece?" S. Phillips, "\$9,535 per his email. The scope of work is as follows: on the right hand side dig down at least 4' to expose the foundation and footing where leaking is occurring. Pardge, paste, and plastic the foundation wall, install gravel, drain pipe for future drainage, install metal window wells at access door for window, fill wells 2/3 gravel for drainage, backfill and raise grade elevation along building to allow water to run away from building, seed and straw for erosion control, install new 6" commercial gutter and downspout on the right side of building. Total cost: \$9,635." W. Nunnally, "Mr. Mayor, as chairman of the facilities committee I would like to table this particular problem and discuss it in connection with what we need to discuss in closed session before we spend \$9,000." B. Schaschek, "Does this affect the neighbors on either side?" S. Phillips, "That is an excellent question. This is an expedited minimized project because there could be a much larger solution. The larger solution would involve property owners to the right and left of the town office. The town office building is over the property line on the left side of the property. It is only a few feet to the right hand side of the town

office. There is a reasonable size tree that is pushing the foundation of the apartment building. If the project were to be completed on a larger scale we would remove the tree and grade the earth which would then involve 3 different property owners and the project would become much more complex. This solution only involves the town office. Wayne, I appreciate your concern but I think from a health safety stand point the town office needs to be relieved of the serious mold situation which is exacerbated every time it rains due to the ground erosion. The rains from yesterday will leave water and subsequent mold in the basement." F. Westbrook, "I don't think it is good to have staff working in a mold situation and I think we should mediate that. Wayne, I understand this is a lot of money and some things are up in the air but I think we should repair it now." B. Schaschek, "There is money in the capital plan." Mayor Bugg, "Anything further? 7. Centric Business Solutions

S. Phillips, "This vendor called the town office one day as an unsolicited phone call. This vendor has a contractor in Tappahannock and is working on a contract for Lancaster County Sheriff's office. The initial question was how much do you spend on toner cartridges per month. On average we spend \$400 per month on toner cartridges and due to anticipated increased volume in other departments and considering that town council meeting packets are on average upwards of 60 pages. The vendor stated he could provide a bigger, better, and more efficient printer for less than we are spending on toner cartridges right now. One thing that has changed substantially is the deliverables generated by the zoning department. Our current printer is limited to 8.5x11. I have provided you with the specs on the potential new printer. This is not a new conversation as we have discussed the viability of the current printer several times in the past." F. Westbrook, "The new printer will print 11.5x17 in addition to 8.5x11? We are currently spending \$457 and they are telling us they can do this for \$355.08 but then they mention on page 5 they are allowing only so many copies per month at a particular rate and that was factored into the \$355.08 and they will read the meter and if we go over." S. Phillips, "These questions were factored into the conversation, how much toner is used, how many reams of paper are used, how many black and white versus color. We use about 75% black but if we had options that were not cost prohibitive we would use more color." F. Westbrook, "Lara, do you see the size of 11x17 being advantageous to the zoning department?" S. Phillips, "We will also be able to scan large plats and surveys." B. Schaschek, "And this will scan also?" S. Phillips, "This agenda item does not require immediate action." B. Schaschek, "We should look at other options as well." S. Phillips, "If you purchase a printer you are still burdened with the cost of the toner." B. Schaschek, "The only thing that concerns me about a lease option is 63 months is 5 years of the same printer and technology changes too fast." F. Westbrook, "Would they consider a 3 year lease but the monthly cost would increase." B. Schaschek, "Has the toner cost gone up that much." S. Phillips, "We pay between \$450-\$470 with current usage and with the anticipated increase in usage I expect the cost will only increase." B. Schaschek, "I know you had switched to a less expensive toner." S. Phillips, "I had to switch back to using Cannon cartridges because the off brand cost more in down time." F. Westbrook, "Would this mean that with the 60 page packets that we are getting that perhaps the town would be willing to print the packages for members of council?" S. Phillips, "The town office is currently printing over 50% of the

packets for members of council. At this point it is more of an opt out for members of council otherwise I print packets for council." Mayor Bugg, "Do we want to move on this now?" B. Schaschek, "I think we want to look at more options." Mayor Bugg, "We will table this until October."

8. Bill Mitchell Signs

Mayor Bugg, "Motion to approve proposal to repair or replace sign." S. Phillips, "After the last storm Mr. Mitchell who is very kind and generous to the town, noticed the town sign was missing. Part of the frame is still in the ground but the sign and part of the frame is broken and missing. Mr. Mitchell also wrote a letter to the newspaper asking if anyone had seen the sign. I suspect when they harvest the corn in that field they will find the missing sign. A couple of members of council and Mr. Mitchell walked into the field but were not able to find the missing sign. As you can see the proposal is \$320 for him to rebuild the frame and to build a new sign." Mayor Bugg, "Are we okay with this? Can I get that motion?" B. Schaschek, "So move." D. Patteson, "Second." I am offering suggestions so that we can get a conversation going but I do think that since we have asked that the office is by appointment only otherwise it is closed to the public. I ask that the door remain locked to prevent people from just walking in. The office should be by appointment only. I would like to ask that council members refrain from going in to the office if a phone call will take care of it. I would like to ask that committees, if you have questions or things you need perhaps you work through the committee chair or the commission chair, work through the committee chair and let them work with the town office. The main thing is to keep the traffic down so that we are reducing exposure. We passed some more cases and I just think we should be more careful all it takes is one slip up. I invite discussion." B. Schaschek, "I agree with you as well and that is why I thought we were closing the office and locking the door and only allowing 3 people in the office. That is what we had discussed. Maybe we should put a doorbell out there. Right now the office is open and people walk in and out because it is convenient but if they can't open the door then it will slow them down." N. Keane, "The policy that you did earlier is basically the framework that you are talking about. The policy talks about limiting people in public spaces." F. Westbrook, "I think 3 people is pushing it as far as square footage goes. I go in there and I have my mask with me but I do not necessarily have it on and I need to be more mindful of that and we need to make sure we are keeping that protocol." A. Marchetti, "I think keeping the door locked is the first step." Mayor Bugg, "Anyone else?" N. Keane, "Before you get out of new business I want to remind vice mayor Westbrook about the amended revised budget schedule." F. Westbrook, "She did pass the amended budget schedule. As you will notice tonight's meeting, the workshop, was not spent on budget so we are going to use September 23 workshop for budget and that will start at 5:30. Anthony and I will meet another time before then and we will get the worksheets to you all that have our proposed numbers and that is just so that you can take a look at it and formulate any questions or concerns and hopefully you will bring those with you to the workshop and hopefully that will make the workshop go smoother and faster. Any questions?" B. Schaschek, "It falls in the exact same time frame as before it is just a change." N. Keane, "One thing you might want to point out is the

ads going to the Rappahannock Record for the budget and all of the other ordinances that are going to be passed, you have to know your budget numbers by that day for the advertisement. That is why it is important for people to come to the committee meeting because there are only 2 more meetings before the ad goes in the paper." F. Westbrook, "That is right, the ad has to go into the paper by October 1. Are there any other comments?" B. Schaschek, "You can't really have people at the committee meeting and if you limit the office to 3 people and you are running out of time." N. Keane, "You could notice it for the church by tomorrow." W. Nunnally, "Can we just lock the door and say by appointment only with the phone number for the office? That would seem to solve people from coming in if you lock the door and put a sign on the door. Let's get on with this because we still have closed session." N. Keane, "The October meeting where we have a public hearing scheduled, there is a question about the start time and that we would need to know the time for the ad. Today is probably the time to decide that and the following meeting that usually starts at 6:30, if you want it to be immediately following you have to make it a special called meeting, that is the way it works." F. Westbrook, "Yes, we want it to be immediately following so we need to be careful how we craft that agenda. The October 8 meeting has to be advertised in the October 1 edition of the Rappahannock Record so we need to decide if we are going to start the public hearing at what time? We typically will have these meetings and then immediately following will go from the public hearing into the regular meeting. We need to decide the time so it can go into the paper correctly. This is the public hearing on October 8 and this is where we usually have comments and questions. This is amending the existing budget so I don't know how to gauge attendance but I would think it would be as many but who knows because our town has surprised us before." W. Nunnally, "Can we just start at 5:30." F. Westbrook, "We would have to start at 5:30 and the next meeting is immediately following as opposed to a specific time for the second meeting so that we don't cut this short for the public hearing." W. Nunnally, "I call for that. Do it and get it done." F. Westbrook, "October 8 meeting will start at 5:30." N. Keane, "And the next meeting will start immediately following and it will be a special called meeting." F. Westbrook, "Yes, the next meeting will not start at 6:30 it will be immediately following and it will be a special called meeting." W. Nunnally, "Can you tell me why it will be a special called meeting again?" F. Westbrook, "Because the next meeting is going to say immediately following as opposed to a specific time which means we don't know what time it will start. It will start whenever we are through with the first one." W. Nunnally, "And the difference that makes is that you can't make a change to the agenda unless everybody agrees." F. Westbrook, "That is right." Mayor Bugg, "Can I get that motion to amend the budget schedule?" B. Schaschek, "So move." W. Nunnally, "Second." Mayor Bugg, "Further discussion. Roll call vote."

Mayor Bugg: I will go ahead and call this meeting to order Town Council special called meeting here at Irvington Baptist Church on Thursday, September 10, 2020, at 5:30 p.m. The first matter would be the agenda. I have called the meeting to order, and we will then go to roll call of the meeting.

### C. PUBLIC COMMENT

Mayor Bugg: Thank you Wayne. Next, we will move to public comment. This meeting concerns the VTC grant and the CARES Act in the proposed amended 2020/2021 budget. Is there any public comment in any of these items?

K. Schaschek: Mr. Mayor.Mayor Bugg: Yes sir.

K. Schaschek: Since the public isn't available, no one can comment, if we could have the public comments section after the budget is available for the public.

F. Westbrook: May I say something Mr. Mayor.

Mayor Bugg: Yes.

F. Westbrook: It is very possible we are not going to be discussing the budget at this workshop, we have come up with a new agenda for the budget and that's mostly because



these other two items that are on here is going to take up probably 15 or 20 minutes of this hour and there is just no way, we are going to go through....

K. Schaschek: Okay.

F. Westbrook: Any part of that so I am relinquishing that time so that we can thoroughly discuss these other items.

Mayor Bugg: That's fine. With that being said let's jump right into the VTC grant first.

D. Patteson: Mr. Mayor.

Mayor Bugg: Yes, Mr. Patteson.

D. Patteson: Mr. Mayor and members of council, I have a disclaimer that I need to make you aware of, I have two businesses, The Hope and Glory Inn at 65 Tavern Road, and the Dog Oyster Vineyard at 171 Fences Drive, both in Irvington and both are partners in this grant. This grant was applied for in December of last year and was awarded in February 2020 and both the grants were prior to my taking office. My businesses are not beneficiaries of any of the monies from the grants. My council term began July 1, 2020 of this year and I have looked into a COIA question, a conflict-of-interest act question and the answer is my businesses may remain partners in this grant with me now serving on town council but I will not be voting or discussing at the council table the specifics of this grant. I am disclosing this under Virginia Code 2.2-3115F respectfully submitted and I submit this document for council record.

Mayor Bugg: Thank you.

D. Patteson: And I am going to be sitting out here with the rest of the gang.

### D. WORKSHOP

Mayor Bugg: Alright I know we began to touch on the VTC Grant last time, but we ran out of time due to the CARES Act which was not totally unpredicted, so we can start things off. Would anyone like to say anything about the tourism grant.

S. Phillips: Sure, does anyone need a copy of the grant?

J. Brown: I do.

S. Phillips: A brief overview of the grant is roughly the fall of 2019 the town council granted authorization for the town to apply for the grant. In roughly February or March of 2020, the town was notified that they had been awarded the grant. One thing that changed is the grant that we applied for was a one-to-one grant and through the miracles of grants the Town of



Irvington was actually awarded a larger grant than we applied for. So, when we talk in just a moment about some of those details some of you may think that this is not what we, that you've ever seen these numbers before, this is not necessarily what we applied for and quite frankly, that's probably the truth because in fact we applied for a one-to-one grant and we received a much larger grant. Lisa Hull is sitting in the audience behind me and she was an integral partner in this grant, crafted the grant for us and to her hard work we were fortunately awarded a larger grant than we applied for. I'd like to invite Lisa to join me so that she can answer any questions if you have them. This grant is designed to increase, the purpose of the grant is to increase occupancy tax in the Town of Irvington in the shoulder months and the shoulder months are referred to as October, November, December, January, February, March, April. probably not October, November, but definitely December, January, February, March. This grant is crafted to draw in families with above a \$250,000 discretionary income and what this grant is asking of the Town of Irvington, what this grant will provide the Town of Irvington is a landing page on our website that will be completely based on this grant. Virginia is for Lovers, at the end of this grant, the landing page that this grant will create will go away and with that landing page, again, the focus of the grant is to increase occupancy tax in the shoulder months. Lisa did you want to give any background information before I jump into the main...

Lisa Hull: I can take questions.

S. Phillips: As this grant pertains to the budget, I know the budget and finance committee had a meeting earlier this week and we discussed in the amended budget how this would change the current budget. This grant is going to ask for \$25,000, is the new budget line item and for \$25,000 each partner, I'm sorry, I'm doing a bad job, The Tides Inn will provide \$10,000 for this grant, The Hope and Glory will provide \$10,000 in-kind receipts for this grant, Steamboat Era Museum is a partner, they will provide \$250.00 in kind receipts towards this grant and Northern Neck Planning Commission will provide \$250.00 towards this grant. The total value of the grant is \$45,750.00. Again, the town is responsible for \$25,000 and for that \$25,000 the town will receive from the Commonwealth of Virginia a check for \$15,250. It is a reimbursable grant. Most people think about grants as far as you apply for a grant and get a check when you send that money....

J. Brown: Can you repeat that last line.

S. Phillips: The reimburseable?

J. Brown: The town is responsible for \$25,000 and....

S. Phillips: So, the parameters of this grant, The Hope and Glory and The Tides Inn each signed on to provide \$10,000 of receipts.

J. Brown: I was talking about the money going out.



S. Phillips: The town is on the hook for cash flow for \$25,000 in cash flow to add to the total of \$45,750. For that \$25,000 the town, at the conclusion of the grant, when all the receipts have been, the town will be the grant reporter on this, do the grant reporting so The Tides Inn and The Hope and Glory and the Northern Neck Planning Commission and Steamboat Era Museum will all give their receipts to the Town of Irvington and the Town of Irvington will keep its own receipts for the \$25,000, they will then collect those receipts, submit them to Virginia Tourism Commission, back to the grant and for that the town will receive a check in return for \$15,250, meaning that the total cost to the town is \$10,000 to increase the occupancy tax in the shoulder months. Are there any questions?

B. Schaschek: So upfront the town has to front all the money up front?

S. Phillips: The \$25,000, when you look at your agenda for the 6:30 meeting, you will see that there are a couple of motions, we can't take action during workshop, but the consensus coming out is that the mayor would be appointed as the point of contact for the grant, there are five partners in the grant, the Town is one of five, clearly we can't make, so the mayor would need to be appointed as the point of contact and he would directly with the grant partners and the contract would be with Flackshack, the grant partners will ultimately choose who the vendor should be, but Flackshack produced the numbers on this grant and I suspect that the grant partners would go with Flackshack. They will determine who the vendor is. And for that, so, Flackshack will do the work with the contract so the mayor will be authorized to be point of contact, the mayor will again, the mayor would be authorized to execute the contract and then there would be an appropriation. Of course, council can determine how that appropriation works whether it is on a monthly basis or whether it, I think in working with the grant partners and the proposed vendor for the grant it would probably be easiest and cleanest for them to supply monthly invoices over the next couple, over October, November, December, January, February, March, through the conclusion of the fiscal year they will supply invoices based on a monthly basis. The Town would then distribute that \$25,000 over the remaining months in the fiscal year and once those receipts have come in, we have paid out the \$25,000, spread across the remaining months in the calendar fiscal year. Does that answer your question?

B. Schaschek: I'm not sure that it did as yet...

S. Phillips: So, the \$25,000 would be distributed over the remaining months in the fiscal year.

B. Schaschek: So, the Town is going to shell out the \$25,000.

S. Phillips: To Flackshack, not \$25,000 a month.

F. Westbrook: No, no, partially out monthly as the invoices come in so.

S. Phillips: So, again, that's where the appropriation would come in would be for the appropriation to be able to send that \$25,000 specifically to Flackshack.

B. Schaschek: So where does The Hope and Glory and The Tides Inn, the other partners come into this?



S. Phillips: You will see on the line items, there is a line item on page....

Lisa Hull: May I answer S. Phillips: Yes please.

Lisa Hull: This a two to one reimbursable grant and the ratio of VTC funds to ratio of partner funds is 2:1. You have to spend \$30,500 in order to get \$15,250 or at least show a spend of that. The Tides Inn and Hope and Glory are going to help the town show that spend by giving Sharon receipts from their social media spends, from their own marketing efforts to help the town bring in the rest of the grant.

F. Westbrook: So, we're the only ones expending money?

Lisa Hull: They are spending money, they're giving, you're the only ones spending money in the grant, but the town asked for the grant, but The Hope and Glory and The Tides are spending money all the time promoting themselves and promoting their own programs, but no one so far has spent any money from the town. That's what this program is for The Town of Irvington, not the individual businesses in this area and you need the cooperation of the town, and so it's a different tier. The 1:1 grant are \$1.00 for \$1.00 but this will be 2:1, so that's what was agreed

- F. Westbrook: I don't think it was very clear when all this was initially presented to us how this was going to work and maybe that was because we didn't know exactly how it was going to work and then there was a situation they never came back to us before this was sent in which we were supposed to approve it before it was sent in, we never got that opportunity, so, I don't know about the others but I do feel like I have been a little bit in the dark about this and, it's sounding very different to me now, than what it started off in the beginning, so I'll just say that and then...
- S. Phillips: I think the similarity between the 1:1 and the 2:1 was the \$10,000 and originally the Town was of the impression was that it was a \$10,000 commitment and the difference is now, it's a \$25,000 commitment with a return of \$15,250, so you are still at the 10-mark. Your cash more, but you also receive a larger reimbursement check. Bonnie on the next to the last page of the grant, other program related budget items, digital marketing on behalf of The Tides Inn, that's a \$10,000 line item. The Tide's Inn and The Hope and Glory each have to spend \$10,000 in digital marketing, social media and other things that pertain to increasing occupancy tax specific to Irvington in the off-season.
- B. Schaschek: This was in 2019.
- S. Phillips: So again, COVID-19 occurred, all of these dates, so these dates were put in when the draft from the grant was originally submitted. These dates are not in stone, Angela Wiggins is our contact at Virginia Tourism Commission, and she is absolutely aware of all of the things that are going on and the grant partners, I have met with the grant partners and they will probably adjust obviously these dates that have expired where you see April 2020, you see November 2019. Because this grant was supposed to have launched in February or March of this year, as you can see these dates were based on that, but of course COVID hit, Virginia Tourism Commission asked The Town of Irvington to not release this, to not make this a public record, let me change that, to not make it public that this grant had been awarded to The Town of Irvington because this message said come here, come now and when COVID-19 the



message was stay home right now, do not leave your home. So, that is why you will see a delay in these certain time frames.

F. Westbrook: So the anticipated completion date of January of 2021, is not the date.

S. Phillips: It is my understanding in working with the grant partners that they are still eager to implement and utilize this grant for this off-season, again with what's going on with The Tides, the COVID they will be open some during the off shoulder, during the shoulder season they would like to put this grant to work. The Tide's Inn, The Hope and Glory they would all like to do that. The Steamboat Era Museum on the other hand is slightly different because they do not intend, they did not open at all this season and they, I don't know that they have a plan to open in the spring, I think everyone is waiting to see where we'll be in the spring with COVID.

A. Marchetti: Were there any projections on increased occupancy with the grant initially, obviously we don't know until reporting, I just didn't know if there was any....

Lisa Hull: I would say no, no.

A. Marchetti: Okay.

Lisa Hull: There were metrics that were used, but I think they were Lancaster County metrics.

B. Schaschek: Who is this that's going to be doing this for the Town.

S. Phillips: The company is called Flackshack. They have worked with a peer jurisdiction. They have worked with , Colonial Beach. Flackshack is eager to attend and to meet the town council. We did not know, since we were doing financials this evening, we didn't know that this would be the perfect evening for Flackshack to introduce themselves to you. If you'd like for them to join in October again, Susan is very eager to meet the council.

F. Westbrook: Her name is Susan.

S. Phillips: Susan....

B. Schaschek: And they'll be able to go into details on what they're doing?

S. Phillips: So, those details were provided, you will see that they are doing direct geo and demographic targeting, they are doing Irvington centered stories, they are making Facebook, Instagram, Twitter, they're doing a blog, they're digital advertising, they are search engine optimization. There is development of The Town of Irvington tourism website. There will be print media. There will be a Virginia Tourism Commission welcome center brochure. These are the project goals.

B. Schaschek: So, it says here the town will host and maintain a separate website for tourism.

S. Phillips: Correct, that is...

B. Schaschek: That's totally different than the existing website.

S. Phillips: It will be a landing page and that landing page is temporary and by temporary, I mean, it goes away at the completion of the grant. The town owns it, the town owns the content, the proprietary information, the town owns the intellectual property, is that correct, the right terminology?

Lisa Hull: Yes, it doesn't have to go away.



- S. Phillips: It doesn't have to go away, but at the conclusion of the year the town would be responsible for maintaining it. So, it doesn't have to go away, the landing page. The town will own it, if the town agrees to maintain it beyond that point, it will continue to be a useful tool.
- F. Westbrook: So, part of our \$10,000 would go to paying for that, for that landing page.
- S. Phillips: Yes.
- A. Marchetti: So, this is for the increase in occupancy tax to help offset the actual cost of the \$10,000.

S. Phillips: Yes.

Mayor Bugg: Especially during those shoulder months.

Lisa Hull: Is this is the first year ever that The Tides has been open...

- A. Marchetti: I think they have a 45-day close window, February into March. That's the shortest time they have been closed; did I remember.
- F. Westbrook: Traditionally they were open through New Years and then they started closing for various reasons.
- A. Marchetti: And now I think they are open through January closed..
- F. Westbrook: December 31, was what is advertised on their page.
- S. Phillips: So, in addition to the occupancy tax, one of the things that increasing the occupancy tax in the off-season would benefit the Northern Neck as a whole and The Tides Inn is one of the largest employers in the Northern Neck and if this grant were to increase occupancy tax in the off-season that would be a reduction of the number of employees at The Tide's Inn who are otherwise considered 9-month a year employees. It's a possibility that those employees would actually have consistent employment 12 calendar months rather than being....

F. Westbrook: ....seasonal....

Mayor Bugg: ....seasonal....

- B. Schaschek: So are we planning on this in the amended budget because it is not in the current budget.
- F. Westbrook: No, you're right, it's not. That would be part of the amended.
- J. Brown: If the payment schedule has changed how far is it going to go out, I mean we're behind now with payments extended into the spring or, June or....
- S. Phillips: So the conclusion, the end date on the grant is soft, it's rolling. I do believe that we have, the very last page of the grant tells you that the grant was completed in...

Lisa Hull: It's supposed to be 18 months, we have 18 months to do it, but I think it would be very possible, every other community that was granted funding in this cycle was in sync as you and we were not recommended to start marketing until people could actually travel.

A. Marchetti: So, it could actually be spent over two off-seasons.

Lisa Hull: I think so. I think...spring of 21 and fall, I mean I think it will continue....

A. Marchetti: So, the \$45,000 cash out could be distributed over two shoulder off seasons.

S. Phillips: So right now, I'm going to pause just a moment, J. Brown asked if you would repeat the statement about, we were asked not to market.

Lisa Hull: Virginia Tourism, when COVID hit it had a new marketing campaign that they were putting forward and that was called We'll Be Waiting, okay, We Will Be Waiting, and that was what Virginia Tourism was putting out there, they're not telling people come here spend more money and stay longer like they normally do, their campaign was We'll Be Waiting, we will be waiting for you when it is safe to travel and ready to travel and all of that because there is no plan, these are expensive campaigns, very expensive to market, to do additional marketing, all the social media, the websites, print marketing and for the state they go to TV in other states, they do a lot very, very costly marketing, so it was no point in doing that when we were all under stay at home orders so everything marketing wise froze pretty much from until I think mid-March to mid-June and then there is the second phase that we're in now, especially August called Wander Love and we are participating in the Wander Love campaign with all of that. The next phase and this is going to dove-tail perfectly with this grant is called Share What You Love which is really creating the best of the best of Virginia and just stories that really resonate with travelers with exactly what this area has to offer. So, it will dovetail perfectly with the state campaign as to what you're going to be doing here and it will line up just fine and I think the grant department at Virginia Tourism is going to be very receptive and very flexible in working with communities who are trying to do a good job in implementing this grant. Hopefully with time they are going to be fine with that, I highly doubt.....

B. Schaschek: Let me ask one more question, now you are saying that the theme is Virginia is for Lovers, so that's what is going to be on the landing page?

Lisa Hull: .To Play or to Pause in Irvington, I think that's what we came up as a marketing theme.

B. Schaschek: So where is Virginia is for Lovers going to be.

Lisa Hull: That's going to be, that logo will have to be on your blog or all your social media and on that website, it will be small, very defined plan the way they roll it out, they'll send you all the pictures, they will send whatever, Flackshack and you will see a small link, a link to Virginia.org it will be eligible for...

B. Schaschek: ...on the landing page.

Lisa Hull: Right. On the tourism page.

S. Phillips: ...on the tourism page.

Lisa Hull: ...the Virginia is for Lovers has to be there too. You have that along with whatever Irvington logo you have and everything else.

B. Schaschek: Now does The Tide's, The Hope and Glory and the Steamboat also have to have those logos as partners of this.

Lisa Hull: They have been doing that....

B. Schaschek: The Virginia is for Lovers on it....

Lisa Hull: Yeah, I have it all over my stuff.



B. Schaschek: Neither does The Tide's.

Lisa Hull: They don't need to have it on the front page of their website but they should have it somewhere on the website.

F. Westbrook: So that is part of what the state is getting for its money.

B. Schaschek: So that is something that we are going to have to check with The Tide's and the Hope and Glory and whomever, because you don't currently have that....

Lisa Hull: You really, actually I don't think, that's an interesting question because I think it's just for money that is spent from the grant that has to, the money that is used from the grant needs to make sure that they have that Virginia is for Lover's logo on it. I don't think the partners have to. This is the money that is spent with the grant. So the new products that you would be producing would have to have what we call the VIFL logo on it. It doesn't have to be big or anything like that.

B. Schaschek: You need to check that because when we had read the stuff from the website that Dudley had given us a year or so ago it said it had to be on everything.

Lisa Hull: I can double check and get that information.

- S. Phillips: So, questions, it's \$25,000 and there are 9 months left. The contract would potentially start in October and conclude June of this fiscal year and so over those 9 months roughly \$6,000 a month....
- B. Schaschek: I thought this goes over 18 months?
- S. Phillips: It can, you don't have, I assumed that you would want it to complete in this fiscal year.
- B. Schaschek: I'm not quite sure about that.
- S. Phillips: It does not have to; you have 18 months.
- B. Schaschek: Yeah.
- A. Marchetti: You can spread the expense out over that time, but you don't get reimbursed until its completed.
- S. Phillips: Correct.
- A. Marchetti: So, expense...return.
- F. Westbrook: The only thing that might come into play is our cash flow with COVID related as far as the Tide's because they will not be open January, February and part of March, so that is a shoulder season certainly but that won't work for them. Now Hope and Glory I'm assuming will be open during all that time. The Steamboat Museum tends to close down or not close down...
- B. Schaschek: They are not opening until 2021 sometime.
- F. Westbrook: Are you all open January, February, March.
- C. Bradley: We are not traditionally open January, February, March.
- F. Westbrook: Okay, thanks. So, our shoulder season all of a sudden has shrunk.

Lisa Hull: Can I offer a definition a little bit.



F. Westbrook: Sure.

Lisa Hull: Shoulder season for the Northern Neck is spring and fall, winter is just kind of winter. So just because someone has been shut down, so we were thinking spring and fall cannot really be advertising because so much is closed and...

- F. Westbrook: So, what I'm saying is it is affecting our cash flow and we have to take on a commitment of say \$6,000 a month, \$6,000 monthly might be a big deal to us. So, I'm talking about cash flow and the ability to meet those monetary obligations.
- S. Phillips: So the guidance provided by the budget and finance committee and members of council as a whole as to how that contract should look, if you would for it go beyond this fiscal year, beyond June, again, where are you comfortable at 10 months.
- F. Westbrook: Personally, I think if we could have it...
- B. Schaschek: 18 months....
- F. Westbrook: ....well let me ask this first if we were to say 18 months, if we finished it up in 12 or 10 months is there any fail in that happening.

Lisa Hull: No, not at all.

F. Westbrook: So we could have the option perhaps as a safety net, I think that is worth considering, so....

Mayor Bugg: ...yeah....

- B. Schaschek: Especially since spring and fall are the busiest times around here, fall is very busy.
- F. Westbrook: It is happening right now almost so, and the campaign hasn't hit so.

Mayor Bugg: Excellent, anyone else have any comments or questions.

- S. Phillips: Are there any questions about the possible three motions on the 6:30.
- F. Westbrook: What are they.
- S. Phillips: For the mayor to be appointed as the point contact, as the representative for town, so when the grant partners are to, the mayor would be the point of contact...
- F. Westbrook: It is item 4 on the agenda.
- B. Schaschek: Why wouldn't we have the head of the finance committee being the point of contact.
- S. Phillips: Because it's not, the key components of the grant are artistic, and content based. I think the mayor expressed an interest in being a point for that.

Mayor Bugg: I mean that's all it comes down to having the point person and I volunteered to be that point person and work on that with council to move this matter forward.

S. Phillips: The next motion of course is the contract itself, and the third is the consideration for the appropriation, but it doesn't have to be all at once...

Mayor Bugg: Yeah.

S. Phillips: Clearly it could be cross fiscal years. Clearly it couldn't be begin until you guys amend the budget.

Mayor Bugg: Anything else.

F. Westbrook: What did you say, it can't begin until the budget is amended, this budget won't be amended until...

S. Phillips: There's \$3,000 in the current budget, so the motion on tonight's agenda is....

B. Schaschek: So, there's \$3,000 in the current budget for what?

S. Phillips: In the capital for website.

F. Westbrook: Oh, you are going to pull it from there, that's, when that was budgeted this has not come about to be.

S. Phillips: Correct, there had been \$10,000 in the budget for several years for website and it was reduced to \$3,000.

F. Westbrook: Alright I see what you're saying.

S. Phillips: So the thought would be to appropriate the \$3,000 that is in the current budget until the amended budget and Flackshack is aware that The Town of Irvington is in the process of amending its budget.

W. Nunnally: Can I ask a question Tripp?

Mayor Bugg: Absolutely.

W. Nunnally: Is the total amount that they were getting is \$10,000 from Tide's Inn, \$10,000 from Dudley and \$25,000 from the town which gives us a \$45,000 budget and that's what we'll be spending or are we getting money on top of that.

S. Phillips: So, it is a reimbursable grant and again The Tide's inn and The Hope and Glory, the Steamboat Era and the Northern Neck Planning Commission District will supply receipts, they will give no cash, they will provide receipts for the work that they have done, social media, digital marketing, blogs, things that pertain to this grant. They provide those receipts to the Town of Irvington, so that is, they spent the cash, but they only provide the receipt...

W. Nunnally: We spend \$25,000 and get \$15,000 back.

S. Phillips: Correct.

Mayor Bugg: Correct.

W. Nunnally: Okay. That clears it up for me.

S. Phillips: Thank you very much.

Mayor Bugg: Thanks.

F. Westbrook: Yeah, Sharon I don't see the \$3,000 on this general operating budget, I think it may be in the capital improvement budget....

S. Phillips: It was in capital budget.

F. Westbrook: And that definitely was not for the purpose of the website, that was for other things, so that will have to be considered then....

S. Phillips: ....sure....

F. Westbrook....amended budget, so, that is good to know just because...



Mayor Bugg: Any other questions or comments?

J. Brown: The contract that we are going to enter, is the contract between the town and the partners, who is the contract with?

S. Phillips: Flackshack.

A. Marchetti: And the town can set the terms, okay gotcha.

B. Schaschek: So, the motion is for you to be able to enter into a contract with them, what was the voting part about it?

Mayor Bugg: The voting part? I would be the representative of the council is my understanding.

F. Westbrook: As one of the partners. Mayor Bugg: As one of the partners.

F. Westbrook: One of the grant partners.

Mayor Bugg: A point person for the council.

F. Westbrook: And what would ya'll be voting on?

S. Phillips: Again, when you look at the grant and you see the project deliverables, again, if they were to come to the town and contact, there would not be on anything that The Tide's and The Hope and the Steamboat Era and their respective individual marketing. It would be for the landing page, the content, the font, the color, the tourism landing page, that is where the mayor has expressed an interest in being the point contact.

- F. Westbrook: So as far as voting goes, it would be the mayor and other partners would get together and look at that landing page.
- S. Phillips: So as Flackshack creates the various components of that landing page, and does the other projects along with it, as it develops and evolves and we have meetings, the mayor would attend those meetings and sign off or redirect the marketing firm making sure content is credible

Lisa Hull: Brand consistent, on message and the way the town is to be portrayed.

- B. Schaschek: For any appropriations you need to come back to the council you are not going to make appropriations, you would come back to the council for that?
- S. Phillips: That's correct, so again, there's three specifics motion: to be the point contact, so again, the font is chosen, the logo is chosen, when the color palate, all the artistic things are chosen, the mayor would be the point of contact and he would best represent council and the town as a whole. Then there is the contract, the mayor would have to keep that contract, third is the appropriation and right now is on your 6:30 agenda is a \$3,000 appropriation understanding that Flackshack is aware that the Town of Irvington is amending its budget, and all is based on whether that \$25,000 makes it into the budget.
- F. Westbrook: Where does the \$3,000 get spent.
- S. Phillips: So as it stands, Flackshack is incredible however, whenever the town would like to determine the start. The grant team is extremely eager to begin. The thought is that they



would begin, the contract would initiate in October, so that is why I'm asking for appropriation tonight.

- F. Westbrook: I think we are going to have to amend the budget before we can appropriate that, particularly if the budget is coming from the capital improvement budget, I mean, to me that's the....
- S. Phillips: Would the suggestion then be that we would not be able to move forward with anything until January?
- F. Westbrook: Until this amended budget which could happen as early as November and maybe, December is our safety month. We have things move more slowly than we anticipate, we would have to use December but the \$3,000 that is in the capital improvement budget was for other items, yes it looks like for computer/web or whatever, but it, I don't think that's what we set it up for when we put that in the capital improvement budget so that's why I was saying in total we could amend that part of it, I don't know that it is available for us to appropriate tonight. That's my concern.
- B. Schaschek: Maybe it would be better to have Flackshack come in do their presentation before we start.
- S. Phillips: What would you like for them to present?
- B. Schaschek: I guess what they plan on doing. I'm still.
- S. Phillips: This is what they plan on doing. They are creating our visuals....
- F. Westbrook: But didn't you say they are eager to come in and talk to us?
- S. Phillips: They want to share with you what they have done with other jurisdictions there would be nothing to share specifically to Irvington. Do you think you would move on MuniCode in this in this fiscal year.
- F. Westbrook: Do what now?
- S. Phillips: MuniCode. The \$3,000 that's in the current budget, the thought was that it was not for this, for a website but was specific for something else, do you think we should move forward on that?
- F. Westbrook: I don't know but I also think the question is probably irrelevant because that's what we put in the budget for, and we can't just change a pigeon hole because we've already adopted that part of the budget.
- S. Phillips: I don't know if it is broad enough it just says website.
- F. Westbrook: As budget and finance chair I would not recommend it, but I think it is certainly up to the entire council how they are going to construe that definition of what that money was put into the capital budget for.
- B. Schaschek: You would have to go back and look at the minutes from the meeting because...
- F. Westbrook: And it may be in those minutes that it is broad enough you know that we can make that happen. So...
- A. Marchetti: I guess if we don't move on it, we are looking at spring of 2021 essentially for this to start so that....



F. Westbrook: Start in January I would think.

A. Marchetti: But not only The Tide's is not open, the Steamboat is not open.

F. Westbrook: No, the campaign would still be going on, the campaign, even if we started right now the campaign would go on January...

A. Marchetti: ...give it a few more months for everybody to get a little more comfortable, we just got out this fall, makes it happen now, doesn't seem like everybody is there so, we should identify and try to move forward spring or obviously we are going to miss this fall push but...

F. Westbrook: See, there are other things that we can be doing to get to that, we are not going to be sitting here twiddling our thumbs waiting for the magic day in November or December....

A. Marchetti: Sure.

F. Westbrook: I mean, is that an okay assumption that there are things that we can be doing....

S. Phillips: Like what?

F. Westbrook: I don't know, I'm asking you.

S. Phillips: No, there's not...

A. Marchetti: ....I don't think...

F. Westbrook: So, they want the \$3,000 as a down payment to get this going.

S. Phillips: There's purchases, there's...

A. Marchetti: It's money for the first month's invoice...I don't think we will see tangible results until after, it might be months later before we see the first invoice.

[A lot of background talking].

Mayor Bugg: ..do you think we can...along with that.

F. Westbrook: I think so. Let's look at this and see if we can.

J. Brown: My thoughts are we need to do this the correct way and this is a curve ball and we need to figure out how we will adjust to it, we can't just move things around column to column without redoing the budget.

Mayor Bugg: We can appreciate that.

J. Brown: Huh?

Mayor Bugg: I said, I think we can all appreciate that. Is everyone comfortable with that approach.

A. Marchetti: Yeah, sounds like it is....

S. Phillips: Alright, is there any other questions on the Tourism Grant? Otherwise, we'll take just the last two minutes and does anybody need, this is the very same document that was distributed in the last workshop for the CARES Grant. Anybody need.....

Mayor Bugg: Might as well just pass them around.

S. Phillips: So this is the same document at the last town council workshop, this is the CARES Act and we discussed the various buckets and this money at this time will meet the current,



this is the CARES money and the buckets again, just as a reminder are personal protective equipment, tourism in the business district technology focusing on contactless solution, small business grants and employee related costs specific to payroll and workplace compliance. Again, at this time the town has received \$35,245.21. We have probably spent less than \$1,000, things such as renting the church, are eligible to come out of this CARES money. One of the things I would ask town council to decide if nothing else where would you prefer not to spend the money. Are you interested in all of these buckets? I need guidance from the town council as to how to spend this money.

A. Marchetti: When do we expect the second \$35,000?

S. Phillips: I would have thought I would have received a call from the county already, I have not received a call from the county.

A. Marchetti: But it is definitely...

S. Phillips: It is my understanding that other jurisdictions have received their check.

A. Marchetti: And it all has to be spent calendar year.

S. Phillips: It is my understanding it all has to be spent this year. What is not spent has to be returned.

W. Nunnally: May I ask a question Tripp?

Mayor Bugg: Yeah.

W. Nunnally: Can we use that for office relocation or office rental so, since we don't conform to the social distancing standards in the office?

Sharon: Yes.

Mayor Bugg: Yes, Ms. Keane.

N. Keane: Yes, it can be used for rent, it can be used for rent and for the moving costs related to COVID.

S. Phillips: So, Wayne if you were not able to hear the answer is yes. CARES Funds can be used for rent and for moving cost.

W. Nunnally: So, I suggest we sit aside some of it for that.

S. Phillips: Excellent point.

Mayor Bugg: I agree Wayne.

B. Schaschek: So, we put that under workplace compliance.

Mayor Bugg: A good place for it.

B. Schaschek: So, we would probably want to increase that from \$5,000 to \$10,000.

F. Westbrook: Do we have an approximation what rent would be, I mean just so we have an idea.

N. Keane: You'll hear about it in a closed session.

A. Marchetti: Nancyellen did you find out if we can use any of that for any rental payments



N. Keane: There is a risk associated with prepaying rent after December, after December 30th, we could prepay rent today using COVID Funds for the rest of this calendar year, if we go into next year, we can only reasonably do it through June 30th anyway for the current budget year, but, I talked to someone at length, colleagues and other sources, we could make a credible request under the qualified expenses to prepay rent through June 30th, if we are turned down and Lancaster County is audited, we would know in advance how much money that is and we would have to change it from a COVID related expense to an operational expense but we can try that. If we wanted to try that, there is some risk associated with doing that, but it is quantifiable.

A. Marchetti: So, the risk is renting....

B. Schaschek: So just do it from January to June?

A. Marchetti: ....the fiscal, yeah.

N. Keane: But we can certainly do it for the rest of this calendar year.

Mayor Bugg: Great.

J. Brown: I'd like to see us use some of this for equipment for electronic meetings that we talked about nobody has brought that up, but that would certainly a problem early on with COVID, not being able to have meetings.

Mayor Bugg: Very good point, yeah. Wayne being the first participant.

F. Westbrook: Uh huh.

S. Phillips: What kind of equipment would you be interested in?

J. Brown: I don't know what it is going to take for us to have zoom meetings for example.

S. Phillips: Is there a member of council that does not have a computer? A tablet, cell phone? So everyone has a home device.

- S. Phillips: Most organizations will now offer both where you can such as Wayne is doing tonight, participate in the meeting remotely via phone, is there a specific device you are looking that you would find more beneficial than another?
- J. Brown: No, I just think it would be good to be able to have effective meetings and we are not set up to do that right now. I don't know what it's going to take. I think it would be nice to have microphones in this room for example, it is very difficult with the muffled mask to understand what people are saying.
- N. Keane: I was just going to add that everyone has their own computer and so forth, there is still the work that needs to be done to make them be able to meet efficiently because some people have never done, never been set up, so the experience that I have had in other jurisdictions, is that they spent some CARES Funds money with an IT person who will go to the individual homes of people who need it to set this up and so forth. I mean it is not a lot of money but it is something that you can use CARES money to do. You get the Zoom or WebEx or whatever software capability and everybody uses the same one and there might be some cost associated with that.

A. Marchetti: Technology and what it looks like that we would be prepared to....



Mayor Bugg: Absolutely....

- A. Marchetti: ...I think it's a lot of the stuff we talked about last time the town should move in that direction....
- B. Schaschek: I agree with it, we should....
- S. Phillips: How would the town like for me to move forward on that, what would, so again, you just mentioned an IT person, because if you have a remote meeting and use Zoom, and assuming that all members of council or some members are at home you have to have an administrator on those meetings and it could not be staff because staff participate so there is generously someone who is administrating the meeting making sure that all members have stayed on and have not lost connectivity and if they have they are reaching out to that member of council or planning commission member making sure that they can reconnect, that their mics are on, that they are not on mute...
- J. Brown: How would we include the community?
- S. Phillips: How would we include the community? That, again the community could call in as tonight, you could have someone with their cell phone in their pocket and anyone can join meetings that way. Are you referring to visual?
- B. Schaschek: Yes.
- F. Westbrook: The community would have a log in number, a meeting number and that is just distributed a day or two before the meeting and they could log in with that number for our meeting.
- S. Phillips: So, anyone with a phone, a tablet, a PC, access to the internet, that's how the public will participate in the meetings. But again that would require an administrator of the meetings.
- J. Brown: I didn't hear that last one.
- S. Phillips: So that would require someone to be the administrator. How would the town like for me to solve that?
- L. Brown: How many other localities, I mean...
- S. Phillips: They have a larger staff, they have an IT department.
- N. Keane: Our IT guy can't he do it?
- S. Phillips: I don't know that he would be able to make that commitment during the meeting. I don't know. That is the concern was that he might not always be...
- L. Brown: We have to know how many hours it would take for him to have our meetings held....
- A. Marchetti: ....consistently, what happens after January when everyone starts working...
- L. Brown: ....what his hourly rate might be.
- A. Marchetti: ....be able to do it between now and January because beyond December, because in January we don't have money for....
- S. Phillips: But if you want to purchase the equipment, if you would like additional equipment, if you want me, again, what equipment would be right for the town to purchase because the

town is not responsible, the equipment belongs to the town, what is purchased using CARES Funds. The date the town needs to be concerned about is December 30th because if this money is not spent as of December 30, it returns at this time, they may change that date, but right now that's the date that we have to be aware of. Is there any interest in the small business grant?

Mayor Bugg: Yes.

S. Phillips: Okay.

W. Nunnally: Well before we got to that Tripp, now can I say something?

Mayor Bugg: Yeah.

W. Nunnally: Is any of the money available for remodeling?

N. Keane: No, I don't think so. S. Phillips: Remodeling what?

W. Nunnally: Office....

F. Westbrook: Maybe the air conditioning but that's about the only thing.

S. Phillips: It could be used to make sure that HVAC equipment is compliant with replacing, Nancy....

N. Keane: Well, I was going to say in line with the fact that we have to, the issue of a temporary office, we can't social distance, there could be expenses related to COVID that can be used in a rental, or an owned property if it's related to COVID. If it's related to the HVAC like you said which is a requirement of the Virginia Department of Health.

W. Nunnally: Well, if it's a place we could occupy temporarily as I understand it is going to need remodeling for us to get into it and really work it. I don't know how much that is going to cost. I'm not really up on that but I know that there is some expense that will be there and I'm just wondering if we can cover that expense out of this money.

Mayor Bugg: I have a bunch of new information to review in closed session about that so we will bring you up to speed on all that.

W. Nunnally: Okay.

Mayor Bugg: Is there any action that is required now of town council regarding CARES?

S. Phillips: No, again, I was just looking for town council to provide feedback on how to spend this money because our next meeting is October and if you are going to...

A. Marchetti: Have time to spend it....

S. Phillips: Right...

F. Westbrook: We'll call a meeting specifically for that purpose.

A. Marchetti: The small business grants assuming we have the second \$35,000, that \$10,000 be set aside for 10 \$1,000 grants I believe Kilmarnock did \$1,000 grants.

B. Schaschek: Did we get samples with those applications?

A. Marchetti: I haven't seen those but my suggestion just because of time to use their guidelines and use their system.

F. Westbrook: ....probably....

A. Marchetti: ....might be, and....

B. Schaschek: I thought that's what we decided last time.

A. Marchetti: Put a note and when the application window if five businesses apply and the window closes then we know that we got the leftover money can be reallocated and spent elsewhere but we should know that pretty quickly.

F. Westbrook: [talkover] I think we already have the application, do we Sharon?

N. Keane: I think we already have it.

Mayor Bugg: What happens next, I mean, when can we being working on safety equipment...

S. Phillips: We have spent some money on facemasks and things of that nature. Is the town council interested in hand sanitizing stations for the business districts?

F. Westbrook: I think we said last time that we were interested in that.

S. Phillips: Okay, okay.

B. Schaschek: And by the tennis courts.

S. Phillips: Again, I think I have some, again contactless solutions.

Mayor Bugg: Yes.

A. Marchetti: Payroll and set aside and then as we get closer to the expiration of what needs to be spent, the number we would have to potentially spend is small enough each week, each month.

F. Westbrook: Let's say if like staff might be out because they are self-quarantined or whatever this money would be spent to hire a temp to come in and help.

#### MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

#### Town of Irvington and Lancaster County Economic Development Authority

THIS MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING, dated August ____, 2020, is entered into by and between the Town of Irvington ("Irvington") and the Lancaster County Economic Development Authority ("EDA").

WHEREAS, Congress enacted the *Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security* ("CARES") Act of 2020 (the "Act") which provides funding for a number of different programs to address the COVID-19 pandemic, and Irvington received an allocation from the Coronavirus Relief Fund ("CRF"); and,

WHEREAS, Irvington has designated certain CRF funds to be used for a program of small business grants; and

WHEREAS, Irvington desires to: (i) enable CRF funds to be accessed by as many Irvington businesses as possible, (ii) disburse these funds into the businesses as quickly as possible, and (iii) have a second round of grants in the event of further need in the Fall of 2020: and

WHEREAS, Irvington cannot disburse funds directly to private businesses and has requested that the EDA assist Irvington in disbursing the grants under the direction of Irvington; and

WHEREAS, the EDA desires to assist Irvington in disbursing the grants to qualifying businesses in Irvington under the terms and conditions established herein.

**NOW THEREFORE**, for and in consideration of the premises and the exchange of mutual promises, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, the parties hereto agree as follows:

- 1. Irvington Responsibilities. Irvington shall: (i) notify business community of grant opportunity, (ii) send designated CRF funds to EDA, (iii) create grant application, qualifications, and determine amount(s) of grants, (iv) create online portal for application, (iv) respond to grant inquiries, (v) process grant applications, (vi) send grantee list to EDA, (vi) administer program, (vii) keep and maintain records, and (viii) participate in a second round of grants if needed prior to December 30, 2020, and (ix) otherwise comply with the Act..
- 2. EDA Responsibilities. The EDA shall: (i) hold CRF funds sent to it by Irvington, (ii) disburse such funds to grantees as determined by Irvington and in the amounts indicated by Irvington, (iii) cut checks and mail out within five (5) business days after receipt of grantee list from Irvington, (iv) send reconciliation report of disbursed funds to Irvington in a timely manner, (v) participate in a second round of grants if needed prior to December 30, 2020, and (vi) return remaining CRF funds to Irvington, within five (5) business days following a written request from Irvington.

The parties agree that the EDA is solely acting as the agent of Irvington pursuant to this Agreement. The EDA is making no independent determination as to the eligibility of any grantee pursuant to the Act or the amount of any grant to such grantee. The EDA is aware that Irvington is under an agreement with the County of Lancaster whereby Irvington is solely responsible for repayment of any CRF funds should Irvington fail to comply with the Act in the disbursement of such funds and this Agreement shall not replace that Agreement with the County or cause the EDA to have any liability for

any actions taken hereunder at the direction of Irvington. Provided the EDA acts in accordance with this Agreement, Irvington shall, to the extent provided by law, hold harmless the EDA, its agents, officers, Director and staff from any liability of any nature in the performance of this Agreement.

This Agreement has been authorized and approved by action of the Board of the EDA and the Town Council of the Town of Irvington, meeting in regular session.

#### C. PUBLIC HEARING

Mayor Bugg, "The first matter on the agenda moving forward involves a public hearing regarding the Through Truck Restriction - proposed for Route 200 alternate Route 646 to Route 3. Can I get a show of hands from the public as to who would like to speak on this matter?" S. Phillips, "Please let me know when you would like for me to read into the record the emails that have been received from residents who are not able to attend tonight's meeting." Mayor Bugg, "Let me get a show of hands first. There are 7 of you that would like to speak. Given that number I would like to restrict your comments to 1.5 minutes. Sharon, please start with the emails." The emails are attached and incorporated within. Mayor Bugg, "Back to the public for comments." S. Van Saun, "60 The Pony Pasture, Irvington VA. I agree with everything said in the emails and I know that there are a lot of people here, I don't know if we can do a hand raise and count how many people support this effort to shorten the time." N. Keane, "We need to have this on the record for the Commonwealth Transportation Board." A. Pollard, "48 Steamboat Road, Irvington VA. I would like to make 4 points. First of all I disagree with the person that said there are a lot of trucks. There are more trucks than there were 5 years ago. There are more pedestrians than there were 5 years ago. I would also note that Tommy Kellum of Kellum's Seafood has been trying to re-route their trucks and he noted they are supportive of this and I think that is important to get into the record. Lastly, I look forward to looking to working with Town Council on other traffic calming measures after we get this one done. Good design can slow down existing traffic that we will have." G. Kirkbride, "364

Chesapeake Drive, Irvington VA. I think the truck issue is an addendum to what we see with traffic generally coming around Route 200. I think it is a slingshot. We are cyclist, walkers and drivers and it definitely makes this a more dangerous atmosphere to live in. Thank you." S. Kirkmeyer, "4736 Irvington Road, Irvington VA. We have three family homes on one side of the road and one family home on the other side. We are totally in support of major restriction for through trucks. Thank you." B. Forrester, "437 The Lane. My house overlooks Sam's Cove and I can see the trucks barreling through definitely going closer to 50-60 mph through there. I am also a runner and I have been in near collisions with trucks that fly around and they are definitely going way over the speed limit. I am in favor of the no through truck zone. Thank you." C. Bradley, "991 King Carter Drive. I want to echo particularly what Al Pollard said. I move to Irvington 4 years ago and most of you know I used to walk with 2 dogs tied around my waist all the time. The number of trucks that come through the center of Irvington has gone up dramatically. There have been a number of times when I was really nervous that the truck was not going to stay on the road and where was I going to go when the truck went off the road. I do think the through trucks is a great idea." L. Capps, "242 The Lane, Irvington VA. I want to echo those that have been said and particularly note that we do have Old Salem which is an alternative route which is reclimate in VDOT's regulation in terms of pulling away from going through a main street or downtown area. Also note that other communities in the Northern Neck particularly Warsaw and Kilmarnock have taken this action to benefit of their businesses and it has not been seen as a detriment to those businesses that are inside the core that need the deliveries because they are not restricted from this restriction. So, I urge both the council, the county, and the Commonwealth Transportation Board to authorize this restriction." P. Robinson, "90 Railway. One thing to consider is enforcement. We have talked about speeding and we have talked about trucks but if there is no one here to enforce the law the trucks are not going to go on this road. There probably needs to be a conversation with the sheriff or with whoever else will be enforcing this. We can do anything we want here but unless there is some methodology over the enforcing whatever we choose to do whether it is speeding or trucks then it is a bit of a waste." #### E. PUBLIC COMMENT

Mayor Bugg, "It is now general public comment. Again, I will see how many would like to speak and I would ask that if we have a large number of people wishing to speak that you limit it to 1.5 minutes." K. Schaschek, "394 King Carter Drive. I just would very much support the issues of the town as discussed in a prior meeting. I think someone on council should take the lead because time is of the essence to get this grant so therefore you have experienced technology people on your council with project management experience and you should take advantage so I think you should streamline that effort. The second in regard to traffic and golf carts. On Sunday, I was pumping gas and I see 2 golf carts with teenagers going onto King Carter Drive from Irvington Road. Not looking to the right and there was a car coming the corner. They swerved around the golf carts. If someone were coming from the other way we would have had a disaster there. Something has to be done about the golf carts." C. Bradley, "Today I am here as president of Steamboat Era Museum. I hope that all of council received the letter that I put in your boxes on Monday. I hope that those of you that were a part of the Grab-a-Crab enjoyed yourself. I heard that the crabs were small but I also heard they were good. The museum respectfully requests the use of the Town Commons on the afternoon of Saturday, September 12, 2020 to hold our annual membership meeting. Those of you who have been around know that the annual membership meeting is typically held in April or May however because of COVID-19 we unable to do so. We will abide by and enforce any state, county or local guidelines related to outdoor gatherings of less than 250 people. I promise it will be less than 250 people. Our staff will work with town staff to make sure that the Town is aware of how we will plan to follow all guidelines. We would like to request a rain date of Saturday, September 26 which is 2 weeks later. Thank you for considering that request." Mayor Bugg, "Job well done on the Grab – a – Crab. Mr. Kirkbride I know you are on the agenda for later but job well done to you as well." R. Carter, "I hope you can indulge me for than a minute and a half. I am the chairman for the economic development authority for Lancaster County. Last Friday I had the privilege of writing 37 \$1,000 checks for businesses in Kilmarnock because of the CARES Act money that was given to them. As you know, tomorrow we get our second funding and that means that you all get an additional \$32,000 and I hope that some of that will go to small businesses. The Lancaster County board of supervisors asked Julien Patterson, Paul Shacatoan, Jimmy Carter, Susan Cockrell, and Jeff Serpersik who is the CEO of Chesapeake Bank to form a citizens' business advisory board. Jeff is the liaison for that board. We have passed a resolution that the board of supervisors has approved. We have now engaged a funding operation to apply for over \$500,000 in funding for Lancaster County. We have hired a firm who works with rural communities and they have been very successful in getting loan grants. The federal EDA has \$1.6 billion and they have targeted \$60,000,000 in the Mid Atlantic so we hope to be able to get \$500,000. Those monies can go toward a business assistance center that will hopefully be located very close to you all. Business assistance center purpose is to accelerate our regions opportunity to track the work from home sector that is growing exponentially because of the pandemic. With many seeking a quality of life place to relocate we think that we are right in the heart of places to relocate between Washington, Tidewater, and Richmond. We engaged the public private partnership. Chesapeake Bank put in half and the EDA put in the other half to engage the firm to write a grant process for us. This business assistance center will be funded for approximately 3 years and the center will be staffed by an executive director who will be focused on providing cautionary services to individuals considering moving here. Services will include what is for sale and what is for rent which will help the real estate market. The status of the internet services that we have here will be duplicated with duplicity in high speed internet. We will also coordinate local contractors for home and office equipment installations and anything else people may need when moving to this area. The center will also provide a connectivity fiber for these needing access that can't get in their homes. Secretarial and related support. A place to co-work environment and an opportunity to collaborate, socialize with like-minded individuals. We believe in investing in the happiness of the work from home will pay in attracting others. We validate their satisfaction and can attract businesses that are concerned about retaining new workers in this area. There is a lot more to this, some of the Rappahannock Record had a big article about this. If there is any information you need to know about this please let us know. In writing these checks, the municipalities cannot

write checks to the businesses for grants but an EDA can assist and we can write checks and distribute them. You do not have to do the vetting. Kilmarnock had \$45,000 set aside for 45 \$1,000 grants. They only had 40 applications and 37 were approved. Hopefully you can get some money to small businesses because right now are hurting. A couple of months ago restaurants were closed. I realize you need it for your offices. I know 1 member of council got a check for \$1,000 last week. If you have any questions about the EDA, we were formed in 1974 and the last 2 years we have moved towards funding private enterprise and new businesses. Previously, we were almost all non-profits. Two members of your community just got a \$10,000 check for the Chesapeake Donut Company. We looked at their business and saw four employees that they employee and \$10,000 which is our maximum grant that we can give unless there is a special exception. We get our money through bonds. We can float up to \$10,000,000 a year in bonds but it is getting tough to do that because all of the counties are looking to fund initiatives. We are looking at different initiatives so that we can get different kinds of funding. We just created our strategic goals and mission statement. The representative from this district is Bruce Sanders. We have 5 board members, one from each district, and 2 at-large members Jeff Syperski and Dr. Charlotte Silverman." Mayor Bugg, "Thank you. We appreciate all that the EDA does." B. Forrester, "437 The Lane. I would like to thank Mr. Carter, that was very helpful. I would like to echo his comments and ensure that some of this CARES money makes it to small businesses of this town that were impacted by COVID-19. I would urge the Council to proceed with the grant that Dudley and the Tides were able to leverage through the Virginia Tourism Commission. A large percentage of this Town's revenue comes from tax that is levied through the tourism industry and this grant is a great opportunity for us to market and drive more tourism to the area during the shoulder season where there is typically less tourism so that we can increase our taxes and hopefully by doing that continue to keep our resident taxes lower. I would be in favor of the town leveraging those tax dollars which is somewhere in the neighborhood of \$10,000 - \$15,000 that we will get from VTC by leveraging those grants and as Mr. Carter mentioned there are very few of these grants that are gifted around. Dudley did a fantastic job and it would be a shame to let that go to waste." C. Braly, "298 Chesapeake Drive. I just wanted to introduce myself. I submitted an application to be on the planning commission. For those of you that don't know me I have been in Irvington since 2007. I would appreciate the opportunity to participate in the town government and I look forward to working with you to plan and develop Irvington." Mayor Bugg, "Thank you for your input. We will move on to the next time on the agenda."

#### F. REPORT FROM BUDGET & FINANCE COMMITTEE

F. Westbrook, "Thank you Mr. Mayor. You should have in front of you a streamline report from the budget and finance committee. We have met and are beginning the amended FY20/21 budget process. We will begin the weekly meetings starting next week and those dates are listed for you. If we get lucky we won't need all of them. Our proposed budget schedule has been prepared for Council to consider. You will find on there weekly workshops that we will be doing. You will also see where town council has a workshop with us. Also the advertising and noticing calendar for you all to reference. We are hopeful that we can have an amended budget for you all and can vote by the November 12 meeting. After that we will move into our normal budget process. We are going to be considering projected revenues, we had to reassess due to COVID-19 and some of those taxes what we will reassess will be occupancy tax, local sales tax, potential increase or decrease in existing taxes, fees and or rates. We will also consider new taxes, fees and or rates. Those things are nothing new because we talk about them every year but I want to remind Council those things will be considered and talked about. We are requesting that all of our committees and commissions and staff get to the budget and finance committee their projected expenses for the rest of this fiscal year. They already have some contracts from staff but we will need contacts from vendors and professionals. We are also looking at cost regarding possible police coverage and that will be a biggie for us. We will need that information. Our capital budget will be reviewed. Items of concern are the condition of the tennis courts, age and condition of the septic system at the Commons which we rent to Chesapeake Bank and ongoing repairs to the town office versus a new facility of some sort. I will draw to your attention on your financial report, the balance sheet that you see for July we have updated the real estate valuation based on the county's latest reassessment. That gives us a better position financially, credit wise which is important to us. Anthony, do you want to add anything? Are there any questions. We will vote on the calendar later in the agenda." Mayor Bugg, "We will move on to item to which is to adopt the proposed budget schedule. You have all had a chance to review the schedule. Is there a motion to approve the budget schedule?" D. #### G. REPORT FROM HUMAN RESOURCE COMMITTEE - D. Patteson, Chair

D. Patteson, "One month on the job and we have gone through an orientation with staff. The Mayor and I are the human resource committee for the town council. We valued the orientation and it was abely provided. We have reviewed the applications for the planning commission. Both candidates being present in this room both quality candidates. We discussed the appointment with the zoning administrator who is the most likely person to interface with this position. We have also revisited contracts with staff. That concludes the human resources report." Mayor Bugg, "Anything else for Mr. Patteson?

#### H. REPORT FROM THE ZONING ADMINISTRTOR - L. Brown

L. Brown, "Thank you Mr. Mayor. At their last meeting, the planning commission set their next meeting for September 8 at 6:30 pm here at the Irvington Baptist Church. Since the last town council meeting I have completed the flood plain training as required by DCR, all five components have been passed and completed. I have responded and communicated with 16 residents in the last 4 regarding various issues such as noise ordinance, burn laws, sign and fence ordinances, tree removal within RPA, pool construction within the RPA, deck removal and replacement options within the RPA; tall grass on neighboring property, bushes encroaching on roads, construction and farm equipment on residential property, dock piling concerns on Carter's Creek, missing street signs in Vineyard Grove and individual zoning. A lot of this is concerning recent property bought in Irvington. Just general what can I do and what is the process type questions. I continue to provide assistance to the applicants and prepare staff reports for CUP 5 and CUP 6 specifically post notice in the Rappahannock Record and provide a list of adjacent land owners within 300' of applicant. Answer questions regarding those notifications and ensure timelines are met with CUP schedule. Gather data pertinent to applications for the staff report. I have met with the planning commission chair to review recommended revisions to the CUP application. Provided assistance to the chair preparing for August planning commission meeting. Two site visits with Lancaster officials regarding zoning administrator concerns with land disturbance within RPA. Landscape mitigation meetings will occur shortly with the landowners. Responded and provided technical assistance to 2

residents requesting to remove trees within the RPA. Educating land owners on the Chesapeake Bay Act performance standards and then provided technical assistance as needed to those residents. As a follow up with an issue that I was charged with when I first-started which was the removal of the abandoned property on Tax Map 34-I- that resident is working hard to get the abandoned structures removed. She has called two companies and has one estimate of the two and is waiting on the second estimate. The issue is due to the tornado last week the contractor is backed up 2 months and is not high on a priority list because the contractor is having to prioritize his workload right now and if he is hired to do the work for this property owner it will be another 2 months. I assured her I would adjust the timeline that we gave her as long as soon has she told us who the contractor was and the timeline would be I would let the town council know so we can see if we are in agreement that the timeline would be about 60 days. Because of the request and education that I have been doing with residents regarding RPA issues, I felt it would be prudent to put an ad in the newspaper noticing the current and existing rules because there is confusion regarding what the can and cannot do with within the RPA with docks, repairs, new pilings, expand use on docks, they need to come to the office and get the proper permits or at least ask the questions before doing it on their own. The notice in the paper will represent what our existing codes are. This has been done it the past and I think it is time to do this again. Call the office before you disturb the RPA." Mayor Bugg, "Council is there anything else for Mrs. Brown?" F. Westbrook, "Can we go ahead and allow them to put the ad in the paper or does it need to come back to us?" S. Phillips, "It will be paid by invoice therefore will get an appropriation next month." Mayor Bugg, "Great idea, thank you."

#### I. REPORT FROM THE TOWN ATTORNEY

N. Keane, "This a follow up to prior reports on Through Truck Restriction." VDOT determined that Route 646 to Route 3 is an appropriate route for us. After Mr. Kellum spoke at the last meeting about the trees on Route 646 I reached out to VDOT and asked them to prune which they did. VDOT has now added Route 646 to its maintenance contractor pruning services. Second item is the difference between regular and special meetings, that question was asked of me during the last meeting during roundtable by Councilman Nunnally. I have since the meeting researched this and had a phone conversation with Councilman Nunnally and Mayor Bugg. Councilman Nunnally understands the issues now. I do not want to take up extra time during the meeting with a report on this but if anyone has a question I would be happy to take a call or meet with you to discuss the difference between regular and special meetings." Mayor Bugg, "Thank you."

#### J. REPORT FROM THE MAYOR

Mayor Bugg, "First item I would like to mention is utility poles and the stump removal. Mrs. Schaschek, I think you brought this to our attention and I thank you for doing that. I have since walked the grounds of the North Commons and looked at the stumps and telephone poles with Mrs, Westbrook and the Clerk. We have taken a look and have discussed the location and need for attention." S. Phillips, "Working with Arrowhead there enough downed limed and trash to require additional work. Do I need to request any permissions from Council allowing for this to be included in their monthly invoice? Once that is done we can proceed with the existing contract to move forward. The tree that needs to be removed has never been identified. I believe it is the wish of Council to have proceed with the other work regardless of identifying the tree that was being considered to be removed. For the budget and finance committee, how would you like for me to proceed because this is under the capital budget? Do we do this work now because it is lush and green or would you prefer me to wait until there is a frost?" F. Westbrook, "I don't know it would be under the capital budget." B. Schaschek, "Stump removal is under capital budget because it was for the slab for the shed at one time." F. Westbrook, "That is correct." S. Phillips, "Arrowhead is in the annual appropriation but the budget and finance committee requested only lawn care - no street cleanings, no leaf removal or similar work performed due to the cash flow concern. I do know that we will have to utilize Arrowhead before we can remove the stumps." F. Westbrook, "That is already in the capital budget." S. Phillips, "What about the timing? Do we need an appropriation now? Due to the tornado damage I don't know that companies are going to prioritize this work. Is it okay if this moves out 60-90 days given the volume of storm related work?" F. Westbrook, "We don't have a choice in this." Mayor Bugg, "You have heard mention during the workshop and this meeting the issues we have had with the town

' office. You may or may not know we suffered basement flooding at the town office as a result of the hurricane. There was some flooding in the basement and if you recall there was a significant rainfall the following Thursday which also flooded the basement again which resulted in a very moldy environment. The stench was unbearable for staff. As a result we have had Bay Restoration move in as soon as possible to fix the problem related to immediate water and mold. That is primarily why the office was closed Friday because the office was unworkable environment. There are also problems with our current office and the ability to social distance. It is extremely difficult to social distance in that office. We have submitted the flooding to the insurance company. Bay Restoration is on top of things and have provided a report. With this and with COVID temporary office space is being explored and I will be discussing this further in closed session but I wanted the public to be aware. We need to address this now because Mother Nature is bringing this even more to the forefront. Thank you to all who have communicated tonight and through emails about Truck Restriction. The Transportation Board is going to hear the record and consider this. I think it is a very important thing to have and I am very much in favor of seeing this happen. As you heard me mention, the town attorney is going to research enforcement issues and policing so the Council is moving forward to make sure that we have all of the research we need to make this happen. I have also taken the step to speak with Mayor Reeve of White Stone about the possibility of sharing a police officer. The various shift arrangement that could involve and ways we can make this work. During our initial conversation he was not entirely favorable because Chief of Police Cliff Dawson is also in Kilmarnock is stretched thin and we definitely don't want stretch our police departments too thin. We are going to be revisiting that with him. I appreciate his concerns and seeing about other avenues that we can explore whether with Kilmarnock or White Stone or Lancaster. I did notice that a deputy was on King Carter today. Speeding is an issue and enforcement is also an issue and if you connect that to the golf carts that were mentioned earlier enforcement is something we are trying to find the best way to make that happen. Thank you for all of your input, Next, I have 2 issue that were raised during the July 9 meeting. They were raised in a public forum and the newspaper has commented on them and we have been addressing them so I want to make a statement tonight speaking to those issues. Any council members whose names are mentioned it is done with all due respect and I just want to clear things up as much as I can tonight. The first issue is Irvington Town Charter Article III, Section XII. B. Schaschek asked for an opinion about Charter Article III, Section XII and the vote that I took to break a tie to extend the legal services contract for 2 years. Mrs. Schaschek suggested that the tie vote that I took in favor of extending the regarding the legal services contract was not allowed by Charter Article III, Section XII because in her opinion, a legal services contract is the same as contracting for debt which would require a super majority vote of 4 council members. Since this question involves the legal services contract the town attorney advised me as well as Mrs. Schaschek and all other council members that she is not able to provide a legal opinion about a legal services contract between herself and the Town because it is a conflict. In an effort to resolve this matter I met with Mrs. Schaschek twice since the last meeting to discuss this and other issues. I also met individually with Vice Mayor Westbrook, Councilman Patteson and Councilman Marchetti. I participated in a conference call with Councilman Nunnally. Mrs. Brown, I welcome the opportunity to meet with you as well. I have not met with you regarding this but I welcome the opportunity to do so. Yesterday Mrs. Schaschek changed courses and told me that she is no longer concerned about the legal services contract being a contract for debt. Now she is proceeding with the allegation that the appropriations made for general operating expenses including payroll for staff and the legal services provider are invalid. The Mayor of Irvington has a duty and authority from the General Assembly under Charter Article III, Section VII among other things to see that the bylaws, ordinances, acts and resolutions of the council are faithfully executed and obeyed. The mayor is the parliamentarian of this town. Presiding over meetings of the council is another significant duty of the mayor. I take this duty and authority very seriously. I have reviewed the question about whether my vote to break a tie in favor extending the legal services contract was proper. I reviewed the additional question about the validity of appropriations of general operating expenses. I have looked at the Charter Article III, Section XII, the section requested by B. Schaschek and the corresponding provisions of the State law, the Constitution of Virginia, the Town Code and the minutes of the last meeting and the legal services contract. The Town's position is the vote I took on July 9, 2020 to break a tie and extend the legal services contract was proper. The mayor may break a tie on a services contract. There were only 4

specific votes on which the mayor cannot break a tie and a services contract is not one of them. The legal services contract is not a contract for debt. Contract for debt or debt instruments like bonds, notes, other obligations our own Charter provide clarity on the definition of contracting debts in Article IV. Legal services contract is not a debt because it is terminable at any time by the Town, is paid after the services are performed, and not a debt instrument. If legal services are debt then every service contract for the Town like the landscaping, IT services, accounting and consulting services contracts would be debt requiring a super majority vote. This was not intended by the General Assembly and would greatly hamper the ability to operate local governments. The appropriations for general operating expenses were approved June 11 and July 9. Both votes were unanimous in favor of making the appropriations. Mrs. Schaschek as well as all other council members voted in favor. Mrs. Schaschek obviously voted both times in favor of the appropriations and is now taking a position against her own votes and the Town in general in seeking to invalidate these votes. The approved appropriations include staff payroll, and a legal services provider. The appropriations are valid and properly adopted. I am very confident that my analysis is correct. It is simply time to move on. Many hours have been spent on this issue which was never on the agenda. Second item, comments made at the July 9 meeting and stated in two separate editions of the Rappahannock Record about an alleged lack of transparency of the Town government. I have reviewed the statements made by Councilmember Brown suggesting we would be failing in our fiduciary duty to vote on contacts we had not seen. This comment relates to votes taken at the last meeting on motions about staff contracts. The suggestion that members voted on contracts without ever having seen them is not true for a couple of reasons. First, the prior town council unanimously voted to approve these contracts in 2019 and in previous years after vetting and drafting by the human resources committee. Four current members including Ms. Brown took those votes. Speaking for myself, I can tell you that I have seen them. Second, we did not vote on the contracts we voted on specific motions to amend or extend those contracts. Based on the comments of the meeting and the subsequent reporting, I can tell there is certainly confusion. We voted on motions that specified the specific changes to the existing contracts which had been previously approved. The motions that were approved at the last meeting were very simple. They were to add the words FOIA Officer to the clerk/treasurer contract and to extend the legal services contract for 2 years. Each proposed change to an existing contract was stated in the motion on the agenda. The votes taken were to approve the motions which were on the agenda. To Ms. Brown's point however, councilmembers who wanted to see the contracts could have inspected them at any point and some did inspect them. Contracts are public records that are available for inspection at the town office by councilmembers as well as residents. I have asked the clerk to post all the current staff contracts on the town website. Those contracts were also reviewed by the human resource committee. I am disheartened about these and other negative comments I have heard this year. Procedural challenges and questions are repeatedly raised. This is not the best use of meeting time. These issues can be addressed before a meeting and not at the table or by the appropriate committee. Doing so would increase efficiency to allow more substantive work for the town. The residents of Irvington want a smart forward thinking government and I aim to see to it that we deliver on that expectation. My door is always open. With that, that concludes my Mayor's Report and we will now move on to old business."

Reinstating Emergency Ordinance 2020-06 (extension of Emergency Continuation of Government S. Phillips, "Members of Council, this is an opportunity to discuss if you want to extend this resolution. The previous resolution expires August 25th. So if you want to extend we can request the town attorney to draft otherwise the resolution would lapse." F. Westbrook, "How long did we extend it?" B. Schaschek, "We extended it 60 days last time but we have the town office open with the door closed and by appointment only. What do we need to do in an emergency? Do we need to have an emergency declared for the CARES Act?" N. Keane, "We have declared a disaster already under the current resolution and that has no end date, it ends when the emergency ends. This is a separate initiative allowing electronic meetings and the ability to have the mayor restrict who goes in and out of our property for emergency purposes and other things related to COVID. Originally the first ordinance that you passed was for 60 days and it stated that it can only last for 6 months. The reason it was drafted that way is, it is not a requirement for the Town of Irvington to limit it to 6 months. You can wait and reinstate it when we need electronic meetings if you think that is the way to go or we could modify and reinstate without an end date and have it run coincidently with the resolution that declared the disaster and have it be open ended." F. Westbrook, "But it can only be for 6 months." N. Keane, "No, 6 months is for counties whereas towns can do this for longer." B. Schaschek, "We also passed another resolution. Is that just for conference calls, telephone calls, calling into meetings?" N. Keane, "That one was a resolution under FOIA the new section for attending meetings by phone." F. Westbrook, "That was just updating our policy." B. Schaschek, "So now we can dial into the meeting if we cannot attend." N. Keane, "We just need direction on whether you all want to, since it is an emergency ordinance, you can pass it again tonight and it will be for 60 day. If you want it to be open ended I will have to change the words to make it open ended or you could do both – pass it tonight and next month make it open ended. There are several paragraphs that deal with allowing the mayor to determine when the office is closed. If the phasing went back he may have that authority under police power so he may not need that in there because it was put in everybody's." F. Keane, "I can just change it next month and you can decide if you want to extend it further at all for an open ended period. So you want to pass it again tonight." B. Schaschek, "That's fine." F. Westbrook, "We will pass it for an additional 2 months." Mayor Bugg, "Can I get a motion to extend the emergency declaration for another 60 days?" F. Westbrook, "Move." B. Schaschek, "Second." We really need to look into the shed again for the storage of items that are currently at the Tides property"—*B. Schaschek, Councilwoman* 

B. Schaschek, "We did discuss the stump removal. Do we have an update on the telephone removals?" F. Westbrook, "Are we talking about the North Commons or the one in front of your house?" B. Schaschek, "The one in front of the post office, my house, there are several of them. There a couple that are hazardous." S. Phillips, "I suspect with current conditions related to the recent hurricane and tornado that Dominion Energy resources are being utilized for storm remedy. Otherwise I have no new information." A. Marchetti, "But the request has already been made?" S. Phillips, "Yes, and we have been put on their calendar. They communicated it was a multi month turn around." B. Schaschek, "It has been 2.5 years. The other thing is the Christmas lanterns. Last year we had decided that some of them were in pretty bad shape and we replaced the bulbs and now they look quite nice except half of them were missing their bows. Fran and I were going to make bows but it was too late then to get the materials and make them. Do we want to make the bows for these? We looked for

stuff but have never decided on something to replace. We are only going to replace 10 at a time." S. Phillips, "The value that was put in the budget was in anticipation of \$500 per item. We have new committee members so we should ask the committee to assess how many require immediate replaced. That money was in last years budget but not spent and it is in this budget as a capital expense. Do you want this to occur so that the new lanterns are in place for this holiday season?" F. Westbrook, "If you are talking about this holiday season we are almost too late." S. Phillips, "I think the most time consuming part of this process is to choose the lantern design. There had been a conversation with a resident where suggestions were being considered. We can have a workshop where council can decide or council can instruct that if that existing lantern is available again we simply replace with the same design." B. Schaschek, "That is what we were looking for." S. Phillips, "The committee and council need to determine which lanterns to replace and one of the tools we might us is the Dominion Energy has a fantastic app for streetlight outages that identifies the position of each streetlight in Irvington on a map and from there if we go with a different style lantern how do you intend to phase the replacement?" B. Schaschek, "We did that last year." S. Phillips, "If you only replace 5 where do you want them?" B. Schaschek, "We were going to purchase 10." F. Westbrook, "We were going to replace a whole area at a time." S. Phillips, "Is that something that can go back to the committee to decide? Can we purchase the lanterns if the same style is available or do you want to consider the style lantern that was selected by a resident? Does council want to decide on the style?" F. Westbrook, "If we are only going to replace a few at a time we want to stay with the same style so that it is uniform. Maybe we should go back to the committee?" B. Schaschek, "I don't know who the committee is." F. Westbrook, "We are going to miss the boat for ordering." B. Schaschek, "We need to order the stuff to make the bows." S. Phillips, "Mayor Bugg and Councilman Marchetti are on the committee." S. Phillips, "Do I need an appropriation to spend monies from capital budget?" B. Schaschek, "Let's find out what they are going to do first." S. Phillips, "I will come back to you in September with a proposal." F. Westbrook, "Are you going to address the shed?" B. Schaschek, "Rannie used to have the relationship with the Tides Inn and we store our stuff over at the Lodge in an open type shed that is not closed in and there are a lot of interesting critters." F. Westbrook, "There are snakes and mice." B. Schaschek, "Stuart is no longer here. Rannie is no longer here. Rannie had the key to get in and out of there so do we need to take rent someplace to move this stuff? We are obviously not going to build a shed in the next 6 months so do we need to move this to a storage unit? There are a lot of tubs with bulbs and all of the lanterns are hanging there." F. Westbrook, "Hanging is the way to keep them in the best shape that they can be kept in but it takes up a lot of room because we have 30 lanterns and at least 5 or 6 lanterns that are not working." B. Schaschek, "There are extras for parts." F. Westbrook, "We have kept the ones that are not working for parts. We really do need to get some direction sooner rather than later." Mayor Bugg, "Now on to new business."

#### 1. Motion to authorize use of Town Commons for Farmers Market under existing Contract; September 5, 2020

G. Kirkbride, "Yes we request being able to use it for the September market and we would do it according to the agreement in place between the VIA and Town Council and we would hold it in the manner we used for the August Farmers Market." D. Patteson, "How many people did you have at the August Farmers Market?" G. Kirkbride, "We estimate that we had 150 people on the property but overall we estimate around 300 people." D. Patteson, "What is the mask policy that you have?" G. Kirkbride, "The mask policy is that the vendors are required to be masked and we strongly encourage the patrons to wear a mask." D. Patteson, "Viewing from across the street there was a very large gathering and it might be prudent to put signage up that masks are required." G. Kirkbride, "We can increase the signage and also we will make available masks for the next one so that there will not be any excuse because we have already purchased those." F. Phillips, "I spoke with the contractor regarding this specific topic and he suggested the roots of the ornamental grasses have not corrupted the surfaces of the tennis courts. We can ask our lawn care contractor to remove the portion of the ornamental grasses that are growing through the fence." D. Patteson, "There is grass in the playing court." S. Phillips, "I have spoken to Arrowhead and requested they spray the grass growing in the playing court. It is not recommended to pull the grass when it is green because it will make a larger hole in the membrane." F. Westbrook, "Why would Arrowhead do this and not the repair guy?" S. Phillips, "It is up the lawn care contactor to apply the weed/grass killer." F. Westbrook, "I didn't think we could use chemicals." S. Phillips, "I have confirmed with both of the contractors that using a weed eliminator will not compromise the surface of the tennis courts. This will be a line item above and beyond routine grass mowing on his monthly invoice. When the tennis court contract is received you will make the decision as to how to repair the tennis courts. Someone has suggested that the ornamental grasses growing through the tennis courts be addressed. This is included in the scope of work requested from Arrowhead or the repair contractor." F. Westbrook, "The VIA is responsible for the ornamental grasses. Maybe give the VIA the opportunity to deal with this since they have done all of the hard work and they have been really good about the upkeep. Maybe we could talk to Julie and see what she wants to do. I don't want to box out the VIA because they have spent so much time and money there." Mayor Bugg, "Thank you. Next will be round table."

# REQUEST TO RESTRICT THROUGH TRUCK TRAFFIC ON ROUTE 200 IN IRVINGTON

WHEREAS, the Town of Irvington experiences significant volume of truck traffic passing through the Town on Route 200 from points north and south; and

WHEREAS, the volume has continued to increase; and

WHEREAS, there is an adequate alternate route for trucks to travel via Route 3 through White Stone to James B. Jones Memorial Highway, which is already being used as a through truck restriction for Kilmarnock; and

WHEREAS, the Virginia Department of Transportation ("VDOT") has determined that Route 646 (Old Salem Road) is an adequate alternate route for through trucks to travel from Route 200 to Route 3 around Irvington; and

**WHEREAS**, the character and frequency of truck traffic on Route 200 is not compatible with the area; and

**WHEREAS**, both sides of the Route 200 roadway are residential in nature in Irvington as well as adjoining portions in Lancaster County; and

WHEREAS, Route 200 in Irvington meets the criteria set forth in VA Code §46.2-809 for restriction of through truck traffic, namely (i) reasonable alternate routing is provided; (ii) character and/or frequency of the truck traffic on the route proposed for restriction is not compatible with the affected area; and (iii) roadway is residential in nature or functionally classified as either local or collector.

**NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED**, that Irvington Town Council hereby requests a restriction of through truck traffic be established on Route 200 in the Town pursuant to VA Code §46.2-809, resulting in through trucks using Route 646 to Route 3; and

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED,** that the Irvington Town Council requests the support of the Lancaster County Board of Supervisors, on behalf of Lancaster County, the jurisdiction adjoining the Town of Irvington with respect to Route 200, to establish a restriction of through truck traffic on Route 200 in Irvington, and to coordinate with Lancaster County on the submission of a joint request for a restriction of through truck traffic on Route 200; and

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that the Mayor and Town Attorney are hereby authorized to prepare and submit the necessary materials, to appear before Lancaster County Supervisors, VDOT, and Commonwealth Transportation Board ("CTB"), as needed, to conclude this project.

#### D. PUBLIC COMMENT

Mayor Bugg, "Again, thank you for joining us tonight. I see there are a lot of you here tonight so, I ask that you raise your hand if you wish to speak." J. Harris, "As president of the VIA I would like to thank Council for allowing the VIA to hold many events on the Town Commons. Our spring concert was canceled due to COVID-19 and it has been tentatively rescheduled for September 3 the Thursday before Labor Day. Should Council vote to open the Commons we would like to request permission to have the concert. As last year, this would be a family event, picnic style with a roped area for alcoholic beverages. We would like to encourage people to bring their picnics and join us should we be able to use the Commons." Mayor Bugg, "Thank you." J. Ewing, "Two issues. One, I want to stress the importance of the town staff. Having an independent town clerk provides you the ability to not only to do the town's business but to provide a goal of reassurance that the town's business is performed according to the law and according to what the council dictates. I would be concerned if the council became more involved in the actual duties of the town. The council exists as a supervisory role and if the town council becomes more actively involved in doing the duties of the town they become doer's and not overseer's you can't correct your own work which is one of the accounting rules. So, I urge the council as you re-do contracts that you maintain the employment levels so that the town can function. The second thing is I would encourage the town council to investigate a sewer system. Is there a committee or planning that can be done. It is a long term goal but if we don't get started now we will never get there. All of the other towns in the area seem to be competed and I think it is our time to step up to the plate and figure out where these funds can come from and move forward." G. Del Rio, "I grew up in this town and I have been gone for 20 years out being a community development executive. I just moved back and it is nice to be home. I want to second what Jeff said about the town staff. I have heard that this council actually considered removing positions and doing things yourself. I see puzzled faces but that is what the talk is. I am speaking out against that. I have worked with lots and lots of town's with community development. I have worked in real estate and affordable housing and it takes a lot of elected officials to accomplish goals but none of the elected officials were doing staff duties. There is a separation of duties in government which makes sense. I want to speak to the positive and say since being home I have interacted with Sharon. She is outstanding and knowledgeable. Another thing about having big staffs, which I have had over the years, what you get to realize in your executive role is that you don't know what you don't know. This is the case with Sharon, there are a lot of things that she does, I can quickly tell by working with her that she does things that nobody appreciates her for and that she takes care of. Also, I am really happy to see Lara in this role. It can be a contentions conversation talking about zoning and providing the guidance and she is so professional, calm and courteous. The town

attorney needs to be a separate, independent legal advisor. I would also second that we need to work on sewer. I think Irvington has the opportunity to raise a lot of grant money if you look at the age of our septic systems and how much water line we have in Irvington there are environmental grants that would pay for and build that system for us. We can also hook into Kilmarnock. I would volunteer to work on that committee." C. Brandley, "I know on the agenda there are plans to talk about the appointments and contracts for both the clerk, treasurer, FOIA officer and town attorney. I would encourage the council to raise and verbalize any issues you have with staff. I have been coming to meetings for a long time and there don't seem to be any issues you are accepting their work products so I am surprised why there is conversation about reappointments and contracts." T. Kellum, "Mr. Mayor and Members of Council, I am Tommy Kellum with W.E. Kellum Seafood and across the creek in Weems. I come tonight to start a dialogue with the council about an alternative truck route. We handle 8 million pounds of shell oysters a year with the exception of about 1.5 million pounds most come by truck. Company-wide we have strategic policy to use Old Salem Road however some of our larger trucks we have issues with the overhanging vegetation and more importantly an issue with bicyclist on that road. We would like to open a dialogue and thoughts about the Town supporting going to VDOT and have them take a look at that road and have them make it more of a truck route. I did some investigative work in the last few weeks at our retail establishment at Pittman's Corner and over 80% of our trucks are using Old Salem. We have some 53' trailers that have issues on that road. I have one carrier out of Hampton that carries our freight to the midwest that is having the same issues. We have tried with VDOT but have not had success. VDOT has done a terrific job on Christ Church Road we have that wide open now and we can get in quicker but Old Salem is still an issue. Part of that is proper signage that it is a truck route with the tourism and bicyclist situation we had a close call with a truck and a cyclist who was actually on the opposite of the pattern he should have been which scared the driver to death. We would like to open the dialogue and request support from the town investigating what the truck route would look like. As we look in the new retail establishment, we look to the residents and the Town of Irvington for support. Thank you." Mayor Bugg, "Anyone else? If not, we will move on."

#### E. REPORT FROM THE ZONING ADMINISTRATOR - L. Brown, Zoning Administrator

L. Brown, "I have been on the job for 5 days and it has been busy. A certified letter was sent to a property owner at Tax Map Parcel 34 I 19 and 34 I 18. After visiting said parcels I found five abandoned and unsafe structures which are violation of Town Code 91.01 Public Safety; 130.001 Abandonment of iceboxes and the like; 130.070 Nuisances. Property owner was given 30 days to respond and remedy and to rectify the problem with a timeline. This was decided at the last town council meeting when a resident presented a letter stating unsafe structures behind their house. A certified letter was sent to the property owner. There are two CUP's. CUP 2020.5 Tax Map Parcel 35-20; zoning R-1; The Lane; purpose to build new private dock at residence. CUP 2020.6 Tax Map Parcel 33-379 C; zoning M-1; 37 Seafood Lane; purpose to modify use of existing building, create mixed use building of three units namely one professional office and two apartments. Enlarge existing building to allow for this use. Later on in the agenda I will be asking council to approve a CUP schedule. Responded to a resident complaint of bushes encroaching visibility on The Lane on two separate lots. I called the owner of both lots and requested they please remedy the situation at earliest convenience. Zoning Permit 2020.07 for Tax Map Parcel 33 038 E; R-1; 461 King Carter Drive; S. Dudley; for a garage rebuild within existing footprint. As mentioned earlier this is the time of year that planning commission and town council adopt a new floodplain map. I will attend virtual meetings starting July 13 through DCR."

#### F. REPORT FROM THE TOWN ATTORNEY - Nancyellen Keane, Esq.

N. Keane, "Going along with Mr. Kellum was saying a few minutes ago. Later in the agenda we will have a first reading of the no through truck resolution. It was read last time but the reason we are doing it over again is because VDOT called me in the interim and told me they want to use Old Salem Road as the actual no through truck cut through to Route 3 which is exactly what Mr. Kellum is asking for. VDOT came to Irvington about 10 days ago and road Route 646 and determined it is an appropriate alternate route so that truck will not come through Irvington. Originally VDOT supported using Harris Road to Route 3 but later they realized it was too

far up for the Weems traffic and they wanted to use a closer in road and Old Salem Road is what they determined is appropriate. Later we will have the first reading of the resolution with that paragraph added."

G. REPORT FROM THE PLANNING COMMISSION - J. Brown, Planning Commission Liaison

J. Harris, "We had the first reading of Resolution to change our by-laws from 10 days to 3 days to align with a council. We had election of officers. We had a report on a webinar that was attended by two council members."

#### H. OLD BUSINESS

1. Motion to reappoint Keane Law PLLC as Town Attorney for 2 year term (July 1, 2020 – June 30, 2022) - F. Westbrook, Councilwoman

Mayor Bugg, "Do I have a motion?" F. Westbrook, "I so move." J. Brown, "May I make some comments?" Mayor Bugg, "Once I get a second we can move to discuss." A. Marchetti, "Second." Mayor Bugg, "Proceed with discussion." J. Brown, "I would like to make a motion to table motions 1-4 under old business. We are being asked, the council is being asked, to reappoint the town attorney and clerk without knowing the terms of their reappointments. We have never received copies of the contracts. There is no information for us to make a proper judgement. The town council, the largest expenditures for Irvington is the salary of the public servants paid by our tax payers. The council will be failing in its fiduciary duties if it reappointed individuals or extended contracts without knowing what those contracts were. I don't think you would give advice to a client that they should sign a contracts that they didn't read. I am asking for the opportunity to read the contracts before we make an extension or make any decision." Fitness and exercise which includes sports facilities, I think is broad enough to cover the playground and tennis court. These require 10' distance apart, all participants maintain 10' physical distancing, limited to 75% of lowest occupancy load, employers must insure cleaning and disinfection of shared equipment, facilities must prohibit the use of any equipment that cannot be thoroughly disinfected, which is harder to do for the playground than for the tennis court. Business' must supply hand sanitizer or hand washing stations." F. Westbrook, "Family units do not have to practice that, is that correct? If a family is there with their family at the playground they do not have to practice that?" N. Keane, "Correct." B. Schaschek, "But the Town is responsible for cleaning the playground. That is where it gets sticky." A. Marchetti, "It is impossible to clean behind." N. Keane, "The tennis court can probably be done if you put the hand sanitizer station right outside/inside the door. The purchase of the sanitizing equipment is reimbursable through the CARES funds." A. Marchetti, "That would be their only contact on the tennis courts. Can the door to the tennis courts be propped open?" D. Patteson, "Living across from the tennis courts, there are a lot of disappointed people that cannot play tennis." B. Yesterday, Travel and & Leisure magazine announced that Mii Amo and Enchantment Group for the 18th consecutive year are in the Travel & Leisure magazine hall of fame. Google is not a contractual service but it is debited from our banking account every month as an electronic fund transfer. The first half is what we are appropriating for the FY20/21. We will be able to renegotiate all of that when we go back into the budget process to come up with our real budget later on in this calendar year. The bottom half, the July 2020 appropriations are what Bonnie and I came up with last month and then Sharon and I come up with the rest of the anticipated expenditures for the month of July. We do have the category of projected cash disbursements and while that is not backed by any invoices this represents office supplies that are purchased online using the town debit card. We don't know the price prior to the purchase so we don't have the invoice to tie into this so we are estimating a projected cash disbursement for the month of July to cover office supplies. Any questions?" Mayor Bugg, "I need a motion to approve this." A. Marchetti, "Do we need to change the \$150 to?" F. Westbrook, "What is the cost of the sanitizing station?" S. 10. VIA request for August Farmers Market - Greg Kirkbride, Market Manager

G. Kirkbride, "I am the coordinator for the Irvington Farmers Market which has been an administrative job until now. I am proposing that we the August 1 market as our opening market for this year. We would certainly do it in a manner that is in accordance with the Governor's Phase 3 guidelines for all business sectors and anything that Irvington requires. We have had discussions already and we have heard some of the requirements such as the wearing of face masks by vendors, signage would be a big thing I have some interesting signs from the web. We would also have to enforce the distancing. I have talked to Hewlett's Tavern, they had a market a few weeks ago. They said it went very well and they had fewer vendors than normal because of concerns or because of spacing requirements. We would increase the spacing of the vendor layout on the Commons. I also realize we will have to address the portable toilets as part of our planning." W. Nunnally, "What would you be responsible for?" G. Kirkbride, "We have canvassed the VIA and we do have sufficient volunteers to staff the market. We would go out with a notice to all vendors of their requirements and ask if they are still interested. To date, I have 35 vendors that were interested in the August market. That has probably changed in the ensuing months but that is a pretty good indication of what kind of participation we would have. I am open to any questions you may have." B. Schaschek, "You need to provide the hand sanitizers and washing stations. Are you going to limit where the people are coming in? Will you have one entrance and one exit?" G. Kirkbride, "We already have a limit on that. We have two stations that we will set up. We will probably set up more stations. I am also going to urge the vendors to have their own stations." B. Schaschek, "They have to have their own stations because they have to clean in between each transactions. So, you will put a barricade across King Carter so they can't just walk across?" G. Kirkbride, "Right which we do anyway." Mayor Bugg, "Any other questions?" W. Nunnally, "Move we give them permission to do it under all those conditions." A. Marchetti, "Second." F. Westbrook, "Would we need for the VIA to sit down and talk with you or legal to make sure we have the little things ironed out due to the liability?" Mayor Bugg, "That's very advisable. # THE MOTION TO APPROPRIATE \$1,200 TO THE STEAMBOAT ERA MUSEUM FOR THE 2020 GRAB A CRAB IS PASSED 6-0.

B. Schaschek, "I also have a question, I have several, I would like Nancyellen's interpretation of item 12 of our Charter." N. Keane, "I'd like to look at this and get back to you all. Would you like for me to write something to all of you?" B. Schaschek, "What do you mean write something?" N. Keane, "I would like to have time to look at this before I answer." F. Westbrook, "What is item 12?" N. Keane, "I believe this is from Article III §12 of the Town Charter. It says, 'Council may adopt rules for regulating its proceedings but no tax shall be levied or corporate debt contracted except by recorded two-thirds vote of all members elected to the council or appropriation of money exceeding the sum of \$100 be made except by a recorded affirmative vote of a majority of all members elected to council.' Is there any context to this? Are there any facts that you want me to consider?" B. Schaschek, "No. I was just thinking that they are extending your contract and you don't have two-thirds vote to do that and according to the Charter going into corporate debt you need two-thirds vote to do that. That is how I am interpreting it." N. Keane, "Corporate debt is like a loan. This is usually for loans. For loans you have to have two-thirds vote of the governing body. I will look at this based on what you are asking and I will get back to you and the rest of council." Mayor Bugg, "Thank you Nancyellen." B. Schaschek, "The other thing I am questioning is Lara's contract. There were specific dollars and specific hours put in there. The hours were cut from the previous zoning administrator. The town council members never voted to cut those hours or on the salary. There was a discussion made but nothing to cut hours or salary for that position." N. Keane, "That was taken directly from the document that was given to council at the April meeting." B. Schaschek, "It was never approved." S. Phillips, "Mayor Ransone was authorized to negotiate and execute the contract." F. Westbrook, "We did authorize the mayor to do the contract for her." B. Schaschek, "Yes, but we never approved the hours or the pricing. That was up for discussion. The council never voted one way or another." N. Keane, "Is there a different amount that you would propose?" B. Schaschek, "I would suggest it going back to what the previous zoning administrator was." N. Keane, "The previous zoning administrator was the town manager." B. Schaschek, "That was by title only. That title came in after he was the zoning manager. Title only. Not functionality. We never voted on any of that. It was to be discussed." F. Westbrook, "So, what do you want us to do?" N. Keane, "Talk about it next month because this is roundtable." Mayor Bugg, "Yes let's talk about it next month." F. Westbrook, "So, we will put it on the agenda for next time." B. Schaschek, "See you don't want me on the planning commission with the ordinances and stuff. You will be in big trouble." W. Nunnally, "Mr. Mayor, so much of our doings is dependent on us having a police force. All of these ordinances and stuff that we have, our traffic and what have you. We can't do anything unless you, as authorized by our Charter, are our cop and go after them. It says you are the only enforcement officer we have." Mayor Bugg, "Trust me, the jokes have been made." F. Westbrook, "It has to be a white car." B. Schaschek, "We know he is not driving a white car." W. Nunnally, "On a more serious note I think we all understand that one of the things which is really beginning to be a thought for the council and especially the public is how are we going to employ a policeman, and enforce of our ordinances. I have, initially, since I am the chairman of the streets, contacted White Stone and asked if they would be willing if we were willing to pay for another person, to put it on their force and maybe share it. That dialogue has begun so if anybody has any influence in White Stone would you put pressure on them so that we can get that going. I will welcome any suggestions from anybody on how we can get that done." F. Westbrook, "Wayne, we all know that police enjoy donuts and since there is one right in White Stone maybe they could have some influence." W. Nunnally, "Anthony you need to sell donuts." W. Nunnally, "That is one thing that I want to bring to council. The other thing is in 2010 I wrote a letter when I was running for this office and the main thing in that letter said we have to control our traffic.

Ten years later we are still talking about traffic. What has been accomplished in ten years is this. King Carter used to have a right turn and the stop sign was in the right because it actually curves past that. It only took me eight years to get VDOT to straighten that thing out so that we have a stop sign in the middle of King Carter and a stop sign to the right so that you can left turn safely and right turn safely. VDOT moves very slowly. Anybody in this room that can write a letter to VDOT needs to write a letter because they get actions. I encourage all of you, really and truly, to start writing letters to VDOT. They have blinders on. The man stood here on the corner with me and saw three trucks going 45 mph and said 'we have to make a study, we have to put a little strip down the street to see if 65% of the people are speeding then maybe we can do something.' The only way we are going to get this traffic under control is if every one of us start writing letters to VDOT. I encourage you, please, to do that and help your chairman of streets to get something done. Thank you." Mayor Bugg, "Thank you Wayne, you are my street man." Mayor Bugg, "Wayne, I intend to exercise discretion and move into a regular meeting schedule. The issue is location. Why I put you on the spot is because of your connections to this church." W. Nunnally, "We want to get you all baptized." Mayor Bugg, "Where does the church stand? This is big and it works. I understand we are in an unprecedented time." W. Nunnally, "The church welcomes the opportunity to be a civic citizen. They welcome you here. What we need to do is be responsible. Clean it up and put it back in order when we leave. That sort of thing. On that particular thing, I am chairman of the board of directors of the church so I speak with a little authority. We do welcome the Town's use of the property. We may have to negotiate the price a little bit." Mayor Bugg, "I do think a simple letter agreement would be beneficial so if you want to get something to me I can take a look with legal." W. Nunnally, "The contract is presented by the other side because he church doesn't want to pay their lawyer." Mayor Bugg, "I will place the ad in the paper once we have a definite place and a more regular meeting schedule so that will be published. Wayne thanks for your help." W. Nunnally, "I don't understand a special meeting versus a regular meeting. I have read the charter and it looks to me like a special meeting should only be called in the case of an emergency and I don't understand why we keep calling a regular meeting a special meeting. Now I am really confused at you using your discretion going into a regular meeting when we were a special meeting. I would like to be informed of those definitions that is all." Mayor Bugg, "Anything else for roundtable?

Pollard Jr., "Thank you Mr. Mayor. Thank everybody for their service. I also wanted to let you know I'd made an application for a conditional use permit for the property on 37Seafood Lane for two apartments. I believe it is by right since it is zoned industrial but I have found in a small town it is better to say that upfront and if anybody has questions I hope to have a future house down there and my office in the other building. The way the building the building is configured and the property setback line there will be about 25 square feet sitting approaching the 35' line and I am working with the Town on that. If anybody has any questions, my goal is to upgrade the property. It was a little rundown when I bought the property about a year ago. Take it up and take out of that industrial use. I met with Sharon and put in my application. This is the old John Christopher building, Treakle and Christopher." K. Schaschek, "I just looked at the agenda under new business. You want to execute contracts for the clerk, treasurer and FOIA Officer and according to our Charter these have to be appointed every two years so that would be the new council's job to do. You can't sign a contract before these people are appointed." N. Keane, "There is a difference between a contract and an appointment. Sharon was appointed to the position of clerk and treasurer in September 2018 for a two year term ending September 2020. She has a contract that started on a different day. Just like me. I was appointed in September 2018 and I am anticipating you are going to be talking about me next. That one goes until September 2020. My contract goes on a fiscal year basis. We were intending to talk about the contracts and not the appointments to the office." K. Schaschek, "So that means that the appointment is contrary to what the Charter says because the Charter says that after the new council is coming every two years." N. Keane, "You are correct. Because we changed the Charter in January 2019 to go to July 1st." K. Schaschek, "July 1st so therefore." A. Pollard Jr., "Let her speak." K. Schaschek, "I get to make my point to." N. Keane, "We made the Charter changes because we realized the law had changed on elections 25 years ago and the Town of Irvington had not changed its Charter to be consistent so that council members that were elected in May come on in July 1 and go out on June 30. But what we haven't done since then, we did that with the General Assembly in January 2019, we have not done since then is a Town Code update which brings the Town Code which talks about the officers myself, this other position and others, those have not been brought in line so those still stay September. Town Code  $\S32.02 - 07$  you will see that the appointments are to be in September. That is why I was appointed in September. We would like to bring it in line but it hasn't been changed in the Town Code yet." A. Pollard Jr., "I'm sorry for barking at you, I couldn't hear what she was saying." T. Bugg, "As the mayor elect I would like to thank Mike, Kathleen and you Mayor Ransone for all of your time and thank you personally. And to all of you, I will be reaching out to you and appreciate any guidance you would like to share." K. Pollard, "Well, good luck to you, that's my advice. We love to see the new faces."

#### H. REPORT FROM THE ACTING ZONING ADMINISTRATOR - S. Phillips, Acting Zoning

S. Phillips, "I have been on a couple of site visits for what ultimately related to real estate transactions. I worked with Brian Barnes on those site visits. Research was done on Flood Plains because in the fall of this

year the planning commission will be working to adopt new Flood Plain maps. Research was done in response to resident requests regarding trading impervious for pools. I responded to resident concerns regarding tree removal and bank clearing. As Mr. Pollard suggested, there are two CUP's that have been turned into the Town Office and they will be on the agenda in July for a CUP schedule. As I shared with Bonnie, I worked with Mike Smith from Dominion Energy who communicated there are nine poles that are ready to be removed. We will have to get on the schedule for removal. There are three poles that need more work." B. Schaschek, "The poles at the post office and the pole at my house are ready to be removed and that is the most important." Mayor Ransone, "If there is no further public comment we will move on."

#### I. REPORT FROM THE TOWN ATTORNEY - Nancyellen Keane, Esq.

N. Keane, "I have a report on streets. Since the last meeting you all asked me to speak with Don Gill in Lancaster and find out if Lancaster will support our joint petition for a no through truck zone. Don and I had a conversation and I have looked at some documents pertaining to the Kilmarnock no through truck proposal that occurred back in 2010. This process is a little more complicated than originally thought but it will still go forward if you want it to. Later on the agenda there is a draft resolution. I'm not sure we should read it as a first reading tonight, I'm happy to but since it is a resolution and it requires two readings it should be read by the next council also they don't have the ability to participate and didn't hear my prior reports that I made to you about the streets. I completed a written report to you all on streets and everything that I have done. I am going to pass this cut to the council. Save one for Wayne and Jackie. This tells you several things, what the legal issues were. I was originally asked to do a legal review of if the Town has the legal authority on its own to conduct maintenance and make decisions regarding streets, street maintenance, speed, signs, rumble strips, no through truck and those kinds of issues. The answer is no, the Town of Irvington does not have that authority even though our Charter says we do. Because the state of Virginia passed a series of laws that trump the Charter. I confirmed that information with VDOT through their central office all the way up to the Attorney General's office. We have a clear understanding that we do not have ability to make these decisions. We must work with VDOT. VDOT is very happy to work with us. I have been working with David Beale, the new resident in the Warsaw office. They will be here once the Tides Inn and the Compass Entertainment Center are open. They will conduct a speed study and a capacity study through the Town of Irvington. They will notify us several weeks in advance of when they come so that we can ascertain what we want them to look at. They are going to look at the cross walk. I have asked them about another cross walk for golf carts and bicycles and I did not get a no. I was expecting to get an absolute no but he is trying to figure out how to help us. I think they want to help us. I have told him that people are very upset about the speeding, the untenable issue about the trucks. The one thing I did not know about the pedestrian cross walk that everybody hates was apparently part of a federal program. I don't think the Town asked for it. I think the state came to us and said we have this stuff we can put in, do you want it? I think the town acquiesced and agreed. The catch is that when it is a federal program and there is federal money you have to leave it in place for a minimum amount of time because federal funds were used to put it in or else you have to pay to take it out. So I asked how much it would cost us to take out the pedestrian cross walk. It would cost \$50,000 - \$60,000 to remove it unless we wait until 2022. We only have to wait 1.5 years. We can leave it there for another 1.5 years and they will take it out for no cost. Before we move on to the next topic, the resolution that is later on the agenda is something that we would have to pass in two readings but the other piece of this is that the Commonwealth Transportation Board (CTB) requires that any jurisdiction that is requesting a restriction on through trucks have a public hearing associated with passing the resolution. That is the other reason why I don't think we should have our first reading tonight. We should wait until July and have a public hearing which requires an advertisement in the newspaper so that people can speak on no through trucks the same thing will happen at the county. The county will take it up once they get a copy of our resolution that we pass because it is our request we send it to the county and the county will hold a public hearing during one of their meetings and they will pass a resolution hopefully supporting us. They don't decide until they hear at the public hearing. I asked Don Gill, will you all tell us now that you will support this and he said we supported Kilmarnock so there is precedent for doing this but I can't tell you we will support

this until we hear what the public has to say. If we did this in July and August it would probably be at the county in September and October and then it goes to CTB who has nine months to consider. We are looking at over a year for this." B. Schaschek, "Tripp you and Anthony were at the last meeting when we were talking about this and they are on the new council." N. Keane, "Was Dudley there? But they were not participating. We also talked about this in closed session and they were not privy to the conversations." B. Schaschek, "What would happen if we had the first reading and then had the public hearing in July with the second reading to pass it on?" N. Keane, "I think it is up to the new council as to whether they feel comfortable voting on something that they were not voting on the first reading. I can't give an answer to that." B. Schaschek, "We don't vote on a first reading." N. Keane, "Correct but basically it is voting to send it to a second reading." F. Westbrook, "It would be half ours and half the new council which makes it awkward." B. Schaschek, "The sooner that we can get it to the county because we are going to have to hear it from them as well. We have been trying to get this no through truck for 2.5 years." N. Keane, "It is very apparent from reading the materials that I have from VDOT and Lancaster that CTB puts a very heavy emphasis in the decision to approve or not approve on of these on enforcement. They want to see demonstrated enforcement in the jurisdiction before they approve it. VDOT made comments about this to us back before I got involved but I looked in our file and read what they had written to the Town. They said, what is the point in asking for a no through truck zone if you don't have any enforcement? We can push this on and send it to Lancaster but we have to have an enforcement strategy in place before October before we send it to the CTB so that we can say in our proposal that we want this, we need this and this is our demonstrated enforcement concept or tactic. I know there has been some discussion about where is the sheriff's office and that will probably be a part of the conversation. The other piece is we don't have a police force and that is another conversation. If we can't demonstrate enough enforcement for the CTB they will suggest there is no reason to do it because it requires signage and other factors. One good thing is there is already a restricted through truck zone that would take the same route. The Kilmarnock no through truck utilizes Route 3 to James B. Jones Highway to go around Kilmarnock and that would be the same cut through for us. They think that the fact that it was put in for Kilmarnock may have impacted Irvington. I wanted to make a couple of comments about later agenda items in advance so that you understand. We are going to be considering a contract with Lancaster County which you already approved for CARES funds coming from the federal government pertaining to the Corona virus. That money will come to us as a check after we approve the agreement tonight. It would be an agreement between the Town and Lancaster County for the funds that they are giving us pro rata which are around \$35,000. The funds are pro rata which means if we receive the check they should be deposited in July 1st because we want to deposit the funds prior to July 1 we would have to amend the budget of that year and we would not want to amend the FY19/20 budget year. That information came to me." B. Schaschek, "Why would we be amending the budget because these are funds that were not budgeted?" N. Keane, "Yes but once you take the money in you have amend the budget to show that the money came in so you would rather not take them in this year because we are not doing a budget amendment this year." B. Schaschek, "We are not amending the budget this year." N. Keane, "The other thing is the CRF need to be deposited to an account at Chesapeake Bank or simply accounted for on the general ledger under a separate items and our current banking resolutions are sufficient so you don't need a new resolution. Finally, I want to call your attention to the fact that the minutes from tonight's meeting you would need to have a special meeting to approve those minutes this fiscal year or pass them to the next council. The council may or may not choose to vote on them. This is an interesting dynamic with a new mayor and council. I am just asking if you want to have another meeting to approve just the minutes. You have mentioned having an additional meeting where you will meet with the townspeople so you could do this then." F. Westbrook, "We need to tie up this loose end because the new council can't vote." B. Schaschek, "Can't they just recuse themselves from voting because the just need a majority." N. Keane, "You can do that. I think there is one other set of minutes that may not be on the list. I think there are two sets of minutes to consider." B. Schaschek, "That is what we did last time and there was enough to pass."

J. REPORT FROM THE PLANNING COMMISSION - J. Brown, Planning Commission Liaison

Mayor Ransone, "Jackie Brown has left, T. Chapman you have the floor." T. Chapman, "Thank you Mr. Mayor. Julie Harris is the chair of the planning commission but was not able to attend. The planning commission report is as follows: new planning commission member Phil Robinson was welcomed and Phil is here tonight. We had a first reading of Resolution 2020.04PC which amend the planning commission by-laws which allows a three day notice for special meetings rather than ten days which brings us in concert with the town council. We will get to vote on that next time. Steve Kimmeth and Lee Capps reported on their attendance of the Virginia Chapter of the American Planning Association monthly webinar. This monthly webinar highlights Virginia legislation that affects planning issues. PC will have someone attend these. Officers were elected unanimously as follows: Julie Harris, Chairman; Tom Chapman, Vice Chairman; Steve Kimmeth, Secretary. Roundtable: Tom Chapman introduced a proposal for discussion on amending the PC By-Laws to allow the PC to vote by motion, thereby eliminating one meeting from CUP and other approval processes. He noted his opinion, my opinion, that Irvington Town Code §§30.15 and 31.22 which require the Town Council to act only by Ordinance or Resolution do not need to be applied to the Planning Commission. It was generally agreed by the PC that we need to simplify our CUP and other processes for the benefit of our residents. During discussion, the Town Clerk, Sharon Phillips, mentioned that Town Attorney, Nancyellen Keane, is working on a presentation dealing with simplification, to be presented during either the July or August TC meeting and that the PC should hold any further action on the issue until that occurs. Is that happening Nancyellen?" N. Keane, "I have no idea because we don't know what the schedule will be for July and we will have a new mayor." T. Chapman, "So it is happening, you just don't know when?" T. Chapman, "The next two PC meetings were scheduled for: July 14 and August 11 at the Irvington Baptist Church at 6:30PM. Any questions?" Mayor Ransone, "Thank you for your report."

Mayor Ransone, "Motion to approve Mill Creek Geek. He is the IT guy." F. Westbrook, "Good guy." M. Bombay, "Same rates as last year." S. Phillips, "That contract increased by \$10 per hour. The reason for the increase is the IT vendor is now providing website hosting services. The town website was hacked and we were not able to contact the vendor that handles the website. After several days of no contact we were finally able to make contact the vendor, who at time chose to step away and no longer provide services. As a result, Chris is now handling the website for the Town. The increase in the fee is for Chris to handle Wix and to train me to post notices to the website." Mayor Ransone, "I was aware of the situation and I asked Sharon to handle it. We did not have a contract with the former vendor but this will at least provide us with a contract." F. Westbrook, "So we are looking at \$70 per hour rather than \$60 per hour so that is the \$10 increase." Mayor Ransone, "Do you have an idea of how many hours?" S. Phillips, "Services are cyclic and we should expect to see more hours from the vendor due to the transition of mayor elect and council elect, advisory boards, staff, etc. He generally bills 3-4 hours per month unless there is a special contract." M. Bombay, "So there is an increase of \$30." F. Westbrook, "Is this effective immediately?" Mayor Ransone, "Yes. This may have to be adjusted in the budget." F. Westbrook, "There is no end date on this. So that if either one of us want to walk away we can." B. Schaschek, "I think that is something we can take up with the next council. You are booking this to maintenance." K. Pollard, "What do you mean hacked?" S. Phillips, "There was sexually explicit material on the website." Mayor Ransone, "I need a motion to approve the contract as is for one year or do you want to hold off until July." B. Schaschek, "Table it until July. Sharon, when you get a chance there is a link to Virginia.gov there is a link for Irvington that has a major issue. I will send you the exact link."

Mayor Ransone, "Next we have discussion of a resident complaint." S. Phillips, "A resident has expressed a concern or complaint regarding five dilapidated semi-trailers that pose a risk to public health and safety they also qualify as a nuisance. The resident has requested the town council declare the situation to be a nuisance and then authorize the zoning administrator to send a notice of violation. The concern is the amount of work that would have to be done to remove the five semi-trailers. The do not have the engines. I am asking Council how to approach this because the property is tax delinquent." B. Schaschek, "No they are not. They are current." S. Phillips, "The property is in an estate or trust and has been tax delinquent for 3 years with this being the first year they are not delinquent." N. Keane, "The purpose for declaring a nuisance is to that the Town can take action. Under the nuisance statute the town could have it cleaned up and removed at cost but then charge it back against the property. I think we need to know more before we take immediate action. Is the

property worth enough to cover the cost of removal of the trailers? Who is the owner? We have not done enough research on the cost of having a contractor do the work associated with removal, Sharon suggests there may be significant tree removal to even get to the trailers." S. Phillips, "Timber will have to be removed in order to get equipment in place for the removal." N. Keane, "It is unsightly and we have the right as a Town to declare a nuisance and to clean up the property and then charge for the clean up but if this is going to cost more than the property is valued. We want to make sure we can recoup our costs." F. Westbrook, "Can we file a tax lien?" F. Westbrook, "If they don't keep the taxes current you could sell the property to cover the cost but sometimes, I have been involved in a similar situation, you can spend dollars to do the work but if the property is not valued similarly." S. Phillips, "According to the tax records, the property is valued at \$32,500." B. Schaschek, "Is that each parcel?" S. Phillips, "Without having the property surveyed it is unclear which specific parcel is involved. I cannot confirm the semi-trailers are limited to one parcel." F. Westbrook, "These are all small parcels." N. Keane, "We should contact the property owner." S. Phillips, "I need authorization to contact the property owner." B. Schaschek, "I think letters to owners are the first step before we get a bid for the work." Mayor Ransone, "I need a motion to authorize the acting zoning administrator to send a letter to the property owner." N. Keane, "The letter should indicate the property owner is responsible for the clean up and if you don't respond to us we will have to declare it a nuisance and then the Town will clean it up and charge the property owner. We are trying to get the property owner to take care of this so that we don't have to." S. Phillips, "Should I use the 7-10 day response time?" N. Keane, "The code does have a time frame for a response to the letter. I would give them 30 days to respond to the letter." Mayor Ransone, "Let's get a motion authorizing the letter to the land owner stating there have been complaints about safety issues." F. Westbrook, "So move." B. Schaschek, "Second." Mayor Ransone, "We have a motion and we have a second. All those in favor and all those opposed."

away." Mayor Ransone, "That is fine if you want to eliminate them. We will have to send them a letter thanking them for their interest." J. Brown, "I thought we already decided that." M. Bombay, "We did." F. Westbrook, "We talked about the fact that they live so far away." K. Pollard, "That was one issue and we wanted to get someone local in the community that would be nearby to attend our meetings." B. Schaschek, "I have had the opportunity to talk to Lee Capps but I have not had the opportunity to talk to Lara and I had no intentions of talking to the ones out of town because I thought we were only talking to the two." #### E. PUBLIC COMMENT

Mayor Ransone, "Public comment is open, anybody wishing to speak about the town we just ask that you come up to the table and offer your comments. If there is no public comment we will move on."

F. REPORT FROM THE ACTING ZONING ADMINISTRATOR – S. Phillips, Acting Zoning Administrator S. Phillips, "The zoning department issued permit 2020-04. The resident was Mantiply. The contractor was Ronald Bay. The property address is 55 Carters Creek Road. It is in R-1 for a 250 square foot sun room, within setback and under general permitting. There have been multiple request for research but no applications filed."

#### G. REPORT FROM THE TOWN ATTORNEY - Nancyellen Keane, Esq.

N. Keane, "I was authorized by council back in November to perform legal research to determine what authority the town has to regulate its streets and roads particularly as it pertains to implementing stop sign, speed bumps, no thru zones, and painting streets. I performed the legal research and communicated with VDOT several times regarding what I found. I will be sending you all each a memorandum after this meeting which gives you more information rather than the summary I am giving you right now. The bottom line on this is the town of Irvington does not have this authority. We have very broad Charter language that authorizes us to do all kinds of things to our roads but unfortunately it has been over ridden or superseded by state law and I can give you those cites in my memorandum. As a result, VDOT and the Highway Commissioner and the Commonwealth Transportation Board have the authority for these various things that were of interest to you when you authorized the research. I talked to VDOT about what could be done. They are the ones to do it and we don't have the authority to make the decision, what can they do to assist us? On the front of the no thru trucks, they do believe that Route 3 restriction around Kilmarnock may be increasing thru truck traffic on Route 200 through Irvington therefore they are recommending that we file a joint request with Lancaster County. They require the County to be a party as well as the Town because the road intersects with the County going thru Irvington at each end. We would have to pass a resolution requesting that the Commonwealth Transportation Board authorized this. Lancaster Board of Supervisors would have to pass a similar resolution. Both of those resolutions would go forward to VDOT with a request letter that says both jurisdictions want this. Then the Commonwealth Transportation Board would hear it in panel and decide if it can be done. I believe if the two jurisdictions and VDOT are supporting it we will have the likelihood of getting it done." F. Westbrook, "Who would be writing this up to present this to the VDOT panel? The county or each individually." N. Keane, "I would recommend Irvington take the lead because we really want it but we are going to have to get Lancaster to pass the resolution as well. Unless you want to draft the resolution yourselves I would be drafting the resolution for Irvington and the county attorney would be drafting the resolution for the board of supervisors and then we would put together our presentation which includes a letter and attach both and indicate we both want this and send it forward and to VDOT. There is a process that is listed online of how it is done. They told me we have to get this resolution passed first." W. Nunnally, "How soon can we do this?" N. Keane, "We could read the resolution in June and then in July pass it and it could go straight in, as long as Lancaster could get it done as quickly. I have not talked to the county because I was not authorized to do that. I was authorized to talk to VDOT and to research the law. I think the next stop would be to draft the resolution and then to talk to the county attorney or however you want to handle this. I am looking for input if you decide you want to do this?" Mayor Ransone, "Would Don Gill be the correct person?" N. Keane, "Sure. We could

approach on two fronts. The county attorney would certainly have to be involved but so would the county administrator." W. Nunnally, "Let's stop and make sure you are authorized to prepare the resolution. I move that we direct our town attorney to prepare the resolution on no thru trucks." B. Schaschek, "Second." M. Bombay, "I would like to see somebody from the county be approached before we do the resolution just on the off chance they are not going to have the buy in, why waste our time and resource if they say no. I would be surprised if they said no." F. Westbrook, "I think they are pretty concerned about the traffic generated by the Compass so I think they are amenable." N. Keane, "There is more in my report that might impact exactly what Mike is talking so maybe before you vote you should hear the rest before you decide. This is on the no thru truck restriction." W. Nunnally, "I would like to move on this since we have a crack in the armor." M. Bombay, "I'd like to see her report." N. Keane, "You might want to hear the rest of my report. You wouldn't want to vote three times. The Town of Irvington wrote a letter to VDOT in November requesting that VDOT do a survey of capacity and speed in Irvington this spring or summer. The thought was it would be done after the Tides Inn opened and after Compass Entertainment opened. Obviously with COVID-19 it has been pushed back but they are still aware they have to do the study. They also are aware they need to do it after both of those facilities are fully open not partially open. They would use the data to make decisions about traffic control measures such as rumble strips, speed bumps, painting the streets. They don't usually allow anything like that on a primary road. Route 200 is a primary road. King Carter and Steamboat are not primary roads." B. Schaschek, "Is it just the painting on 200?" N. Keane, "It is speed bumps and rumble strips and all of that but they do have jurisdiction that they referred me to, Port Royal where they did a test on speed. If you have speeds on a road 85% of the traffic is 10 mph over the posted speed then they do allow you to pay for yourself, they will not pay for it, \$10,000 for a pole mounted speed display sign (PMSD) showing the driver how fast they are going." B. Schaschek, "Do we own it." N. Keane, "VDOT has to approve the item. They allow you to install the device and you pay for the repairs. You can't do this unless 85% of your traffic is going 10mph or more over the speed limit. This is part of the test they will be doing in town for speed capacity. I told them that Route 200, King Carter and Steamboat and the intersections." F. Westbrook, "Can we tell them the main times." N. Keane, "I did ask when they would do the speed capacity test. I was told they do speed capacity test from Tuesday - Thursday." F. Westbrook, "The need to be here at 7:45 am and 3:30 pm." N. Keane, "I think we need to get an agreement that meets everybody's requirements because the big capacity is on the weekends." F. Westbrook, "It is the employees and where the road narrows down by the Tides and that is where we have a preponderance of children down that way." N. Keane, "Before they come to do the study we can make sure of what the agenda is and that they know about it and agree to do it." Mayor Ransone, "A lot of the problem on King Carter are the contractors coming to the Tides and there are people out walking." N. Keane, "I also mentioned the pedestrian crosswalk in front of the post office. There have been complaints about the looks, functionality, why it sticks out into the road. They will look at that as well when the do the capacity study." F. Westbrook, "Would they allow the mayor to walk with them to point out these things?" N. Keane, "They want us to be happier with what is going on. I have told them it is not tenable and people are complaining. They do tests and look at data and then compare us to other jurisdictions and they are not going to give us something on a primary road because then they would have to do the same for other jurisdictions. They don't want to establish a precedent." M. Bombay, "Don't we already have that precedent? We already have rumble strips on both sides of 200." N. Keane, "We will have to put all of these things on a list and work through the list with VDOT." Mayor Ransone, "I agree with Fran the traffic is all the time. They should pick certain times and stay a few hours and then come back during a different time." N. Keane, "We are going to have to get data and have them here to see this stuff. We do this with a list of what they need to look at." W. Nunnally, "This has been my project for 10 years. Let me continue to do this." J. Brown, "Can we get a way to cross Route 200 with golf carts to make the community more accessible by golf cart? A lot of people are concerned about the ability to get to the post office or the shops and if we are going to be a golf cart community it seems like it needs to be accessible more than King Carter Drive." N. Keane, "I can ask VDOT about having a lane where golf cart can cross. The problem that I foresee but I have not done the research, is that there is a prohibition against certain golf carts being on primary roads." F. Westbrook, "You can petition VDOT and if you can figure out how to

cross a primary they may consider doing it in a rural setting." N. Keane, "Do you want me to include that in my research?" W. Nunnally, "Yes." Mayor Ransone, "If you had a path from one side of 200 where the golf carts could stay on that." F. Westbrook, "Another aspect that we are not enforcing is the golf carts themselves. They don't have the triangle on the back, they don't have the lights. I'd say 70% of the golf carts have not registered with the town office." N. Keane, "I will look at the golf cart crossing." B. Schaschek, "I agree that we should look at the golf cart crossing but I would rather not mix it in with the no thru trucks. I want it to be separate." F. Westbrook, "If they see golf carts on the roads without proper equipment the General Assembly can take it away from us." Mayor Ransone, "We don't have any way to enforce this. You can have the local sheriff stop them." B. Schaschek, "Can the mayor do that?" Mayor Ransone, "He can say something but that doesn't mean they are going to listen." N. Keane, "You have ordinances that you don't enforce. You have the authority to have code enforcement here. You do not have to have a policeman to do it, you had a code enforcement office at one time and that officer worked for the mayor. You can have the mayor do it or the zoning administrator do it or another employee. Even if we got a restriction on thru trucks and rumble strips if we don't enforce these things it does not do us any good. One piece of what you have to decide is are you going to enforce this? VDOT has asked are you going to enforce this and you don't have a police department it will not help you. Speed enforcement is an issue. The golf cart ordinance not being enforce is an issue. The traffic code not being enforced is an issue." W. Nunnally, "It should be high on our budge priority to get a policeman." N. Keane, "There are some creative ways to do that without having to hire your own policeman." W. Nunnally, "I have talked to the people in White Stone and they seem to be amenable but left it right there but I've got to pursue that further unless you want me to." N. Keane, "Are we to pursue the no thru truck, draft the resolution, and then leave to another day to determine how to enforce or do we pursue the enforcement side at the same time in the sense of putting something in place for the staff to enforce certain things or a police office that will do some of these things. Back to Mike Bombay, you wanted to listen to what else was in my report." M. Bombay, "Is this one motion?" B. Schaschek, "I recommend we have separate motions. I would do a motion for a no thru trucks." Mayor Ransone, "I understand where Mike is coming from, if the county doesn't want to go along we are back to dead water." N. Mayor Ransone, "If we are not going to have the parade on the 3rd why would we have the Market on the 4th?" F. Westbrook, "How much money are we going to spend thinking we might do this only to have at the last minute the Governor say's you can only have 50 people." Mayor Ransone, "We would leave it open to the latest moment possible." B. Schaschek, "I don't think you can leave it open." F. Westbrook, "We have already spent some money on the parade." M. Bombay, "What are our expenditures?" N. Keane, "The Governor's Executive Order that come out recently about easing the restrictions and what can be open. On farmer's markets are allowed to reopen starting tomorrow." B. Schaschek, "Those are building ones they are different than this open field." N. Keane, "It is allowed to be outside." B. Schaschek, "We don't have someplace where you can say you can come in over there. Here, they come in from all directions to these markets." N. Keane, "The farmers markets are specified in this executive order. This is the new one [Executive Order 61] that talks about easing and restaurants, farmers markets and other things." B. Schaschek, "But it is very specific about farmers markets." N. Keane, "We are the owner of the property. If somebody was renting the property from us to run the farmers market they would have to supply the hand sanitizer and the face masks. If somebody has asked about the tennis courts, technically if it is outside it could be open starting tomorrow but we as the owner would have to provide the hand sanitizer." Mayor Ransone, "That is why we are going to have to leave the tennis courts closed for a while longer." N. Keane, "It says if any such business cannot adhere to such requirements it must close so if we can't provide the hand sanitizer and do what is necessary to make sure there are only a limited number of guests." B. Schaschek, "He proposed that the other day but he has not issued it as a fact yet." N. Keane, "This is effective tomorrow. The reason I bring this up is because parades are not specifically mentioned but it implies they would be in the grouping of things that are continued to be restricted. ## POLICY ALLOWING ELECTRONIC PARTICIPATION AT TOWN COUNCIL MEETINGS UNDER VA CODE §2.2-3708.2

It is the policy of the Irvington Town Council that individual Council members may participate in meetings of the Council by electronic means as permitted by VA Code §2.2-3708.2. This policy shall apply to the entire membership and without regard to the identity of the member requesting remote participation or the matters that will be considered or voted on at the meeting.

Whenever an individual member wishes to participate from a remote location, the law requires that a quorum of Town Council shall be physically assembled at the primary or central meeting location, and there must be arrangements for the voice of the remote participant to be heard by all persons at the primary or central meeting location. When such individual participation is due to an emergency or personal matter, such participation is limited by law to two meetings or 25 percent of the meetings of the public body per member each calendar year, whichever is fewer.

A request for individual participation from a remote location shall be sent to the Mayor prior to the subject meeting. The request shall indicate the reason for the request, namely, whether the inability to attend the meeting is due to: (i) a permanent or temporary disability or other medical condition that prevents the member's physical presence, or (ii) a personal matter, identified with specificity; these reasons shall be made part of the minutes.

The request shall be approved unless such participation would violate this policy or the provisions of the Virginia Freedom of Information Act. If a member's participation from a remote location is challenged, then the Council shall vote whether to allow such participation. If Council votes to disapprove of the member's participation because such participation violates this policy, such disapproval shall be recorded in the minutes with specificity.

#### D. OLD BUSINESS

1. Discussion FY20/21 General Operating and Capital Improvement Plan Budget Schedule -F. Westbrook Councilwoman

Fran Westbrook, "We have been talking about deciding on the calendar going forward. We had one, one hour workshop prior to the COVID-19 shutdown and now we are faced with meeting the State's deadline of June 30. We have not put the time in to make that happen easily. We have three options that we are going to consider (i) the first option requires only two meetings to meet the deadline which would be to readopt our prior amended budget and then when COVID-19 has left and we are able to meet on a normal basis we would go back and do a budget as we would normally have done if we had time to do so. We would present and adopt an amended budget for FY20/21. The first option is to readopt the present budget and it would require two meetings (ii) the second option would require an additional meeting, putting us at three meetings. In this option we would adopt a new budget with the prior tax and fee rates. We would have

to have three meetings to make that happen. As you can see, it is a little difficult to do like this. An electronic meeting would be difficult also (iii) the third option would be used if we decide to change the tax rate and and/or any fees. This would require a minimum of four meetings to make all of this happen. We would still be faced with the type of meeting, whether it is outdoor like this or an electronic meeting. Electronic meetings make it a little more difficult for the public to participate. Having said that, are there any questions or comments? What is your pleasure?" M. Bombay, "I recommend we go with last year's budget because we have no idea what our income will be based on the Tides Inn and the Hope and Glory and when they will open. Why waste our time with fictitious numbers. I propose we adopt last year's budget and when we get a handle on the income for next year then we go through that process." K. Pollard, "I go for option one. The least amount of meetings we can have. We have no idea where this virus is going. I am not in favor of multiple meetings. I am in favor of option one." F. Westbrook, "There is a caveat with option one, we will do a budget but it may be after July. In talking about the figures, the occupancy tax rate represents 60% of our revenue flow even if the Governor decides to let hotels open for business in June, I think our summer tourist season will be pretty lean. I don't think it will jump right back to where it was." B. Schaschek, "I am okay with the current budget and then change it afterwards. However, we would only be able to appropriate operating expenses on a monthly basis because we will have to watch everything that is going out the door. We may have to decrease because we have less coming in. Normally we appropriate the general operating on an annual basis but in this situation we can't. We will have to appropriate month by month which means the council will have to agree on it." F. Westbrook, "That is a point worth considering because by passing the current budget and going forward the figures will look like we are flush when we are not. We will have to be very careful to keep a look on expenditures." J. Brown, "Have you already cut the expenditure amounts?" F. Westbrook, "We have some. I think we are going to be minus upwards of 50% on occupancy rates. Bonnie has a better handle on this than I do but I think it will be significant." J. Brown, "This says prior amended budget. Was it amended to reduce the expenditures already?" B. Schaschek, "It was amended when we did the capital budget and financial plan." J. Brown, "Can we amend that budget to reflect?" F. Westbrook, "Then you are back to extra meetings. If you touch the existing budget that we are talking about option one then you are creating a new budget." N. Keane, "This is a new budget for a new year but you are trying to have no workshops." F. Westbrook, "We are trying to cut down on having extra meetings. I would be surprised if in option two or three we only had to have one extra meeting." J. Brown, "I think June is an unrealistic time." F. Westbrook, "The State has not waived that deadline." J. Brown, "Given that I think it would be better to do it now rather than wait further down the line." F. Westbrook, "Would you be willing between now and the end of June to have four meetings?" J. Brown, "We are going to have meetings anyway." F. Westbrook, "We are not planning to have any extra meetings going forward except for the budget." J. Brown, "When things do get going we will have to have the meetings then." F. Westbrook, "We will bring this up whenever the COVID-19 allows us to." Mayor Ransone, "This is a special meeting. We do have May 14 where we will have the first reading and the second reading in June and then pass it. So, you would only have those meetings." J. Brown, "The understanding is later in the season when things reopen or don't reopen we would do it again, so it makes no sense." F. Westbrook, "But the public would be able to participate. It may be August before we can meet so it just depends." M. Bombay, "Going back to my original point. If we went through the process and came up with a new budget and then found out that we were lacking income we would have to amend that budget and have to go through that process yet again. So, we are working with numbers we don't have." F. Westbrook, "Right now we have the best guess not knowing what is coming, we only have an educated guess. I think it fair to say we are going to miss the next three months of occupancy tax." W. Nunnally, "First, let me thank you all for the work it took to set up this meeting. What is the finance committee recommendation?" F. Westbrook, "Personally, I think it would be easier on us right now. Unless the Governor is going to waive the June date, and I don't think he will, the easiest thing for our members and the way we are forced to meet is going to be option one." W. Nunnally, "Do you agree with that Bonnie?" B. Schaschek, "As I mentioned, the caveat, and the reason is we don't know when it will open up

and we don't know what our revenue will be. If we don't open until September, we will be exceeding our 10% of the budget and anytime that happens you have to amend the budget. Right now I'd say go with the first one and we monitor our expenses and do monthly appropriations for expenses and keep a real tight grip on in because we don't have the revenue coming in. We have our regular utilities and office expense. but anything else we really need to take a look at." J. Brown, "You say keep a real tight grip on it. Are we not going to allocate expenses that we don't have?" F. Westbrook, "We will have to slow down the spending." J. Brown, "So even though it is budgeted we are not going to spend it, is that what you are saying?" F. Westbrook, "That is what Bonnie means by we will appropriate on a monthly basis. We do the general operating expense on an annual basis and if we appropriate that one category for the entire fiscal year and then the rest of the budget the community events and donations we appropriate as the come up. We are now advocating to appropriate on a monthly basis so that we can watch and control because we don't know what the revenue will be." S. Phillips, "Procedurally, the treasurer would present a report of anticipated expenses, a month in advance forecast, for the town council to approve via a motion. July may be tricky but in the month of July a report would be presented for the August expenses because we will want to stay within current cycles." W. Nunnally, "Was that a motion you made Mike?" M. Bombay, "No it wasn't but I will make it a motion," W. Nunnally, "Let's move on." M. Bombay, "I make a motion that we adopt option one for the budgeting process." K. Pollard, Second." Mayor Ransone, We have a motion and a second. Is there any further discussion? All those in favor say aye and all those opposed."

2. Ordinance 2020 – 01. uc (Emergency, uncodified) EMERGENCY ORDINANCE TO EFFECTUATE TEMPORARY CHANGES IN CERTAIN DEADLINES AND TO MODIFY PUBLIC MEETING AND PUBLIC HEARING PRACTICES AND PROCEDURES TO ADDRESS CONTINUITY OF OPERATIONS ASSOCIATED WITH PANDEMIC DISASTER – S. Phillips, Clerk

N. Keane, "This is the ordinance that since you have declared the disaster and emergency you are allowed to pass to conduct, if you want to, electronic meetings. This a tool in your tool box. Once this is passed, you do not have to use electronic meetings you can still have face to face meetings. This allows you to conduct electronic meetings for boards, committees or public body that is under the jurisdiction of the town council is also covered by this. This is for a maximum of six months. It lasts for 60 days and must be re-upped every 60 days for a maximum of six months. The state law does not permit it to go past six months. It only applies to this disaster. There are three paragraphs in this on page 3-4 that allow, in addition to electronic meetings, certain actions to be taken without you all having to come back and have an electronic meeting or a meeting at all. Those are usually actions that would include, one paragraph talks about giving authority to someone in the organization an official, in this case it says mayor. You would be giving the mayor the authority to see to it to that the facilities of the Town are managed. He has already done that in one statement he made when the COVID-19 pandemic started, he sent out a statement that the Town Office would be closed until further notice but that staff would be in the office. It allows someone to make the decisions to manage the Town's property whether it is the Commons or Town Office. There are other sections that talk about the ability to purchase things during the emergency for health, safety and welfare reasons. An example, in other jurisdictions it may be buying gloves, masks. Purell for staff, or things for a

police department which you don't have. In this jurisdictions there are less reasons but we left it in there because it is in other jurisdictions legislation. In other words you all can decide not to give that authority to the mayor. He already has a discretionary fund anyway but in order to allow somebody to make a quick decision. Let's say we were going to have electronic meetings and it cost us money to set it up he could authorize the expense. I am giving you this long explanation because I was contacted before this meeting by a couple of members of council who had questions about those sections and I had not talked to all of you about that. If you have questions, please ask them. If you want to excise those sections you can discuss it but when it was drafted and circulated with the notice of the meeting and agenda it was in the form you see now. You may want to ask your questions before she reads it because there is no point in reading the whole thing if you are going to take parts out." Mayor Ransone, "This only last six months." N. Keane, "Yes, this is the one that only last six months but has be readopted every 60 days with a maximum of six months." B. Schaschek, "When does the 60 days start?" N. Keane, "If you pass it, today." F. Westbrook, "It is not retroactive?" M. Bombay, "Does it leave us more flexibility to leave every paragraph in there?" N. Keane, "Yes." M. Bombay, "Then leave them in there." B. Schaschek, "You have to take those two out. I can't agree to those two paragraphs. They don't pertain to this. We don't need the mayor to go out an hire people, we don't need contractors. This isn't like we had a tornado or hurricane where you need equipment. This is a boiler plate. I see no reason for this to be in here. I have to advise the council, first of all Council is more accessible these days because we have to stay at home than the mayor is who works. It is easier if something comes up and since we are looking at adopting this budget anyway and appropriating on a monthly basis if something is needed they can come and ask us." N. Keane, "The paragraphs that pertain to allowing someone in the organization to make purchases that relate to health, safety and welfare, it says that person will keep the council apprised in advance of taking action. That is at the end of the last sentence." Mayor Ransone, "I would not do anything without checking with you first. I am not going to buy something without asking you first." F. Westbrook, "Would it be more palatable to some members if we adopt a ceiling amount?" N. Keane, "One of them says to the extent of unobligated funds. If you have already obligated those funds they can't spend them." F. Westbrook, "Would it be more palatable if we put a limit of \$5,000 on expenditures during a 60 day period?" W. Nunnally, 'I worry about is can we hire new employees?" N. Keane, "If you had to have a temp for health, safety and welfare reasons. But he is not going to do anything if he hasn't asked you first." J. Brown, "I agree with Bonnie that is not the kind of emergency applying to. I could see if we had a tornado and the town were leveled. I would like to see those paragraphs removed." M. Bombay, "I don't have a problem excising those two paragraphs Bonnie is referring to." N. Keane, "The one that deals with expenditures and unobligated funds and the second one is the mayor may temporarily take the following actions, waive. He already has code enforcement. The first one refers to the mayor talks about the ability to manage the town's facilities, buildings. Do you want that one to remain?" B. Schaschek, "Yes." F. Westbrook, "So he could cancel the Farmers Markets?" M. Bombay, "This will be revisited in 60 days." B. Schaschek, "Do we have to vote on in it again in 60 days?" N. Keane, "Yes." W. Nunnally, "Do you have a written one with it written out?" N. Keane, "We didn't know which version you would agree to so we only have one copy." Mayor Ransone, "Sharon will read the version with the two paragraphs removed." N. Keane, "You can follow along with her to see that the paragraphs are removed."

For example, we are having this meeting today and if we had this policy in place and one of your members could not have come today they could have participated by phone had we had this policy. It does not have an end date on it. It is not something that goes away with COVID-19. This is something that you would keep and use and it gives flexibility because a member might be sick but could participate from home. There is a limit of the number of times this can be utilized in a year but it does allow some flexibility. It was thought that you all should consider this now even though it is not a COVID-19 policy because it could assist the town in the coming days and months if there is no COVID-19 and you need to be able to participate from home."

Resolution 2020-08 Policy Allowing Electronic Participation at Town Council Meetings Under VA Code §2.2-3708.2 attached hereto was read into the minutes in its entirety.

# ORDINANCE 2020 - 01 (Emergency, uncodified)

EMERGENCY ORDINANCE TO EFFECTUATE TEMPORARY CHANGES IN CERTAIN DEADLINES AND TO MODIFY PUBLIC MEETING AND PUBLIC HEARING PRACTICES AND PROCEDURES TO ADDRESS CONTINUITY OF OPERATIONS ASSOCIATED WITH PANDEMIC DISASTER.

WHEREAS, on March 11, 2020, the World Health Organization declared the COVID-19 outbreak a pandemic; and

WHEREAS, on March 12, 2020, Governor Ralph S. Northam issued Executive Order Fifty-One declaring a state of emergency for the Commonwealth of Virginia arising from the novel Coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic; and

WHEREAS, Executive Order Fifty-One acknowledged the existence of a public health emergency which constitutes a disaster as defined by Virginia Code § 44-146.16 arising from the public health threat presented by a communicable disease anticipated to spread; and

WHEREAS, Executive Order Fifty-One ordered implementation of the Commonwealth of Virginia Emergency Operations Plan, activation of the Virginia Emergency Operations Center to provide assistance to local governments, and authorization for executive branch agencies to waive "any state requirement or regulation" as appropriate; and

WHEREAS, on March 13, 2020, the President of the United States declared a national emergency, beginning March 1, 2020, in response to the spread of COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, on March 18, 2020, in accordance with VA Code §44-146.21, the Lancaster County Director of Emergency Management declared a local emergency because COVID-19 constitutes a real and substantial threat to public health and safety and is a communicable disease; and

WHEREAS, on March 27, 2020, Lancaster County experienced its first positive case of COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, on April 28, 2020, the Irvington Town Council convened a Special Meeting and adopted Resolution 2020-07 (Emergency) which (i) confirms, pursuant to VA Code 44-

- 146.21, the declaration of local emergency previously adopted by the Lancaster County Director of Emergency Management, as it pertains to the Town of Irvington, and (ii) declares a disaster exists within the Town under Virginia Code 15.2-1413; and
- WHEREAS, Virginia Code § 15.2-1413 provides that, notwithstanding any contrary provision of law, a locality may, by ordinance, provide a method to assure continuity of government in the event of a disaster for a period not to exceed six months; and
- WHEREAS, Virginia Code § 44-146.21(C) further provides that a local director of emergency management or any member of a governing body in his absence may upon the declaration of a local emergency "proceed without regard to time-consuming procedures and formalities prescribed by law (except mandatory constitutional requirements) pertaining to performance of public work;" and
- WHEREAS, Virginia Code § 2.2-3708.2(A)(3) allows, under certain procedural requirements including public notice and access, that members of Council may convene solely by electronic means "to address the emergency;" and
- WHEREAS, the open public meeting requirements of the Virginia Freedom of Information Act ("FOIA") are limited only by a properly claimed exemption provided under that Act or "any other statute;" and
- WHEREAS, the Governor and Health Commissioner of the Commonwealth of Virginia and the President of the United States have recommended suspension of public gatherings of more than ten attendees; and
- WHEREAS, the Attorney General of Virginia issued an opinion dated March 20, 2020 stating that localities have the authority during disasters to adopt ordinances to ensure the continuity of government pursuant to VA Code 15.2-1413; and
- WHEREAS, this emergency ordinance is adopted pursuant to Town Code §30.15, in response to the disaster caused by the COVID-19 pandemic promotes public health, safety and welfare and is consistent with the law of the Commonwealth of Virginia, the Constitution of Virginia and the Constitution of the United States of America.

# NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF IRVINGTON, VIRGINIA:

- 1. That the COVID-19 pandemic makes it unsafe to assemble in one location a quorum for public bodies including the Town Council, Council Committees, Planning Commission, Board of Zoning Appeals, and all other public bodies created by the Town Council or to which the Town Council appoints all or a portion of its members (collectively "Public Entities" and individually "Public Entity"), or for such Public Entities to conduct meetings in accordance with normal practices and procedures.
- 2. That in accordance with Virginia Code § 15.2-1413, and notwithstanding any contrary provision of law, general or special, the following procedures are adopted to ensure the continuity of government during this disaster:

- a. Any meeting or activities which require the physical presence of members of the Public Entities may be held through real time electronic means (including audio, telephonic, video or other practical electronic medium) without a quorum physically present in one location; and
- b. Prior to holding any such electronic meeting, the Public Entity shall provide public notice of at least 3 days in advance of the electronic meeting identifying how the public may participate or otherwise offer comment; and
- c. Any such electronic meeting of Public Entities shall state on its agenda and at the beginning of such meeting that it is being held pursuant to and in compliance with this Ordinance; identify Public Entity members physically and/or electronically present; identify the persons responsible for receiving public comment; and identify notice of the opportunities for the public to access and participate in such electronic meeting; and
- d. Any such electronic meeting of the Public Entities shall be open to electronic participation by the public and closed to in-person participation by the public; and
- e. For any matters requiring a public hearing, public comment may be solicited by electronic means in advance and shall also be solicited through telephonic or other electronic means during the course of the electronic meeting. All such public comments will be provided to members of the Public Entity at or before the electronic meeting and made part of the record for such meeting; and
- f. The minutes of all electronic meetings shall conform to the requirements of law, identify how the meeting was conducted, members participating, and specify what actions were taken at the meeting. The Public Entities may approve minutes of an electronic meeting at a subsequent electronic meeting and shall later approve all such minutes at a regular or special meeting after the disaster has ended.

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED BY THE COUNCILOF THE TOWN OF IRVINGTON, VIRGINIA, that notwithstanding any provision of law, regulation or policy to the contrary, any deadlines requiring action by a Public Entity, its officers and employees of its organization shall be suspended during this emergency and disaster, however, the Public Entities, officers and employees thereof are encouraged to take such action as is practical and appropriate to meet those deadlines. Failure to meet any such deadlines shall not constitute a default, violation, approval, recommendation or otherwise.

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF IRVINGTON, VIRGINIA, that non-emergency public hearings and action items of Public Entities may be postponed to a date certain provided that public notice is given so that the public are aware of how and when to present their views.

Nothing in this Emergency Ordinance shall prohibit Public Entities from holding in-person public meetings provided that public health and safety measures as well as social distancing are taken into consideration.

An emergency is deemed to exist, and this ordinance shall be effective upon its adoption.

# CONFIRMING THE COUNTY OF LANCASTER'S DECLARATION OF LOCAL EMERGENCY (COVID-19 Virus), AS PERTAINS TO THE TOWN OF IRVINGTON, AND DECLARATION OF DISASTER

**WHEREAS**, the World Health Organization characterized the spread of COVID- 19 virus as a pandemic on March 11, 2020; and

WHEREAS, this Emergency Resolution is adopted pursuant to Town Code §30.15.

**NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED**, that the Irvington Town Council confirms the March 18, 2020 declaration of a local emergency by the Lancaster County Director of Emergency Management, under VA Code § 44-146.21, as it pertains to the Town of Irvington; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Irvington Town Council hereby declares the existence of a disaster within the jurisdiction under VA Code §15.2-1413, necessitating the Town's support of all local government action, and to provide for the continuity of government under VA Code § 15.2-1413.

# ORDINANCE 2020 – 01 (Emergency, uncodified)

# EMERGENCY ORDINANCE TO EFFECTUATE TEMPORARY CHANGES IN CERTAIN DEADLINES AND TO MODIFY PUBLIC MEETING AND PUBLIC HEARING PRACTICES AND PROCEDURES TO ADDRESS CONTINUITY OF OPERATIONS ASSOCIATED WITH PANDEMIC DISASTER.

**WHEREAS**, on March 11, 2020, the World Health Organization declared the COVID-19 outbreak a pandemic; and

**WHEREAS**, on March 12, 2020, Governor Ralph S. Northam issued Executive Order Fifty-One declaring a state of emergency for the Commonwealth of Virginia arising from the novel Coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic; and

WHEREAS, Executive Order Fifty-One acknowledged the existence of a public health emergency which constitutes a disaster as defined by Virginia Code § 44-146.16 arising from the public health threat presented by a communicable disease anticipated to spread; and

WHEREAS, Executive Order Fifty-One ordered implementation of the Commonwealth of Virginia Emergency Operations Plan, activation of the Virginia Emergency Operations Center to provide assistance to local governments, and authorization for executive branch agencies to waive "any state requirement or regulation" as appropriate; and

WHEREAS, on March 13, 2020, the President of the United States declared a national emergency, beginning March 1, 2020, in response to the spread of COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, on March 18, 2020, in accordance with VA Code §44-146.21, the Lancaster County Director of Emergency Management declared a local emergency because COVID-19 constitutes a real and substantial threat to public health and safety and is a communicable disease; and

WHEREAS, on March 27, 2020, Lancaster County experienced its first positive case of COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, on April 28, 2020, the Irvington Town Council convened a Special Meeting and adopted Resolution 2020-07 (Emergency) which (i) confirms, pursuant to VA Code 44-

- 146.21, the declaration of local emergency previously adopted by the Lancaster County Director of Emergency Management, as it pertains to the Town of Irvington, and (ii) declares a disaster exists within the Town under Virginia Code 15.2-1413; and
- WHEREAS, Virginia Code § 15.2-1413 provides that, notwithstanding any contrary provision of law, a locality may, by ordinance, provide a method to assure continuity of government in the event of a disaster for a period not to exceed six months; and
- WHEREAS, Virginia Code § 44-146.21(C) further provides that a local director of emergency management or any member of a governing body in his absence may upon the declaration of a local emergency "proceed without regard to time-consuming procedures and formalities prescribed by law (except mandatory constitutional requirements) pertaining to performance of public work;" and
- WHEREAS, Virginia Code § 2.2-3708.2(A)(3) allows, under certain procedural requirements including public notice and access, that members of Council may convene solely by electronic means "to address the emergency;" and
- WHEREAS, the open public meeting requirements of the Virginia Freedom of Information Act ("FOIA") are limited only by a properly claimed exemption provided under that Act or "any other statute;" and
- WHEREAS, the Governor and Health Commissioner of the Commonwealth of Virginia and the President of the United States have recommended suspension of public gatherings of more than ten attendees; and
- WHEREAS, the Attorney General of Virginia issued an opinion dated March 20, 2020 stating that localities have the authority during disasters to adopt ordinances to ensure the continuity of government pursuant to VA Code 15.2-1413; and
- WHEREAS, this emergency ordinance is adopted pursuant to Town Code §30.15, in response to the disaster caused by the COVID-19 pandemic promotes public health, safety and welfare and is consistent with the law of the Commonwealth of Virginia, the Constitution of Virginia and the Constitution of the United States of America.

# NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF IRVINGTON, VIRGINIA:

- 1. That the COVID-19 pandemic makes it unsafe to assemble in one location a quorum for public bodies including the Town Council, Council Committees, Planning Commission, Board of Zoning Appeals, and all other public bodies created by the Town Council or to which the Town Council appoints all or a portion of its members (collectively "Public Entities" and individually "Public Entity"), or for such Public Entities to conduct meetings in accordance with normal practices and procedures.
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- d. Any such electronic meeting of the Public Entities shall be open to electronic participation by the public and closed to in-person participation by the public; and
- e. For any matters requiring a public hearing, public comment may be solicited by electronic means in advance and shall also be solicited through telephonic or other electronic means during the course of the electronic meeting. All such public comments will be provided to members of the Public Entity at or before the electronic meeting and made part of the record for such meeting; and
- f. The minutes of all electronic meetings shall conform to the requirements of law, identify how the meeting was conducted, members participating, and specify what actions were taken at the meeting. The Public Entities may approve minutes of an electronic meeting at a subsequent electronic meeting and shall later approve all such minutes at a regular or special meeting after the disaster has ended.

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**BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF IRVINGTON, VIRGINIA,** that non-emergency public hearings and action items of Public Entities may be postponed to a date certain provided that public notice is given so that the public are aware of how and when to present their views.

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF IRVINGTON, VIRGINIA, that, in order to ensure the health, safety and welfare of the public or town staff, the Mayor is empowered to restrict members of the public from entering or

congregating around town-owned buildings, facilities, and real property and may cancel, postpone or reschedule any events scheduled for any town-owned building, facility or property.

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF

### E. PUBLIC COMMENT

Mayor Ransone, "We have a couple of people here who are going to speak. Susan Cockrell is speak about the River Realm and the Kilmarnock Trolley." S. Cockrell, "This is the time of year that we talk about the budget and budget requests. For the audience, Virginia's River Realm is the destination marketing to generate tourism and bring it into the area. It has been around since 2016 and is about tourism marketing of the whole region and it is funded through government funds and the wonderful folks here in Irvington have been supporters for the past two years. It is also funded by the Town of Kilmarnock, Lancaster County, and Middlesex Economic Development Authority and the Town of Urbanna. It is a lot of folks working together around the region. I wanted to come and ask for this year's plan, I am requesting \$5,000. We have tremendous traction with over 100,000 website visitors, we have 72,000 individual visitors and almost 31,000 individual business listings on the directory aspect of the website. The tourist related Irvington businesses, and this is a three year number, the Tides Inn has had over 8,000 hits to their directory all the way down to Village Needlepoint with 625 hits to their directory listing. We have tremendous traction on the business assets in your community. We have done 49 blog posts featuring Irvington businesses in the last three years. We talked last month about how we use social media, how we like to talk about the great things we have. The number one paid social media is called 'Girls Get-A-Way' which has been a huge success with over 600,000 hits and 25,000 actual clicks and engagement and Irvington is a huge part of that campaign. We spent over \$4,500 on that last year we will probably double that in 2020. You are getting a really good return on your investment. I want to thank you for your time and your support and we look forward to continuing the relationship. If you have questions I am happy to answer. We are working hard for everybody." C. Thomas, "I am the Town if Kilmarnock economic development coordinator. Once again, we came last month and talked about the Trolley service. The 2020 season we are expanding with two additional stops, totaling 19. The two proposed stops will be in Irvington. This is a great amenity to the area as visitors come they can explore the Triangle Area. It is fun and cute and cost effective. The ask for this is \$500 from the Town of Irvington. This is a community effort to help provide a great venue for tourism in the area." S. Phillips, "Alice Cooper is not here tonight but the letter from the Lancaster Community Library is in your meeting packet. Lisa Hull is going to reschedule for March 26. White Stone Volunteer Fire Department is a letter that is in your meeting packet. The Golden Eagle is also a letter." L. Brown, "I have a letter for each of you. As a resident of Irvington I respectfully request a line item of \$25,000 in the capital budget for the next 3 years for a total of \$75,000 for the use of creating and installing a new recreation area on the Commons. The idea is to incorporate a playground area for children ages 2-12, and an area for ages 12-100, a shaded picnic area and a small stage. A project of this magnitude will require additional funds above the ask amount and the deficit will be addressed through grants and fundraising and a

community build. I have spoken with businesses and numerous residents and community leaders and have received an overwhelming support and enthusiasm for this project. The initial dream concept will be presented at the March 26 meeting for you and the community to see a broad overview of what is being proposed. This project will take thoughtful planning, input from stakeholders and of course work from you, the Town Council. I will continue to assemble a complete report but felt it was important to request a dollar amount at this point and time as you consider budget requests. Thank you for your consideration. In addition to that I have a letter from the Steamboat Era Museum stating their support for our project and possibly working together on a component of the project. I have also received verbal support from other community members and businesses who have indicated they would like to contribute to help with the fund raising efforts and possibly contributing portions of proceeds for a day of revenue to go towards the project. The kids I have spoken with want to have spots at the upcoming Farmers Markets for lemonade stands and other projects where they can raise money for the playground. Are there any kids here tonight? It has been a very positive dialogue that I have had with numerous members of the community and grandparents saying I can't contribute a lot but I want to contribute something because my grandkids would use that space. Certain age groups would like to have a space where they could go and work out after a walk through town. It is the intention to be a spot for everyone not just the littles but for everyone." Mayor Ransone, "Do you want to invite the kids to come in so we can see them?" L. Brown, "Come in, kids!" F. Westbrook, "How sweet." Mayor Ransone, "Can we have your names? It is nice to meet you Tucker and Max." F. Westbrook, "Is this your first town council meeting? Thank you for coming." Mayor Ransone, "Starting them early that is good. Thank you gentlemen for coming. Lara it looks like you have been doing a lot of hard work on this." L. Brown, "I should have some preliminary figures within 7-10 days." K. Pollard, "Are you looking to just do a section of the Commons?" L. Brown, "Where the original equipment is now and encroaching on where the back stop is, maybe?" F. Westbrook, "You can take that out or move it." B. Schaschek, "You want to come in off of that turn." L. Brown, "Absolutely, leaving the middle open for markets." F. Westbrook, "This is for kids and adults." J. Wells, "I am here for trees. I understand that the trees may have made it into the budget this year and I just want to say let's do this because now is the time. Thank you for your consideration." F. Westbrook, "We have your letter right here." J. Ewing, "I am a CPA and moved into town last fall. I wanted to offer my services as a volunteer to the town council if you need any help or assistance." F. Westbrook, "Sign that man up. Are you also affiliated with the new donut shop?" J. Ewing, "I am co-owner of the donut shop and we are planning to open in May and I will have my CPA office in the shop." F. Westbrook, "Do you live in Irvington?" J. Ewing, "Yes, I live on Chesapeake Drive in Terry Dort's old house." F. Westbrook, "Welcome to Irvington." C. Bradley, "I remain concerned about the process by which the short term rental committee is conducting their business. I first raised concerns in an email to Council and Staff on March 1. The recent drafting of an ordinance by the chair of the committee, which was not shared with the committee for comments, strengthens my concerns about the processes being used to do the work of the committee. You all, Town Council, voted unanimously for a scope of work for the committee at the September 12, 2019 regular meeting. Having attended the committee meetings since that time the items outlined in the scope of work have not been fully addressed, to my knowledge, and the scope of work did not include drafting an ordinance. I encourage Council to take it oversight responsibilities seriously. Committees and commissions should have clear scopes of work and should not be encouraged, supported, or allowed to step beyond the scope of work. Thank you." C. Braley, "Two of the kids

are mine. We also have a three year old who is probably not too good in this setting. I am here to advocate for revamping the recreational area in the Commons. We have a play structure in our backyard and our children always want to go to the playground. I believe that if a new playground is put in with additional recreational opportunities for adults it will be great for the Town and will be used and it will help local businesses as well. I am here to support Lara and her efforts for a new playground." S. Van Saun, "I want to support Cay and what she said about the vacation rentals and the process that is going on. I would like to put out there, although it may fall on deaf ears considering the absences of certain members of council, I would like to remind the Town Council that you all are elected by the people of Irvington and you are here to represent us. We would like to be heard. We would like to be a part of the conversation. I think there should be a broader format for that to happen. This is a pretty big concern in our Town." Mayor Ransone, "Duly noted. I plan to address this later in the meeting." A. Marchetti, "I wanted to express support for River Realm and the Trolley. They are both advantageous to businesses in town. River Realm in particular does a lot to bring business to this area. Whether you like it or not, Irvington is a tourist town. The Tides Inn has been here since the 1040's or 50's. The hospitality industry, the tourist industry is ingrained to what Irvington is and the River Realm does a great job of promoting and attracting business for the businesses. I support what they are doing and their initiative. I also support the playground or recreational space. It will benefit all ages and all generations for a long time. It will make the focal point of the town, the Commons, even better. I am willing to volunteer my time and effort to make this a success." P. Reynolds, "I am here to support Dredge. I want to voice my support for the River Realm and Trolley proposals. As far as River Realm is concerned, with our families businesses, Byrd's Seafood and Dredge, we would not have been as successful as we have been without them. They highlight Irvington business along with other businesses on their website and we get hits from the. To have two extra stops on the Trolley here in Irvington, we are all getting ready to be busy, and we ask you to support and promote the Trolley. We support Lara's proposal for the playground. As a former resident of Irvington, I still consider this as my home town and we are a tourist attraction. Some don't like it but most of us do because it supports our business. People are going to come to town, it is not going to be just adults, there will be children who will be looking for activities, attractions and things to do. You see the bicycles and golf carts out when the weather is good. The people walking from the Tides Inn and Hope & Glory when tourist are in town and that would be an addition to the charm of Irvington." Ashley Jones, "I am community development for the Town of Kilmarnock I have taken on the Trolley for the 2020 season. We are expanding this year and bringing new people into the area. Last year we had 17 stops and this year we will have 19 stops. One of the new stops is in Irvington down at the VRBO on Mad Calf which is down by the Yacht Club. We have taken the Trolley driver down the route to make sure it is safe and we have a safe entrance for all of the guests that will be getting on. This will get more people

down that area of town. We are asking this year for a total funds of \$500. We will be adding an extra stop taking the total of stops from four to five this year. It is still widely used by our visitors coming in from other areas because it is cute and quaint and allows them to see areas they might not otherwise see by car. We feel it will bring more people into Irvington this year with the new stop." W. Nunnally, "Ashely, did I hear you say \$500?" A. Jones, "Yes." K. Pollard, "Are these routes ground in stone or can they be changed?" A. Jones, "There is a master schedule that Bay Transit puts out that have specific time frames, that the drivers stick to. Within Irvington they might be adjusted to specific stops but the times don't vary." K. Pollard, "Who determined the new stop?" A. Jones, "We had a local business come to us and ask if they would be able to participate." L. Brown, "I asked if the stop could be added in west Irvington?" K. Pollard, "Did you ask for it at Mad Calf?" L. Brown, "No, at the road that goes down to the Yacht Club." A. Jones, "It will be at the corner of Rappahannock and Carters behind the sign at the Yacht Club, the driver has been there to approve the safety of the entrance and exit for all riders." L. Brown, "Two of the VRBO's have already committed to \$100 each and there is another one that we are waiting to hear from." K. Pollard, "That is great. I just didn't want them turning around in your driveway." B. Schaschek, "It is very residential down there." A. Jones, "We have been down there and the driver has found the perfect spot." S. Cockrell, "Thank you for the support of the Virginia's River Realm. We have produced an annual report to reflect the highlights. First of all, we have made tremendous strides in the number of visitors that are being sent to the website. Virginia River Realm is a destination branding for Lancaster and Middlesex counties. We provide joint funding and promote tourism in the area. We started in 2014 we are now at 100,000 annual visitors to our website. I want to talk specifically about marketing impact. This is our social media impact. We are using both Facebook and Instagram. We have reached over 800,000 people and sent 100,000 people to the website 30,830 people actually came into our website and looked at individual business listings and 11,000 left our website and visited the individual business sites. We have the capability to send out phone calls from our platform to local business and we have done that about 350 times. The Girl's Get-Away Campaign has been a huge success for us over the last two years. It is our most successful platform across all of our media with over 600,000 impressions and 25,000 clicks, over 2,100 partner views which means someone clicked on the ad and liked it enough to like at the specific business and over 500 times the guest left our website and visited the website of our partner. We are able to direct people from our website to local business. We did the same kind of campaign for oysters, The River is Calling which will start in August through October which will drive traffic through December. I want to say thank you again we certainly appreciate all that you do and all that the Irvington business do. We will be back with our ask for FY20/21." W. Nunnally, "Susan, I never saw White Stone." S. Cockrell, "We are going back to them this year. The business association has a great deal of interest in how can someone help. The want promotion of their businesses. We can all do more together than we can do apart. Their business association has approached us about being a player and I think they will be the one to fund White Stone. I don't think it is for lack of want rather the ability to do it." D. Patteson, "I want to chime in here. Stuart is in a conference tonight so could not be here but he is very much in support of the Virginia River Realm as is the Hope & Glory and the Dog and Oyster. The numbers speak for themselves." C. Bradley, "I am speaking as president of the Steamboat Era Museum board of directors and would like to thank the town for granting us permission to use the Town Commons in August for the CrabFest. I want to confirm you received the letter about not requesting a donation but offer you the same CrabFest sponsorship we offer to others." L. Brown, "I am going to reiterate for keeping the money in the capital budget line item. If you would consider keeping that in the budget talks for this year and during the budget cycle we would like to do a presentation on ideas and designs and what is possible. In the discussions for revamping is it possible to look at some of the funds and using the Lokey CD for the playground project? It is an expensive endeavor and it will take effort to raise the additional funds. Regarding the Trolley presentation, I was as surprised as you were. I made a phone call and asked Susan what was the possibility of getting a new stop in Irvington and ask and you shall receive. I thought it would have been more of a discussion as to just being done." A. Marchetti, "I support the playground and want to say the playground will be more than just for kids and maybe more of an experience. Right now I take my kids and get in the car and leave Irvington

to take my kids to play. I think adding that kind of outdoor experience will bring not only tourist but local families to Irvington. I think a playground will be an economic driver to local businesses. Lara and I think there are 40 kids that live in Irvington now." B. Schaschek, "Where are these 40 kids living?" L. Brown, "All around Irvington." A. Marchetti, "I think the Virginia River Realm is an asset to Irvington. If we can pull folks out of the Tides Inn, they visit local business and maybe even the new playground." S. Phillips, "This is from Brian Sink. As the eastward neighbor my concerns include safety, site line obstruction and, the precedent to allow dock projects of this length. The project design calls for a 120 foot pier with 20' by 10' platform and mooring piles extending an additional 18 feet channel ward and 40 feet eastward. Jay Woodward, environmental engineer, notes the project extends past the General Permit line but was approved by the Corps of Engineers as it did not interfere with the navigable waterway. I would hope the council would be insightful enough to realize there is more to Irvington and Carter's Creek than the ability to navigate. I fail to understand why with MLW of 7 feet depth at 100 feet you would need to extend pier and pilings 138 feet channel ward into Carter's Creek. With the recreational traffic in the Creek only increasing I would think this should be a concern, and one that will worsen as others assuredly propose docks of similar length or longer. Town council will be setting a precedent here, and I'm afraid with approval one that will lead to diminished aesthetics and safety on Carter's Creek. Thank you Bryan and Mary Ann Sink. From Scott and Becky Boyer, I read the comments submitted by Docks of The Bay, and have only some minor corrections to what Mr. Marchetti stated or showed in his GoogleEarth pictures: Our dock, which he labels 108 feet, is exactly 100 feet from MLW line, by my actual measurement. Perhaps 108 feet from MHW line, but we are all using MLW. His line as drawn runs out 120 feet, not the 138 feet it will actually extend to the mooring posts, so the comparison of the two docks is not that they are of similar length, which they are not. The VMRC does not make a determination of hazard in the navigation channel, they defer to the Corp, who uses a 25% rule of its own. Nancy Hankins did not respond to my question about how they arrived at that ratio as the right one, she simply stated that they ask for comments from various town councils every five years. Other docks stretching out further than the Hotard dock may or may not, be located in places where even at a longer length they do not protrude by percentage as far into the navigational channel. The Anderson's dock, shown as 132 feet, does not protrude farther into the channel than the sand spit adjacent to it, and so produces no safety hazard on its own. I am a bit surprised at so much contention in this thing. As I stated previously, the applicant has only asked for reaching 6 feet MLW, and my suggestion was to be even generous to allow that to go to 7 feet, resulting in 100 feet of length. Not sure why, having so stated their wishes based on depth, we are fighting so much over length. It is the length that creates our concern over safety. We are certainly not opposed to the Hotard's having their dock to accommodate a new sailboat that is why people are attracted to places like Irvington. Just asking that once they reach the depth they need, as has been stated, they end the dock there. My suggestion to the Town Council was that to avoid future contention, they perhaps arrive at how they will determine what length is appropriate for the Town to adopt. Using a measure such as percentage of intrusion, whether they adopt the Corp's rule as their rule or adopt some other standard, is the point. It shouldn't be left to neighbors to dictate on their own. Again, my apologies for not being there personally. These things sometimes can be easily talked through in person better than via email. Thanks again for your service, and for the service rendered by the Town Council. Scott Boyer." J. Hotard, "I appreciate the Sinks comments from South Carolina and I appreciate the Boyer's comments. I would like to reiterate that we have a VMRC permit in hand and that the planning commission has twice unanimously approved this dock. The comment that neighbors should not be able to determine strikes me a little odd because the neighbor not the property is trying to influence what the property owner is building. We have gone through the process. We have gone through the process twice. I encourage you to approve this so we can move forward." B. Bragg, "I am a resident and am not directly tied to this permit process with Joe but indirectly I am his builder and someone who grew up on Carter's Creek. I just want to go on the record as saying Mr. Sink as you well know is incorrect in his statement that you would be setting a precedent with dock." A. Marchetti, "I am very closely tied to this case and am sure anything a say will be considered self-serving. The 20' we are discussing will not make or break this. I spend a lot of time on Carter's Creek with my family and I would

not advocate something that is not safe. I have held a US Coast Guard Captains License for over 10 years. If anybody has been on a boat in that area there is room to turn around. As I tried to illustrate on my diagrams there is a sand bar that just out and you will hit the sandbar before you hit his dock. I don't think his ask is exceptional or unreasonable. We are arguing over 20'. He has the right to do this and I don't know if the town can overrule VMRC and am still curious of the legality. Who has jurisdiction after MLW. I hope that you trust VMRC when they say it is safe because I don't know any other authority that has more authority to determine safety." K. Pollard, "Thank you for your comments. #### E. PUBLIC COMMENT

Mayor Ransone, "This is a session where the public can free to speak about anything related to the town and we would appreciate if you would stand and identify yourself." L. Brown, "I am here to ask the town council to consider appointing an informal advisory group not a formal committee that would be obligated to take minutes and post meetings but an informal group to take a look at recommendations for a multigenerational play area that would serve birth to 99 year olds. A safer area for kids to play and maybe with some recreational type equipment for anyone to use for exercise and enjoyment. Some community members have already said they would help out with this. Our goal would be to provide a presentation to the town council that would include ideas, suggestions, pricing, and timelines." Mayor Ransone, "Legally can we do something where we don't have to have minutes?" B. Schaschek, "No." L. Brown, "At the last Lancaster County board of supervisors meeting they appointed an informal advisory group to look at economic development ideas to the county. They were told by their attorney that they would not be obligated by FOIA or keeping minutes. Not that we don't want anybody at the meetings. Anybody can come and share input. We will tell Sharon when we plan to have meetings. I have so much on my plate, I

don't have time to handle the minutes. Bob Westbrook is who I talked to about this." W. Nunnally, "I am in favor of this if we can do it." F. Westbrook, "I am in favor of this too." Mayor Ransone, "We should allow the town attorney to look into this. If you have an idea of the group of people that you would like to look into this you can go ahead and get started. You can meet and then come back with a plan that you present to us. I want you to remember that our budget is coming up and if you want to do something you might want to consider phases." L. Brown, "There are grants out there and well as fundraising." F. Westbrook, "We need to wrap up budget figures before the end of March. If you have preliminary figures you want us to consider in the upcoming fiscal year, this would fall under the capital budget." S. Phillips, "On behalf of Jane Wells she asked me to read for her: for the third year I am writing to request that council includes in the budget funding the planting of two willow oak trees on the Irvington Town Common. The logical place for these trees is in a line with the remaining tree in King Carter Drive side of the Common were the trees used to be, splitting the distance making them equidistant apart. This leaves space for many uses of the Commons but also provides shade. Ransone's Nursery has provided proposals for the planting of these trees. I asked for two proposals one for container grown willow oaks and one for balled or burlap oaks. The new thinking on tree planting is that it is better to start off smaller. Container grown trees do not require an excavator to plant. In our region, fall is a better time to plant a tree with a greater success rate. I hope that Council does not let another planting season go by. It has been several years since the last trees were removed and it will be several years before we get any benefit from these trees. Respectfully submitted, Jane Wells, I also have the two proposals that I will share around the table. Thank you." F. Westbrook, "We will need those proposals for the budget." A. Marchetti, "I submitted a packet that I think has made its way around. Are there any questions? I think it speaks for itself but if you have any questions." F. Westbrook, "We may get to this at another point." W. Nunnally, "Where do you reach the 6' mark?" A. Marchetti, "100' approximately. There is a plan view that has the soundings written on the right and side. The packet is addressing concerns voiced at the last meeting." Mayor Ransone, "If there is any more public comment at this time? If not, we will move on."

#### F. NEW BUSINESS

S. Phillips, "Resolution 2020-01.TC CUP application for a pier in R-1, Tax Map 34-20C. Whereas the Irvington Planning Commission recommended approval of a conditional use permit application TOI#CUP-2019-1 amended for a pier and mooring pilings in R-1; Tax Map 34-20C on February 4, 2020 and Where as a joint public hearing on the application was advertised in the Rappahannock Record on January 23 and January 30 and held a meeting on February 4, 2020 and whereas the Irvington Town Council read this Resolution on February 13 and February 20. Now therefore, be it resolved that the Irvington Town Council hereby will approve or deny at a date in the future." F. Westbrook, "Regarding resolution protocol, is there a reason why we don't either include the property address or property owner name?" N. Keane, "You can if you want to." F. Westbrook, "If we have more than one resolution it is hard to keep track of the CUP or application numbers." Mayor Ransone, "You want a name?" F. Westbrook, "Sometimes we have several and a name would make it easier." Mayor Ransone, "I don't think that would be a problem. If there are no other questions, we are going to move on to the report from the acting zoning administrator."

# G. REPORT FROM THE ACTING ZONING ADMINISTRATOR—S. Phillips Acting Zoning Administrator S. Phillips, "As the acting zoning administrator I reached out and sent a communication to the planning commission letting them know the events of last week and that I look forward to working with them. I also communicated with each of the applicants that are currently in the zoning pipeline. I reached out to contractors and the residents and anyone that was affiliated with a current zoning application. I have spoken with prospective zoning applicants, pools in the RPA, trees removal in the 100'. I would like to share with Council that I am working with professional colleagues to develop a staff report and that will be shared initially with the planning commission as any CUP or appropriate zoning permit would pass through the planning commission and then move forward to Council and it would allow information and progress to be seen by all." Mayor Ransone, "If there are no questions. Sharon, we appreciate your hard work."

#### H. REPORT FROM THE TOWN ATTORNEY - Nancyellen Keane, Esq.,

N. Keane, "We just finished the second session of the governance workshop. Those of you that were here know that some work will be done next week, the drafting of the job description and hopefully the workshop will be used for something practical. I was authorized, a couple of months ago, to do legal research on streets and roads in Irvington. I am still working on that. I did legal research and have talked to VDOT twice but have not gotten an answer back from them completely but I sent an email to them confirming my conversation with them. I sent a copy to Jackie and Wayne. Basically, I tried to put all of our questions in one document so I could get answers back from them about what authority they have versus what authority we have to make decisions about our streets in our town. We covered subjects such as no thru truck, stop signs, traffic calming measures such as speed bumps and rumble strips, paining the road and curb etc. I assume that next month I will be able to get back to you with more definitive answers but am still in the process."

#### I. REPORT FROM THE PLANNING COMMISSION, - J. Brown, Liaison Planning Commission

Brown, "The planning commission had the second reading of the Hotard application and unanimously recommended approval to the town council. A CUP application was presented for the space next to The Local to become an office as a special exemption. They have not acted on that. One commissioner has expressed interest in taking the VCU class to become a certified planning commissioner in this fiscal year. There is money in their budget so they are going to move forward. There are possibly two more that will want to take the class next year so we will need to budget for that at \$500 per person." F. Westbrook, "Will you put that in writing for the budget and finance committee?" J. Brown, "Yes. Also, the commission accepted with regret the term expire for Cary Schneider and he will not reapply. LeeH Capps term has also expired and he is reapplying. The planning commission requested the town council review the CUP application form and make any changes before they formally present it. I would like to ask T. Chapman to comment on the height presentation." T. Chapman, "Tom Chapman, vice chair of the planning commission. We were asked by the council to review the R-1 and R-2 building height restrictions and whether we need any changes. The report is in your package. Steve and I did the work. We recommend no change to our ordinances with respect to grade level definitions or building height restrictions. There are only a few properties in town that could be an issue with regard to "grade level" and building height and these can be handled by our Zoning Administrator within our current regulations and procedures. Are there any questions?" Mayor Ransone, "If there are no questions. Are there any questions of Jackie? We are going to move to old business."

#### J. OLD BUSINESS

F. Westbrook, "Bonnie and I met with Stuart Barwise and Dudley Patteson this afternoon to take a look at the grant information. They acknowledged they had not given us a copy of the grant application so this is what we are handing out now. We thought it was important to see the monies and the information that was submitted with our name. This is for informational purposes. They understand that we have yet to work through the budget aspect of how much money we are going to be putting into this matching grant which will be discussed at a budget workshop in the future. We had a wonderful tour of their facilities. It looks like it is going to be fabulous." B. Schaschek, "You don't need to review this now but you will need to be prepared to discuss in the future." F. Westbrook, "They left out one page that has some proprietary information."

F. Westbrook, "I pulled the memo that Roy Kime sent to all of us in the middle of January letting us know that DomEnergy would be here to trim the crepe myrtles on King Carter. Leaving one morning the people that they subcontracted to, a company that I have never seen before in Irvington, they were trimming them pretty drastically in my opinion. It was my understanding at the meeting we had last January that they were going to have us on a five year cycle, I think our minutes may say otherwise, but that they were going to walk King Carter with us before they did any cutting. Maybe Roy was going to do that, I don't know. At this point, Sharon spoke with Anita and she is going to try to get someone out here next week?" S. Phillips, "No, according to Anita Powell DomEnergy will not be back. We have been put back on a five year schedule." F. Westbrook, "They started cutting right there on the Town Commons and just past the Steamboat Era Museum. If that is their decision but we should have something that we agree on and get these trees looked at better than what is being done. Can we have someone look at the trees? I know there are some issues around the lines but if they are not around the lines can the property owner be responsible for the trimming?" W. Nunnally, "The property owner can do anything they want to do with the crepe myrtles." F. Westbrook, "But yours are not underneath the powerlines." K. Pollard, "Is there a right of way?" B. Schaschek, "The trees are on the owner's property it is not on the other side of the sidewalk." Mayor Ransone, "DomEnergy has a right of way to keep the branches off of the lines." F. Westbrook, "Yes, that is right. I thought when we handled this last

year that we had a firm understanding of how this was going to be handled in the future. In my opinion we didn't." B. Schaschek, "She stopped them." F. Westbrook, "That is why we are having this discussion. I created this monster." M. Bombay, "They acquiesced and now we are back on a five year schedule so now we need to keep on top and make sure they don't come here uninvited." B. Schaschek, "They have to walk the street with us. This was a different company. The second company, not the first company, knew how to trim." M. Bombay, "It sounds like a miscommunication on our part on their part to this new company. Now we should be set for four more years?" F. Westbrook, "I thought last year was year one and this would be year two." J. Brown, "Can we communicate with property owners and let them know they have the option to trim the trees themselves?" F. Westbrook, "Right now none of them are in danger of touching the lines that I can see. May I call Anita and talk with her myself?" W. Nunnally, "Mr. Mayor I move that we appoint Mrs. Westbrook as the official crepe myrtle queen." Mayor Ransone, "Why don't you let me call and talk to her first." F. Westbrook, "That would be great. I don't think we should leave it unattended."

THE MOTION TO GO INTO A PUBLIC HEARING IS APPROVED 6-0. BOLD

Mayor Ransone, "This is the time for the public to speak only on this particular matter. We are talking about the dock. If you want to speak please raise your hand." S. Phillips, "Mayor Ransone, with your permission, I will read a concern submitted via email from Mr. Sink, "I am writing to express my concerns about the proposed pier construction on the lot adjacent to the lot my wife (Mary Ann Alga Sink) and I own. Briefly, we became aware of the project from my brother in law, Jay Alga, who emailed the proposal sent to Mary Ann's departed father Mitchell Alga. As you are aware, the current design calls for a 120 foot pier with 20' by 10' platform and mooring piles extending an additional 18 feet channel ward and 40 feet to the east. My concerns, being the eastward neighbor, include safety, site line obstruction, and the precedent to allow dock projects of this length. On receiving the news, I contacted the environmental engineer, Jay Woodward, as the project extends past the General Permit Line and thus requires approval from the Corps of Engineers. As the Corps said the construction would not interfere with the navigable waterway the project was approved. Mr. Woodward left me with the impression that while I could challenge this decision in Newport News, successful reversal of the approval was unlikely. Mr. Kime, town manager, reached out to me after seeing correspondence between Jay Woodward, Anthony Marchetti and I. Since we do not live in Irvington, he wanted to keep us appraised on meetings and hearings. I emailed Mr. Hotard to discuss his plans, but received no response. Mr. Marchetti, builder and owner's representative, naturally feels Mr. Hotard should be able to build within his riparian rights. Basically after multiple emails and calls it appeared no one else felt the project was cause for concern, and as we wouldn't be able to attend the town council meeting I emailed Mr. Kime stating we wouldn't be opposing the project. I still fail to understand why, with MLW of 7 feet depth at 100 feet you would need to extend pier and pilings 138 feet channel ward (120 foot pier plus 18 feet to pilings) into Carter's Creek. With the recreational traffic in the Creek only increasing I would think this should be a concern, and one that will worsen as others propose docks of similar (or longer?) length. Town council will be setting a precedent here and I'm afraid with approval one that will lead to diminished aesthetics and safety on Carter's Creek, Thank you, Bryan and Mary Ann Sink" Becky Randolph Boyers, "My family and I live near the property. I am nervous because this is a very important decision because of the precedent it will set. One of our major concerns is the length of the dock. If you haven't been back there in this unique part of Carter's Creek it is narrow for power boaters with skiers, water ski's, people that are coming into the cove and there is a lot of traffic and on a weekend day when we sit on our dock which is referenced in some of the materials we do not let our guests go channel ward due to the traffic. The thought of going further out from our dock is worrisome. Another thing that was not clear in the files is the placement of the dock so you don't know on the property where it will go. I ask the town council to ask for a better rendering of where the dock is located so that you can visualize how

the boating traffic will go. I think we are all about informing a better decision. One think I remember reading in the file is that staking out the dock was a request that VMRC had articulated in December and I think the council may like to have that done so that you could see where this will come out. In summary I would like to ask the town council to prioritize boating safety and the community and our visitors enjoying Carter's Creek and especially setting a precedent for a dock of this length which we might regret later, thank you." Scott Boyer, "I am related to Becky by marriage. Thank you for the time and I appreciate what you do for a small town and being on the town council and planning commission is a lot of work. Beeky and I are not opposed to the dock. We are on the water. Everybody that comes down here wants to be on the water. Our feeling is we just think it is too long. There is no rational to making the dock that long. I have been through town files and VMRC files, I have reached out to Nancy Hankins to ask how you come to the conclusion that something is in the waterway and is a hazard. She measured it is 21% in the hazard which was not considered enough of a hazard. We were down on our dock and we think this dock will be about 52' beyond the end of our dock and that is stunning to us. We are going to ask Docks of the Bay to stake the dock so that we can invite anyone to walk on our dock and see for yourselves if it is too long. To our way of thinking it does not need to be this long. The applicant has said they will stop when they get to 6' mean low water so 100' by the depth soundings that they have already taken that is 7' MLW, I don't have a problem with that because it is back 20' from what they have asked for and I don't have a problem with that. I think from a planning commission standpoint you need to know how to make these decisions moving forward. So, 7' MLW should be 100' of dock and we are okay with that. VMRC says to show us your need for a dock this long. The need that is trying to be satisfied is his new sailboat, whenever he gets it, it's good for the neighborhood. But he doesn't need the extra 20'. This is an off the cuff suggestion, in the summer time when people fly up and down the creek, and we have this dock that sticks out 50' any new dock that sits in the navigation line should have illumination on the part that sticks out the furthers to protect the nighttime boaters from running into the new docks. I think you should move forward, the dock is great and they should have the new dock at 100' not 120'." Mayor Ransone, "Anyone else? I don't see any other hands. Anyone on the planning commission have anything they want to say? If not, we will come out of the public hearing, I need a motion to come out of the public hearing." W. Nunnally, "So move." M. #### D. PUBLIC COMMENT

Mayor Ransone, "This is a session where the public can stand up and speak regarding any matters in the town. This is the only time that you will be able to speak. Please raise your to speak." J. Hotard, "My wife and I are building a home on The Lane and I think most of you are aware of my concerns. The home construction is going fine. We have applied to build a dock. We have been through the process of VMRC and we have permit in hand. We have gone through the CUP process initially on November 11. We completed the public notifications. The notification of neighbors and there doesn't appear to be any objection from neighbors and yet on January 2 we were asked to repeat the process. The reason we were asked to repeat the process is the application of November 11 was signed by our agent which in turn was accepted by the Town and then in turn as we notified people via certified letters we were given incorrect dates so procedurally our efforts have been worthless. Now we have to repeat the process and besides causing inconvenience and cost and immense frustration. I am here to ask, in a perfect world you guys could take the permit process and move on it but I understand that is not possible because of these procedural problems. What I am asking for since it is the Town's errors that have prevented us from moving forward that you guys do whatever is possible to lay out a detailed definition of what the process is because I will tell you one of the most maddening parts of this is not understanding what happens when and then when there is an issue, a good example is, I didn't find out until yesterday that the dates were incorrect. I was asked to redo this without ever getting an understanding of really why we are redoing it other than initially being told the application was not signed by me rather it had been signed by our agent and that was unacceptable yet it was accepted by the Town. We have a balled up mess. I am here to petition the Council to find a way to move forward to get this resolved in the most expedient way possible and ultimately get our dock built which is all we are trying to do. I have never been through this process before so please forgive me if I am wandering a bit but I need to understand where we go from today. We have signed a new application on the 2nd and I am assuming that has been accepted by the Town without issues and we are not going to have anything to come back. I have prepared the letters to send out and they are ready to go if we can verify the dates and then I need to understand when we do that we need to do a notification in the newspaper and I understand if we can do that Monday by noon we can make the Thursday newspaper. So if we do all of these things in a timely fashion when can we come up to the planning commission and then for a review by the town council to review and approval of the permit. My calendar says that if we can get the letters by certified mail tomorrow and we post the notice in the newspaper next Thursday we will have time to get that before the planning commission assuming the published date on the internet is still correct. If we do that and we complete our portion of this again in a timely fashion will the planning commission be able to review that on February 4th and will the town council be able to consider the application for the permit in February or is there some other step?" Mayor

Ransone, "Mr. Hotard this closed session we are having after the public comment is because we know you drove up here to speak and we wanted you to have your opportunity. We are going to have four different schedules for a CUP dates and we are going to try to expedite. I want you to know we have had some missteps and we are trying to right the ship and we will try to expedite the process as quickly as we can." J. Hotard, "With that said, what do you need from me at this point." Mayor Ransone, "We will have a decision after the closed session if you would like to wait. Everybody has to go out when we go into closed session. I hate to make you go out so we will try not to take too long. If you come back in you will know the dates." J. It is part of what I do for a living. I truly believe there was no intent to delay or deny what we are trying to do. I don't think there is any ill will. I think we are trying to work within the process they have to. Most of my comments are about the process itself both the how and the why and it could be examined and streamlined down the road. I am not against the fact that we have to have a permit and that there is a review process. The amount of time it takes to get a permit, especially this permit, I have spent more time on Mr. Hotard's permit only for the Town of Irvington than I did for every single permit that I was able to get in 2019. A disproportionate amount of man hours and time spent obviously now we are going to do it all over again. Even if it had been approved the first time it was tedious and some of it felt unnecessary. From a business standpoint the length of time to achieve a permit is affecting business I would ask or recommend a review or see if there is opportunity to improve those processes. The truth is if Mr. Hotard had built his house across the creek he would be sitting on his dock right now because we would have already built it and yet we are still going through the process. I don't want the town to lose residents and business and get the reputation of being difficult to deal with or if I move to Irvington there is a chance I won't get my dock built that would be detrimental to the growth of the town. As an Irvington resident and a neighbor to Mr. Hotard I don't want his impression to be anything other than open arms and welcoming and here is what we can do here. Again, I don't think any of this was intentional but hopefully we can come away with learning something and improving the process. In this particular case the goal is find a solution and an expedited solution and come away with some dates. Speaking as the agent again, looking from the outside, there seem to be some inconsistencies in the process. Ironically, another client of ours Rappahannock Yacht Club didn't go through the process at all for their CUP whereas Mr. Hotard is having to go through the process twice. I am not complaining about we are in the middle of building that and it is great but that is a big inconsistency. I will personally volunteer to help look at some of these processes. The dock one in particular is one I am familiar but in general I would like to see the length of time shortened. I can get all of my other permits significantly faster anywhere but in Irvington. There has to be a way to speed this up but let's examine ways to shorten the time. If we can't shorten the time as a local business owner and resident the more people that want to come here the first impression should be what can we do for you not what you can't do when you get here. I would like for Council to consider those changes." P. Robinson, "You have my resume and I wanted to introduce myself so you can put a face to the resume for the zoning appeals board." I didn't think a CUP was necessary because this is the same use that they already have a CUP for they are not going to enlarge - but if they had said they were going to put three times the number of tables in that might qualify for amending their CUP as long as it was the same size I felt they didn't need to go through the CUP process. In the future we will be a lot more careful about making sure everybody is happy." B. Schaschek, "In your comments on this particular one, you said that it is within the setbacks after the boundary line adjustment. What boundary line adjustment?" R. Kime, "Because they (KCH) owned both pieces, they come in for an adjustment of the boundary line moving it over so they could be within the setback." M. Bombay, "We discussed that a number of months ago." B. Schaschek, "No we didn't." M. Bombay, "Yes we did, about eliminating that internal boundary line because they bought the pieces." R. Kime, "They came in with a document that has been recorded at the Courthouse. I have the ability to adjust lot lines like for Bill Westbrook when he traded with one of his neighbors. But you can do that, it is not a new subdivision it is just moving lines around." F. Westbrook, "As long as it is recorded at the Courthouse." B. Schaschek, "They have new surveys?" R. Kime, "Yes. The other thing that I talked about in my report was a swimming pool that was under consideration. Right now that is completely on hold because we needed more drawings and I haven't gotten them, I haven't gotten a CUP application from the owner of the property but it could come back up again. I would like to thank you for the accommodations you showed Mr. Hotard."

#### H. REPORT FROM THE TOWN ATTORNEY - Nancyellen Keane, Esq.,

N. Keane, "I have nothing because I did the workshop earlier. You are scheduling another workshop follow up on February 13th at 5:30."

#### I. REPORT FROM THE PLANNING COMMISSION, J. Brown, Liaison Planning Commission

J. Brown, "The planning commission recommended no changes to any of the ordinances the council asked them to review. It plans at its next meeting to vote on recommendations made by M. Mattheisen regarding the CUP application. These will be the sunset clause and the administrative review process and a change in the fee structure. The new application and recommendations will be sent to town council for review as a package. In addition, it is looking at flood plain ordinances in other jurisdictions to make

recommendations." F. Westbrook, "They made no recommendations except on the height. That is what they are waiting to look at, right?" J. Brown, "They recommended no changes." F. Westbrook, "They didn't come back with anything on that and that's why they wanted to look at other counties." J. Harris, "We are going to look at how flood plains are dealt with in other jurisdictions but no changes to the other," S. Phillips, "I thought a different decision had been made regarding the sunset provisions." J. Harris, "We are going to acknowledge the fact that the planning commission discussed the sunset clause but that there was never a vote so we want to vote on the sunset, vote on the recommendation for higher application fees and vote on whether or not the new draft will include B1 and B2 and R1 and R2 and Industrial because currently the draft only refers to B1 and B2. We want to vote on those and send it all forward as a package." S. Phillips, "At the meeting Cary stated the council already has the CUP form and it would be confusing to submit new things so you were going to wait until council made a recommendation and then come back with the other recommendations." J. Harris, "No, we are going to vote at the next meeting." Mayor Ransone, "Julie and Jackie – you need to get the expedited CUP schedule to the planning commission because there is a joint public hearing." M. Bombay, "In regard to the planning commission, where do we go starting with the planning commission for situations like RRYC where they are doing a new dock and didn't get a CUP or people start building on their property in the RPA and they don't come in and get the right paperwork? Where can we go so that we can nip this stuff in the bud?" Mayor Ransone, "If I am aware of it we can put a stop to it. If I am aware of it." M. Bombay, "This is only me feeling but I think people think they can get away with it." F. Westbrook, "I don't think it was intentional." Mayor Ransone, "I think 90% of the time it is unintentional and they are not aware of our ordinances. They have to come in to the office and talk to staff." M. Bombay, "I am not saying we do a cease and desist." B. Schaschek, "I would." Mayor Ransone, "We have done after the fact permits, CUP's" F. Westbrook, "Our sidewalk was one of them." Mayor Ransone, "We don't like to do that because that sets precedent." M. Bombay, "Coming from where I came from, if you built something without a permit you couldn't get a certificate of occupancy. You couldn't live in that structure." F. Westbrook, "We never dreamed we would have to have a permit to put in a sidewalk." K. Pollard, "How do people know? We put a deck on our apartment and we didn't know we were supposed to have a permit for that." Mayor Ransone, "We have to figure out a way to get that out to the public I think sending things out to the realtors will help too." F. Westbrook, "We could have some frequently asked questions." W. Nunnally, "I guarantee if you put a stop work order on the boat club word will get out quick."

#### J. NEW BUSINESS

Mayor Ransone, "We have a consideration of a request to use the Town Commons by the Animal Welfare League." F. Westbrook, "On October 31 the VIA has the Halloween contest." Mayor Ransone, "That is in the evening." F. Westbrook, "There will be a lot of dogs out there and I hope that the AWL is really careful to pick up the feces before the little kids get out there." Mayor Ransone, "We will emphasize the importance of cleaning up. They are normally pretty good about cleaning up." W. Nunnally, "I move to approve the request from the AWL to use the Town Commons on October 24 with a rain date of October 31." M. Bombay, "Second." Mayor Ransone, "We have a motion and a second. All those in favor and all those opposed."
